WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

Western Kentucky University was established by an act of the Legislature of Kentucky in 1906. Originally created for the sole purpose of training teachers for the elementary and secondary schools of Kentucky, Western has steadily increased the scope of its academic programs to meet the expanding needs of its students.

Designated as a university by the Kentucky General Assembly on February 6, 1966, Western now consists of seven colleges: The Bowling Green College of Commerce, The College of Applied Arts and Health, The College of Education, The Ogden College of Science and Technology, The Potter College of Liberal Arts, The Graduate College, and The Community College.



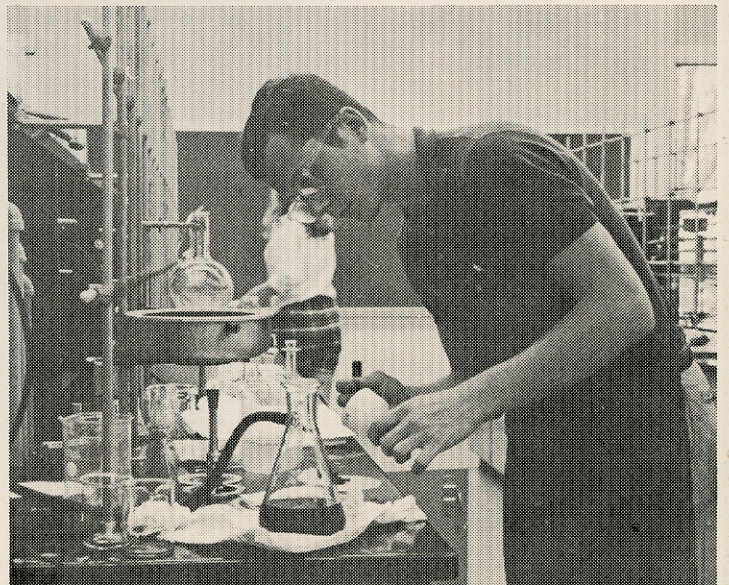
The University now offers four four-year undergraduate degrees, two two-year undergraduate degrees, and eleven graduate degrees, with course offerings in thirty-five different departments. Western's enrollment has been at about 11,000 students for the past three years. That figure does not include students in the Jones-Jaggers Laboratory School or students enrolled in extension classes conducted away from the campus.

Fifteen years ago the University's physical plant consisted of twenty major buildings on a campus of 128 acres, with a total value of \$10,000,000. The campus now is composed of 185 acres containing 62 buildings with a total value of more than \$94,000,000.

The Raymond Cravens Graduate Center and Humanities Library and Pearce-Ford Tower (a 27-story men's dormitory) went into use for the first time this year. The Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts is currently under construction on the site of the former football stadium.

Plans are well underway for a commercially-developed area of married student housing and an environmental sciences building.

Western's campus is recognized as one of the most beautiful in the nation and is crowned by a commanding hill from which Hilltopper athletic teams derive their nickname. It affords a view of the University from almost any approach to the city of Bowling Green, a community of approximately 36,000 people.

The Athletic Director JOHN OLDHAM

Johnny Oldham became Western Kentucky University's director of athletics last summer after seven years of leading the Hilltoppers to some of their finest hours in sports as head basketball coach. He paced Western's basketballers to four regular season Ohio Valley Conference championships, four holiday tournament titles, five trips to national post-season tournaments, and an overall record of 146 wins against only 41 losses.

He climaxed his coaching stint at Western last year by guiding the Hilltoppers to a 24-6 record and a third-place finish in the NCAA Tournament finals at Houston. He was named the OVC "Coach of the Year" for the fourth time and won the same honor for NCAA District 3, both by vote of his fellow coaches.

A Hilltopper basketball All-American in 1949, Oldham played two years of professional basketball with the Ft. Wayne Pistons of the NBA, then coached at Western's College High School before going to Tennessee Tech as head coach in 1955. He led the Eagles to at least a share of the OVC title three times, winning 118 and losing 83, giving him a career coaching total of 264 victories against just 124 losses, one of the finest records in the nation.

