BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

James Davis Hines (1838-1911) was born in Bowling Green, Kentucky, the son of James Davis Hines, Sr. (1805-1846) and Elizabeth Margaret (Davis) Hines (1806-1890). He was educated in the Bowling Green schools; entered the Confederate army in 1861; served in General John Hunt Morgan's cavalry; and was captured and imprisoned at Camp Douglas, Illinois, but later escaped and rejoined his old command.

Hines married Harriet "Hallie" Briggs Thomas (1843-1910) on 22 February 1866. Their children included Harold Kemble (1866-1926), who married Eleanor V. Bancroft; Samuel Davis (1868-1932), who married Josephine Underwood; Elvira Morehead (1870-1900), who married Walter Boyd Gaines; Elizabeth Davis (1876-1955), who married John Barret Rodes; and Ida Thomas (1877-1965), who married Hughes Waller.

When Hines returned to Bowling Green after the war, he held public office for thirty years, serving as circuit court clerk for eighteen years, as sheriff for four years, as master commissioner of the Warren Circuit Court, as city collector, and as city treasurer. Hines was active in the establishment of the Bowling Green public school system and served on the first school board for the public schools. He also assisted in the establishment of Potter College.

COLLECTION NOTE

Three account books comprise the collection. One account book's entries date from 1858 to 1866 and contain records of employees' work. Another account book, apparently of a general store, dates from 1858 to 1862, but also contains listing of wages paid for cutting crossties. The final account book has entries for around the 1873 period and 1907, with the data pertaining chiefly to general store accounts.
