Landmark members and their guests are invited to attend the June Landmark Meeting to be held at the Kentucky Museum on Wednesday, June 22 at 7:00 p.m. Mr. Robert Brigl, Exhibits Curator at the Kentucky Museum, will present a program and tour featuring the Felts Family Log House.

Built by Archibald Felts circa 1810-1820, this classic example of a "V" notched, Dog Trot log house was originally located on a farm adjacent to South Union in Logan County. Constructed in poplar, oak and walnut, this structure's superior craftsmanship suggests a possible association with the Shakers at South Union. Virtually unchanged since 1820, the house remained in the Felts family until 1980. During the summer of 1980, the house was moved from its original location to the Kentucky Museum on Western Kentucky University's campus.

Mr. Brigl and the museum staff have been working toward restoration of the building's exterior and interior for use as a "hands-on" exhibit demonstrating rural Kentucky lifestyles of 1830 and 1930.


