Gentlemen:

Captain Davis advises me that, in making out his account against the Western Kentucky State Teachers' College, he reduced his fee of 2% to a fraction over 1% of the cost of the preliminary plans for the improvements under consideration. He also advises me that he feels it is unfair for the Board to ask that he make any further concession. However, he is willing to accept a cash payment of one-half. of his account and defer the payment of the balance for a period of one year. The model out

If you clients wish to settle on this basis, please advise us immediately. He insists that we press his suit for trial and is unwilling to delay the matter for any length of time. hen the sea hack machiner

I am convinced that a jury would not look with favor on the defense of the Board that his employment was entirely contingent on a loan being made by the United States Government for the completion of the improvements which his proposed plans covered. The fee he has charged is less than that customarily charged by architects for similar services and if it were intended that his fee was to be contingent, certainly it would have been more than that ordinarily charged by architects for similar services.

As I understand it, your clients insist that Captain Davis agreed to render the services required of him and that he was in no event to be paid more than the fees usually charged by an architect and that this was contingent on a loan being procured from the United States Government. This is not in accordance with the customary understanding of a contingent fee, such a fee usually being much higher than a fee certain. Captain Davis advises me, and other architects support him, that the fee he is charging your clients is less than that customarily charged. This would seem to be rather weighty evidence in against his employment being on a contingent basis.
