





## Group Urges Special Session

Association, in session here yester-day, adopted a resolution urging Gov. Earle Clements to call a special session of the General Assembly in order that more money may be appropriated for public education.

Similar action was taken by the First District PTA, which met at Murray State College.

The resolution asked that the General Assembly allot another \$10,000,-000 a year for schools. During the recent legislative session, \$24,500,000 was set aside for the common school fund during each year of the 1950-52 biennium.

A telegram sent to Governor Cle-ments by the Third District Association charged that schools are faced with a grave emergency due to lack of sufficient funds, that transporta-tion facilities are inadequate and outmoded, that teaching materials and equipment are sorely needed and that buildings are needed to relieve "desperately overcrowded"


- 1. Teacher must come from a school which a Congress Parent-Teacher unit where dues to National, State and District are paid in full.
- Teachers eligible are those who, by taking an eight weeks summer course at Western State College, would be able to secure their Provisional Elementary Certificate.
   Personality scholastic standing physical and march fitteen standing physical and march fitteen.
- Personality, scholastic standing, physical and moral fitness record of successful teaching shall be a basis for the award.
- 4. In addition to the above points, the committee making the award shall consider the financial need of the applicant.
- 5. All information received by the committee shall be held in strict confidence.
- 6. The committee shall be chosen and approved by Third District Board of Managers and shall be made up of five members. Two shall be Parent-Teacher people, one a member of Western's faculty, one a superintendent of schools (either county or city whose district has no applicant) and one person who is accustomed to selecting and directing personnel.
- Interested teachers should write a letter of application to Mrs. C. D. Watson, Chairman Teacher Recruitment, Third District, 800 Parkway, Bowling Green, Kentucky. An application blank will be mailed to the applicant.
- Judging will be done my numbers with names of applicants detached from all information received, and placed on file with number corresponding to number on the remainder of the application.
- 9. The decision of the committee shall be final.





### Cub Scout Pack Schedules Annual Picnic Saturday


