MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF REGENTS WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY August 22, 1969

The Board of Regents of Western Kentucky University convened in a regular meeting in the Regents Conference Room of the Administration Building on the campus of the University on Friday, August 22, 1969, at 1 p.m., CDT. Chairman Wendell P. Butler presided.

The meeting opened with a prayer of invocation by Dr. Raymond

L. Cravens, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the Faculities.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on July 8, 1969, were presented by the chairman. Dr. Gilbert moved that the minutes be adopted without a reading inasmuch as each member had been previously provided with a copy and they were found to be in order. The motion was seconded by Dr. McCormack and carried unanimously.

Mr. Keen, chairman of the Executive Committee, read the following report:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE
BOARD OF REGENTS OF WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY
AUGUST 22, 1969

Following the resignation of President Kelly Thompson on May 21, 1969, the Executive Committee was requested by the Board of Regents (meeting of June 11) to serve as a special committee for the purpose of reviewing applications, recommendations, and suggestions regarding the appointment of a new president and to present to the Board such information that might be helpful to the Board in making its final decision.

The Executive Committee has devoted much time and effort to its assignment and feels that for the purpose of carrying out its instructions from the Board, as well as for rendering its best service to the University, it should at this time present a specific recommendation.

The committee, in arriving at this decision, has had the advantage of consulting with the Faculty Advisory Committee, the Alumni Advisory Committee, the Student Advisory Committee, and innumerable individuals who have given their opinions and suggestions. The committee's own personal analysis of the situation and comments and reactions by individual Board members have quite naturally had much effect on the committee's deliberations.

The result of the committee's efforts is the presentation to you at this time of the nomination of a person whom the committee considers to be most outstanding to serve as the fourth president of Western, with the recommendation being presented in the form of a motion for his appointment. If for any reason the Board of Regents should not act affirmatively on the motion, the committee stands ready to bring to the Board of Regents the name of all individuals who have been considered, or any number of them, and at any time that the Board should designate. It is the unanimous

opinion of the committee, however, that affirmative action on this proposal at this time is in the best interest of the University.

It is our considered judgment that the person recommended by this committee has a thorough knowledge of and appreciation for the ever-demanding needs for Western's academic advancement, a deep understanding of the problems associated with the overall development of the University, and is excellently prepared in both knowledge and experience in fiscal management. He has, over a long period of time, demonstrated dedication to Western; and his integrity is beyond question. Because of these attributes, and many others, we have complete confidence that he will be given broad support and enthusiastic acceptance by the many publics of the University.

We, therefore, submit to you the name of Dero G. Downing, presently Vice President for Administrative Affairs and Dean of Business Affairs at Western. Mr. Chairman, I move that Mr. Dero G. Downing be appointed to the presidency of Western for a term of four years, succeeding Dr. Kelly Thompson, effective September 12, 1969, and that his salary for the coming school year be set at \$33,500.

At this point in the meeting, Mr. Downing asked to be excused.

Mr. Keen's motion was seconded by Dr. McCormack.

In the discussion which followed, Chairman Butler expressed his "wholehearted concurrence" in the recommendation of the Executive Committee and cited reasons why he believed that "time would speak well" for Mr. Downing. Dr. Shadowen stated that he felt it was "unfortunate that the Executive Committee did not give close scrutiny to other applicants and interview more candidates." He said that this feeling, which was shared by some others on the faculty, should not be construed as a criticism of Mr. Downing; but if more interviews had been held and Mr. Downing was still the choice, then it would have made him a stronger president. Each member of the Executive Committee responded to Dr. Shadowen's statement.

Upon a call of the roll, the vote was as follows:

Mr. Downing was escorted back into the meeting and was told by Chairman Butler of his appointment to the presidency of Western. Following congratulations, he made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Board of Regents:

Needless to say, I find it extremely difficult to express adequately my feelings at this time. As hard as I might try, I know that I will not be able to find the appropriate words.

First, let me simply say that I look upon the action which you have taken as a vote of confidence for which I am genuinely grateful.

I accept the appointment with the feeling of being honored, certainly, and look upon it as a challenge. I share with all of you and with every one everywhere sincere regret and deep disappointment in the resignation of President Thompson. All of us know that he can never be replaced.

I think you know also that Western is an institution which, in many ways, has been abundantly blessed. We have many rich traditions at Western of everlasting value which must be preserved.

Western has a competent and well-qualified faculty under the tremendous and outstanding leadership of the greatest vice president for academic affairs in the whole United States, Dr. Raymond Cravens. We have an administrative staff who are also competent. The faculty and the administrative staff have demonstrated that they can coordinate their efforts in the successful attainment of worthwhile endeavors, and I am confident that they will continue to do so. We have a student body of which any institution in the country would be very proud, and the students take a genuine pride in their school. The alumni of Western are the most faithful, loyal, and interested of any institution in the country, and we have friends across the state of Kentucky and throughout the nation whose support and continued friendship we value so much.

