

WESTERN KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE

Overlooking the city of Bowling Green (population 32,000), Western Kentucky State College is located on the crest of a beautiful hill in the southern part if the city. An impressive view of the Barren River Valley and surrounding hills can be seen from the central portion of the campus, known as College Heights. Located on 141 rolling acres, Western has long been recognized as one of the most beautiful college campuses in the nation. A 555-acre farm is maintained for production and research purposes and provides instructional facilities in agriculture.

Bowling Green, rich in local and state history, is an important cultural educational center for southcentral Kentucky. The city has served as the county seat of Warren County since 1797, and was important in the early settlement of western Kentucky.

General Albert Sidney Johnston established headquarters here for the Confederate Army of the West in 1861. For a short time Bowling Green was a Civil War battleground and served as the Confederate capital of Kentucky.

At the apex of the hill, the fort constructed by General Johnston is now an integral part of the landscape of the campus. It is a highly valued and treasured memorial to the important part played by the area in the Civil War.

When the college was founded in 1906, Dr. Henry Hardin Cherry became its first president. It was then known as Western Kentucky State Normal School. The college was transferred to its present location in 1911. Conceived for the sole purpose of teacher training, Western, now offers four undergraduate degrees and two graduate degrees with course offerings in 28 departments. Western has graduate curricula leading to advanced certificates for teachers and school leaders beyond the masters degree, and a recently installed program in engineeding physics.


Western has now organized into five separate colleges, the Potter College of Liberal Arts; the Ogden College of Science and Technology; the College of Education; the Bowling Green College of Commerce and the Graduate School.

Western also offers two year Associate of Arts degrees in certain areas within the college. The College offers the Associates of Arts program in agriculture, industrial technology, small business management, and secretarial science. Also an Associate of Art degree is offered in Nursing which leads to certification as a Registered Nurse.

Western is currently in the midst of the greatest building program in its history. Now under construction are three nine story dormitories and a new five story classroom building, which will house the College of Commerce and College of Education.

Just completed and ready for use this fall are a reconstructed and enlarged Paul L. Garrett Student Center and the new Margie Helm Library.

Plans for the immediate future call for a new Athletic Complex, which is to be built adjacent to the present Academic-Athletic Building, a new administration building, and a new science complex.







MEET THE HILLTOPPER COACHING STAFF



NICK DENES

Head Coach Nick Denes has twice been voted the Ohio Valley Conference "Coach of the Year" Award, first in 1961, when he paced Western to a third place finish after his team had been picked to rank dead last. He won the honor again in 1963 when he and his Hilltoppers finished the season undefeated winning the OVC crown and romping past the Coast Guard Academy 27-0 in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Florida. In eight seasons Denes' Hilltopper teams have won 43, lost 27 and tied 4. His overall coaching record, including all sports both high school and college, over a 35-year career, stands at an amazing 483 victories matched against just 149 defeats and 12 ties

Offensive backfield coach Jimmie Feix was one of Western's all-time great quarterbacks. He was selected to the Little All-America team in 1952. He led Western to a 9-2 season that year that included a 34-19 triumph over Arkansas State in the Refrigerator Bowl at Evansville, Ind. After a serious injury cut short his career with the New York Giants, he returned to Western in 1957 after four years of service as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force.

While at Western, defensive backfield coach Turner Elrod was one of the finest allaround athletes in the school's history. He starred in football, basketball and baseball for the Hilltoppers from 1927 through 1931. Before coming to Western he was coach and athletic director at Barrett High in Henderson, Ky. Elrod has done the majority of scouting opponents for many years and his accurate and informative reports have played no small part in the Hilltoppers success.


The newcomer to the Western coaching staff is Joe Bugel. Bugel will serve as line coach replacing Frank Griffin who left the staff to devote full time to his physical education duties.

Bugel was a standout on Western's 1963 Tangerine Bowl champions. His fine play earned him the OVC's No. 1 guard by the vote of the league's coaches. Joe brings to his new post his exuberant enthusiasm and desire for excellence and has shown ability to instill these same traits in his players.


