

TONIGHT'S CONTEST FIRST OF FOUR HOME GAMES; SEASON TICKETS ON SALE; MIDDLE TENNESSEE NEXT HOME FOE.

Coach Nick Denes and his 1962 Hilltoppers open the home football campaign tonight against the Southeast Missouri State College Indians from Cape Girardeau.

Season tickets for the four Hilltopper home games are now on sale. Reserved seat tickets are priced at \$5.00 in SECTION D in the center of the stadium and season tickets for all other stadium seats are priced at \$3.00.

The remaining seven games on the Topper schedule will be with Ohio Valley Conference foes. Next week the Hilltoppers begin the long, hard struggle for the OVC crown at Johnson City, Tenn., against the East Tennessee State College Buccaneers. The following Saturday, September 29, the Toppers return home for a night game with Middle Tennessee.

On Saturday, October 6, Western will play its first afternoon game at home when they host Austin Peay. This should be one of the most colorful games of the season which is highlighted by the gala High School Band Day and the annual YMCA Cheerleaders Clinic.

The Hilltoppers then travel to Cookeville, Tenn., to battle the Tennessee Tech Golden Eagles, on Oct. 13.


The big day of the season, so far as Western home fans are concerned, is scheduled for Saturday, October, 27. The HOMECOMING battle against Eastern Kentucky. Game time is 2:00 p.m.

The Hilltoppers wind up the season with a pair of away games, one with Morehead State College and the finale with traditional rival, Murray State College.

HILLTOPPER COACHES



NICK DENES

The affable Nick Denes heads the Hilltopper football coaching staff this year for the sixth consecutive season. Voted Ohio Valley 'Coach of the Year' honors in 1961, Denes is now in his 33 year in the coaching profession. He piloted his 1961 team up the ladder to grab sole possession of third place in the rugged OVC after a pre-season poll of conference coaches picked the Hillspacer to finish the OVC after the over the finish that the over the finish is the over the finish that the over picked the Hilltoppers to finish in the OVC cellar for the second straight

The 6-3 overall record compiled by the Toppers last year is the best record for a Western football team since 1954, and the best record for Coach Denes during his five years at the college. The venerable coach now has a

22-21-2 record for his five-year reign on the Western campus.

Before coming to Western, Denes guided Louisville Male High School to the state championship in 1951 and was named 'Coach of the Year.' Denes also grabbed seven state track crowns while at Male, served as line coach on two more

championship football squads, and led his 1936 Corbin basketball team to the state title.

A graduate of the University of Illinois in 1929, Denes has a great high school record behind him, an over-all record in athletics of 462 victories, 146 losses, and 10 ties, and a superalitive 1961 football season at Western, Denes looks forward to another highly successful season this year.

Serving as line coach of Hilltopper teams since 1948 has been the popular Frank Griffin. A talented end himself on Western football teams in the years just preceding World War II, Griffin is a native of Ashland. He joined the Western staff in 1946 as trainer, following a five-year tour of duty with the U.S. Navy, and was elevated to his present position two vears later.

A real task-master who drives his linemen hard, Griffin demands, and gets, hard work from his men. The tough conditioning pays off, though,

as the Hilltoppers are the first to admit.

Another major coaching area for Griffin is intercollegiate golf, with his Western teams always serious contenders for the OVC title year after year.



FRANK GRIFFIN



A Bowling Green native, backfield coach Turner Elrod is one of the outstanding sports alumni of Western Kentucky. From 1927 until 1930 Elrod was a triple threat at Western, lettering in football, basketball, and baseball. Prior to joining the Western coaching staff in 1949, Elrod coached high school athletics in the state for many years.

An advocate of strong defensive play, Elrod drills his men well in fundamentals. He is a strict disciplinarian, yet is respected and well liked by the men he coaches.

TURNER ELROD

A Little All-America quarterback at Western during the 1952 season, Jim Feix was named to the post of quarterback coach of his former team in 1958. During the 1957 season while completing requirements for the M. A. degree, Feix served as a student assistant. While a member of Hilltopper teams himself, Feix ranked among the top passers in the nation during both his junior and senior years. He gained national recognition for his quarterbacking of Western's Refrigerator Bowl champions in 1952.