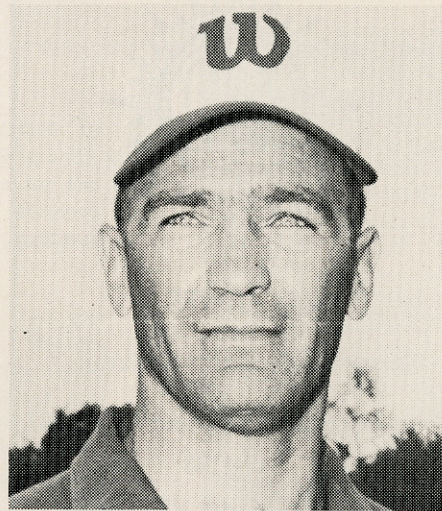

THE HEAD COACH



JIMMY FEIX

After serving eleven years as offensive coach under Nick Denes, Jimmy Feix took the Hilltopper helm from his former boss in 1968. In three seasons he has compiled 7-2-1, 6-3-1 and 8-1-1 records, good for two second-place finishes and a championship in the tough Ohio Valley Conference.

An outstanding player in his own right, Feix led Western to some of its greatest seasons ever (1949-52). His playing career was climaxed with his selection as Western's first football Little All-American in 1952 after quarterbacking the Hilltoppers to a tie for the OVC title. He added a win in the Refrigerator Bowl to Western's wreath of laurels that year when he led the 'Toppers past Arkansas State to boost the school's season record to 9-1.

In the process, Feix earned for himself a trial with the New York Giants of the National Football League. As a pro, he was impressive in early drills and seemed ticketed to understudy then All-Pro Charlie Conerly until a serious injury ended his career.

Feix still holds the OVC pass completion percentage record with a mark of .631. In addition, he still owns four of Western's individual records for passing and total offense. He held seventeen other individual records until they were broken by Johnny Vance in 1969.

Feix's teams have become known for an innovative offense that makes best use of available personnel, a rock-ribbed defense that ranks eighteenth in the nation against scoring over the past five years, and a competitive spirit and zeal second to none.

Who says a guy can't major in Home Ec? Better yet, who would try to get in the way of two football players even if that is their chosen major?

That's right. Two he-men in Home Economics, when most would pass.

Junior offensive end, Tom Turner, and quarterback John Hreben are like more and more men everywhere, however, who are finding Institution Administration (more popularly called Food Service Administration) a whole new ball game in career opportunities.

Both are majors in the area along with eight other male students at Western. Ironically, there is not a single woman majoring in this area.

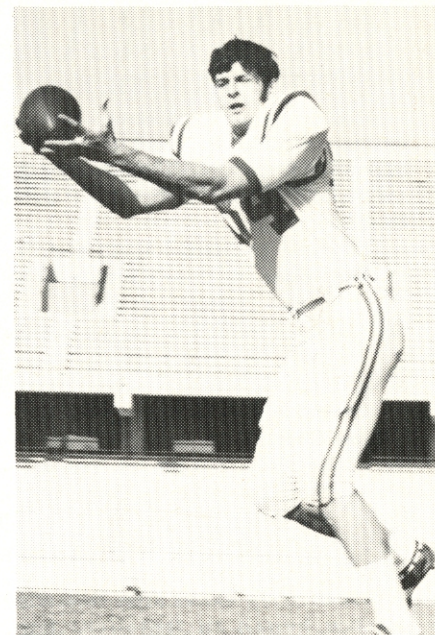
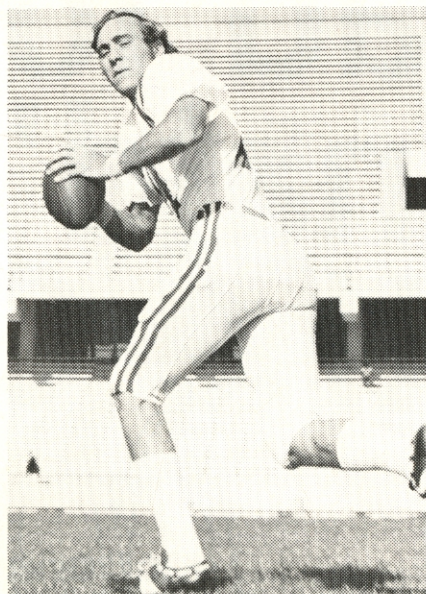
The University's Institution Administration Program is coordinated by Dr. Elizabeth M. Elbert of the Department of Home Economics and Family Living and offers courses in both the cooking and managing aspects of the field.