All of these are elements which, under the leadership of President Thompson, have been combined to provide at Western ever-improving educational opportunities for greatly increased numbers of students who are choosing Western for the continuation of their education.

I want to say to each member of this Board individually and to the Board of Regents as the chief policy-making body of this institution that I am deeply grateful for the confidence which you have shown in me. I want to pledge to you and to everyone who is interested in the welfare of Western that I will do the very best of which I am capable.

It will simply be my prayer that I might have the strength of body, the clearness of mind, and the soundness of judgment

to be effective in this important position. I hope that I can serve in a manner that will prove deserving of your confidence.

In President Thompson's remarks, he expressed complete confidence in Mr. Downing and commended the Board upon its excellent choice, stating that "Western will go upward and forward under his leadership."

Other items on the agenda were as follows:

President Thompson explained the procedure that is followed in the acceptance of recommendations regarding the naming of buildings. He recommended that the Laboratory School, which will be opened with the beginning of the 1969 fall semester, be named the Jones-Jaggers Laboratory School in honor of two men who served Western well: Dr. Lee Francis Jones, who served as head of the Department of Education from 1931 until his retirement in 1959, and Dr. Craddock H. Jaggers, who served from 1938 until 1956 as director of the Training School and as head of the Department of Psychology from 1956 until his retirement in 1960.

Dr. McCormack moved for approval of Dr. Thompson's recommendation. The motion was seconded by Mr. Poland and, following discussion, carried unanimously.

A resolution was presented by the chairman relative to the purchase by the University of real estate. After discussion and upon the recommendation of the President, Dr. Gilbert moved the adoption of the following:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, it has been determined that additional land purchases are desirable for the orderly expansion, development, and operation of Western Kentucky University; and

WHEREAS, certain tracts of land with improvements, located at 1576 Normal Drive (known as the Ivan Wilson property) and 1662 Normal Drive (known as the John Clements property) and owned by the College Heights Foundation, Inc., have special significance for academic purposes in relation to the continuing development and operation of Western Kentucky University; and

WHEREAS, said land should, in the judgment of this Board of Regents, pursuant to its duties and functions set out in KRS Chapter 164, be acquired, developed, and maintained for University purposes.

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby determined that the subject land is needed and should be acquired for University purposes; and President Kelly Thompson and his delegated representatives are authorized to submit to the Commissioner of Finance,

Commonwealth of Kentucky, a request to purchase said land for the use and benefit of Western Kentucky University, provided it can be purchased at a price agreeable to the University and within the scope of such appraisals as are required by the Commission of Finance.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Embry; and upon a call of the roll, the vote was as follows:

A series of recommendations to the President from the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the Faculties--the result of studies, conferences, etc., with the Council of Deans, the Academic Council, department heads, and the President--were presented for the consideration of the Board. The recommendations follow:

- 1. Implementation of a graduate major in German under the Master of Arts in Education degree, effective September 1, 1969. Students completing this major would be fully qualified for the Kentucky standard high school teaching certificate.
- 2. Development of an Associate Degree program in Dental Hygiene within the College of Applied Arts and Health Programs. It is anticipated that the first students would be accepted into this program during the coming school year and that full implementation should be possible by the 1970 fall semester.
- 3. Reorganization of staff functions and responsibilities under the purview of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, which would create three assistant deanships and a directorship, as follows:

Assistant Dean for Special Instructional Programs-Mr. Paul B. Cook. (Mr. Cook would retain position as Director of Bowling Green Community College.)

Assistant Dean for Faculty Programs--Dr. Carl Chelf

Assistant Dean for Student Scholastic Development-Dr. Ronnie Sutton. (Dr. Sutton would retain position as Director of Admissions.)

Director of Undergraduate Advisement--Dr. Jerry Wilder

4. Creation of assistant deanship in the Bowling Green College of Commerce and the naming of a head for the Department of Business Administration, as follows:

Assistant Dean, College of Commerce--Mr. Robt. Oppitz

Head, Department of Business Administration--Dr. Charles Hays

It is also recommended that Dr. Glen Lange's administrative designation be changed from Acting Head to Head of the Department of Accounting. Dr. Lange received his doctorate in accounting on April 1, 1969.

5. Naming of academic directorships within the College of Education, as follows:

Director of Educational Research-Dr. Norman Ehresman

Director of School Administration Programs--Dr. Victor J. Christenson

Assistant Director of University High School--Mr. Bobby G. Houk

After full discussion and upon the recommendation of Dr. Thompson, Dr. Embry moved for approval of the recommendations as outlined above.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Ross, and the roll call vote was as follows:
