#### Interesting Notes On The First Quarter

Three pupils made the Blue Letter standard (176 points and above); all three are in the 8-A grade.

Fifteen pupils made the Orange Letter standard (151-175 points). Eleven are 8-A pupils; one an 8-B; two are 7-A pupils and

one a 7-B pupil.

Forty-seven pupils made the Honorable Mention standard (125-150 points). Seventeen of these are 8-A pupils; fifteen are 8-B pupils; six are 7-A pupils, and nine are 7-B pupils.

Thus, sixty-five pupils in Junior High attained Honor standards this first quarter.

Of course, it is to be remembered that the Honors are decided at the end of each term; hence, many more pupils will probably show increasing Pep in their activities at Junior

High the second quarter.

Many pupils will be interested in Citizenship and Banking the second quarter and the credits they achieve in these activities will help to bring the average score of the two quarters, or term credit score, within some one of the honor standards.

Another interesting feature of the First

Quarter's results has to do with Pepper

loyalty.

306 pupils in Junior High were "bona fide" (paid up in full for the quarter) pep-

Of this number, 64 are 8-A pupils; 85 are 8-B pupils; 59 are 7-A pupils, and 98 are

7-B pupils.

The 8-As lead with 80%; the 7-Bs are next with 71%; the 7-As are next with 65%, the 8-Bs are last with 59%.

A third interesting detail concerns attendance credits. 343 pupils out of 460 received attendance credits the first quarter.

Of these, 211 received A credit, that is, were present every day without being tardy. The remaining 132 received B credit, that is, did not have more than three instances of absence or tardiness checked against them during the quarter (for which satisfactory excuses had been filed in the office).