The field was once dominated by the fair sex. But not anymore. The specialty of food service administration in food establishments can be a rewarding career with promise of high pay. Western's Institution Administration program began last year with six majors--all male.

Turner, a quiet 6-5 giant is a native of Clarksville, Ind. He's played an important part in the 'Toppers' success during the last few years catching 25 passes for 313 yards and seven touchdowns prior to last Saturday's game. His reason for taking up Institution Administration is self explanatory. His father is a restaurant owner and young Tom is interested in getting into the field.

Hreben, though, is a different story. His father doesn't own a restaurant in his Rossford, Ohio hometown, he's more interested in the opportunities that are open in the field. Hreben, sometimes known as "The Fakeman", has been a



substitute for the Hilltoppers during the last couple of years but has logged considerable playing time already this season. The blond haired 6-0, 170 pound junior hopes to go into the managerial aspect of the program after graduating.

Still wonder why food service management would intrigue a male, sportsman or otherwise?

Maybe sophomore Erwin Hartel from Wimbledon, Eng., a cross country and track performer at Western, has one answer. A potential major in Institution Administration, he explains what caught his interest. "I like good food -- and people eat so badly these days!"

FANS RALLY TO BLIND CAGER'S AID

Anyone who mistakenly thinks a college athlete is quickly forgotten and neglected when his usefulness is exhausted should hear about James Speed.

Jim came to the University of Iowa in September, 1970, as a highly-publicized junior college basketball star. He had been named to the all-California JC team the two previous seasons at Imperial Valley, averaging 23 points and 20 rebounds a game.

Iowa Coach Dick Schultz planned to have the 6-7, 210-pound native of Shreveport, La., take up some of the slack after losing five players from the top six who swept the Hawkeyes to a 14-0 Big Ten record the previous year.

Less than six weeks after basketball practice began in October, James Speed lay permanently blinded in a hospital room. He had been afflicted with a terribly damaging combination of meningitis and sinusitis.

With his sight gone and his world tumbling about his head, Jim found Iowans quickly loosen their purse strings the minute their heart strings are touched.

Basketball fans who had never seen this young man play—had never seen him at all—began mailing in checks for the James Speed fund. It mushroomed as organizations all over the

state staged benefits in his behalf.

By May 1, 1971, the fund had grown to \$14,300. When the news spread, money also was received from people back home in Shreveport, and from those around El Centro, Calif., who had watched him play JC ball.

Although his illness had no connection with athletics, the University of Iowa picked up the tab for Jim's medical bills. The state of Iowa gave him a free training course at its school for the blind in Des Moines.

When he finished there, he planned to return to the University to finish his education. Iowa promised him his scholarship—room, board, books and tuition—would be continued whenever he chose to use it.

Jim's teammates didn't neglect him either. His roommate was Ken Grabinski, junior forward from Clear Lake, Iowa. Ken and the other Hawkeye players arranged around-the-clock shifts to sit with Jim during his feverish illness so he couldn't accidentally harm himself in the hospital.

Experts in ophthalmology and neurology were summoned. They discovered from a spinal tap he had meningitis. But the real culprit was a severe swelling of the ethmoid sinus cavities. His eyes were swelled shut, cutting

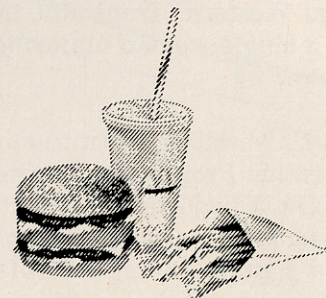
Iowans came to help

off the blood supply to the optic nerve.

Not only did this quickly destroy his eyesight, but his very life was endangered because of pressure on the brain. An emergency operation probably saved him from suffering brain damage.

Jim isn't alone in his darkness. Big-hearted Iowans and others—sight unseen—have forked over \$14,300 to help this unfortunate young man find a pathway to guide him in the years to come.

TWO CONFERENCE LEADERS LOCK HORNS IN HOMECOMING BATTLE

For the first time of the season Western will be coming off a loss and for the second consecutive Saturday, the Hilltoppers will be facing an undefeated opponent when they host Tennessee Tech in a homecoming battle today.

