### Career Exploration Assignment

My mother became a Registered Nurse three years ago. She has told me about it and the things she has to do. This career began to interest me more and more as she would tell me about it. I have decided to go down this career path and I plan on too, becoming a RN.

Some of the things my mother has told me seem to be true according to the information I have researched and some doesn't agree with what she says. Also some of my research from different sources does not agree with one another. It all varies but this is what I have found.

My mother told me that I would always be able to find a job if I became a Registered Nurse. She said the job outlook was great. This proved to be true in the *Occupational Outlook Handbook* and also in *The Nursing Career Planning Guide*. The *Occupational Outlook Handbook* states that nursing jobs from 2010 -2020 will grow by 22 percent. Also the *Nursing Career Planning Guide* talks about how there has been a nurse shortage. It tells of how women now get to explore other areas in the medical field that a while back ago only men were brave enough to venture. So all in all I will more than likely be able to find a nursing job fairly easy when I get my degree.

I have always heard from everyone that nursing pays well. I decided to take a look myself and find out exactly what nurses were getting paid these days. I came to find out that the *Nursing License Map* states that a RN's salary is somewhere around \$60,000 a year. *The Occupational Outlook Handbook* states that nurses only get paid around \$40,000 a year. Even though the numbers are slightly different, I can live with either one of the salaries. My mother makes around 40,000 a year here in Kentucky, so I believe it just varies across the US.

Upon searching for information concerning the job outlook for nurses and their pay, I came across a work that compares the two. According to The Institute for Women's Policy Research, the wages didn't increase as expected. They did about 10% across the US. Today the hourly nurse wage ranges from about \$19.00 to \$34.00.