Feix uses his own past quarterbacking experiences to advantage in coaching the Hilltoppers. A friendly, engaging person, he is one of the most popular members of the Western coaching staff.

A native of Henderson, Feix served as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force from 1953 until 1957 when he returned to Western to begin graduate work.

WESTERN KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE

Tradition wealthy Western, located on the crest of the big hill, overlooks the city of Bowling Green, Kentucky, with (concentrated population of 32,000) and a fringe population of several thousand more. The central portion of the campus, known as College Heights, commands an impressive view of the Barren River Valley and surrounding hills. Embracing an area of 141 acres, the college campus has thirty-one beautiful buildings. A farm of 65 acres adjoining the campus provides instructional facilities in agriculture; another farm of 600 acres is maintained for production and research purposes.

Rich in local and state history, Bowling Green was an important center in the early settlement of the western part of the state. In 1861, first year of the Civil War, General Albert Sidney Johnston established headquarters here for the Confederate Army of the West. A battle was fought in Bowling Green, and the city was for a short time the Confederate capital of Kentucky.

The Fort, spawned by General Johnston, was later occupied and held by Union troops. Among its commanders was General Benjamin Harrison, who later became the twenty-third President of the United States. The Fort, now preserved and incorporated into the carefully planned landscape of the campus, remains a highly valued and treasured memorial in the midst of the college grounds.


Conceived in 1906 for the sole purpose of teacher training, Western now offers three undergraduate degrees and the master's degree with course offerings in twenty-four different departments. On June 1, 1961, the Graduate Division began offering graduate curriculla leading to advanced certificates for teachers and school leaders based upon the twenty-four hours beyond the master's degree. In addition, pre-professional work leading to entrance in professional and technical colleges for advanced study is also offered.

Now with an enrollment of more than 5,000 students, Western as a co-educational institution, is in the midst of the greatest building program in the history of the college. A six-story dormitory, presently the tallest building in the city, was occupied by women at the beginning of the fall term, and plans for an additional 11-story "skyscraper" dormitory for men and another four-story dormitory for women are well underway. Now under construction is the \$2.9 million dollar Academic-Athletic Building, which will house the E. A. Diddle Arena with a maximum seating capacity of 13,000, plus a smaller gymnasium, swimming pool, thirty master classrooms, and a portable stage. Scheduled for completion by September, 1963, the edifice will be one of the largest of its type in the United States.

The Western stadium, located in a natural setting on the east side of the campus, has a seating capacity of 5,500. Crowned by a majestic colennade at the top of the stadium, the football arena is one of the most striking attractions on the Western campus.

In addition to football, a complete schedule of intercollegiate athletics is played in basket-ball, baseball, track, tennis and golf at Western.





'SKYSCRAPER' MEN'S DORMITORY



WESTERN'S NEW 11-STORY MEN'S DORMITORY now under construction on the old football practice field will be the tallest building in Southern Kentucky and will be built of re-inforced concrete and finished in colonial brick. The contract for its construction was awarded to the Robert C. Crouch Company, Memphis, Tenn., the low bidder with a total construction bid of \$1,197,700. The huge structure will contain bedroom space for 410 men, apartments for the director and assistant director, central elevator service, all necessary supporting auxiliary space and will be fully air-conditioned.

Estimated total cost of the edifice is \$1,300,000. This cost is to include furn shings, landscaping and planting, walkways and utility facilities along with last-minute pre-occupancy details which may come under the catagory of necessities. Frank Cain, Bowling Green, and Ben Johnson, Owensboro, are the architects.

The dormitory will serve as an anchor for future buildings to be constructed around the eastern sector of the campus in the same architectural motiff.

SIX-STORY RESIDENCE HALL FOR WOMEN



Another progressive step in Western's building program was culminated this year with the completion in August of a new six-story residence hall for women and its occupancy by 404 students at the opening of the fall term. The new \$1,284,400 dormitory, a brick and stone structure, is the first of three women's residence halls planned for construction between the Kentucky Building and the college heating plant.

The six story dormitory will serve as the anchor for three sides of a quadrangle, the fourth side being left open to the Russellville Road. Eventually located at right angles to the six-story dormitory will be two smaller, four-story dorms, each of which will house 200 women students.





Fall Semester '62 Classes Begin Week of Sept. 17th