The Golden Eagles from Tennessee Tech had little trouble polishing off East Tennessee, a team Western defeated 36-7 a week earlier, last Saturday for their fourth victory of the season. Already they have matched the number of wins of last season and they can wear the proud title of being the only undefeated team in the Ohio Valley Conference and the State of Tennessee.

Coach Don Wade's Golden Eagles have had little difficulty in their four victories. They defeated West Carolina 27-17, Murray 27-3, UT Martin 10-7, and East Tennessee 20-3. Wade feels that Western should provide the first real test of the season today.

As for Western, they played well enough to win against Eastern Michigan last Saturday--at least as far as statistics are concerned. The Hilltoppers out played their host in almost every aspect of the game, except the final score, losing 17-14. For Coach Jimmy Feix's Hilltoppers, the problem seemed to be that they didn't play well enough quite long enough. The Hurons final touchdown, which led to Western's downfall, came with 1:33 remaining in the hard-fought game.

Offensively, Tennessee Tech will be led today by fullback Jeff Axel, a transfer from Arizona state. The hard-running junior managed just 39 yards in 10 carries against East Tennessee but was keyed on most of the game. One of nine junior college transfers, to compliment a host of return-

ing lettermen, Axel is the spark behind the Golden Eagles' attack.

All-American candidate Jim Youngblood has been living up to his pre-season expectations for Tennessee Tech, defensively. The middle linebacker heads the list of overall season tackles for his team. Last Saturday he came up with 10 individual tackles and 13 assists.

Western, as well as Tennessee Tech, will be trying to remain on top of the conference standings. Western, Tech and Middle Tennessee are all tied for the conference lead, having yet to lose in the OVC.

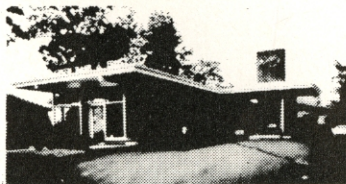
The Hilltoppers feel they will need to eliminate some of the last Saturday's mistakes to beat the Golden Eagles. Western lost the ball six times in that game, four times on interceptions and twice on fumbles.

Again it was the sophomore tailback punch of John Embree and Clarence Jackson that provided the explosiveness and scoring for Western. Embree gave Western an early lead on a 79-yard scamper while Jackson helped the 'Toppers move back into the lead in the third quarter on a 69-yard jaunt.

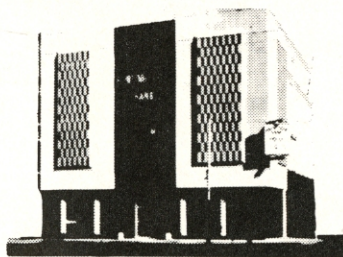
Western's defensive unit, suffering from the loss of All-American candidate Jim Barber, found a solid replacement in sophomore Bob Walton. He had nine tackles and three assists in last Saturday's loss.

Today's game marks the 35th meeting between the two schools and the 42nd homecoming for Western. The Hilltoppers hold a narrow 17-16-1 series edge and have not lost to Tennessee Tech since 1965, when they dropped a 21-14 decision.

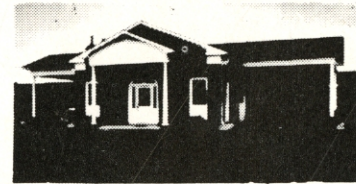

The Academic-Athletic Building No. 2—L. T. Smith Stadium is one of the newer parts of the University's unique central athletic, recreational and physical education complex.

The entire Athletics Complex now consists of a 19,250-seat football Stadium, a track with all-weather surface, a practice field, a baseball field and 11 tennis courts with all-weather surfaces in addition to 13,508-seat E. A. Diddle Arena—home of Western's basketball teams since 1963.

The Academic-Athletic Building No. 2—L. T. Smith Stadium is a multipurpose structure, including 12 classrooms, a two-story gymnastics room and 26 offices in addition to a football dressing room for 80 players, spring sports and visiting dressing rooms for 146 athletes, physical education showers and locker room facilities, public rest rooms, concession stands, equipment rooms, officials' and coaches' dressing rooms, a first aid room and a pressbox with accommodations for nearly 100 persons.

L. T. Smith Stadium is named in honor of the man who devoted much of his life to the development of Western sports, serving the institution as football coach

(1920-21) basketball coach (1921-22) and as chairman of the faculty athletic committee almost continuously from 1922 until his retirement in 1965.

STADIUM INFORMATION

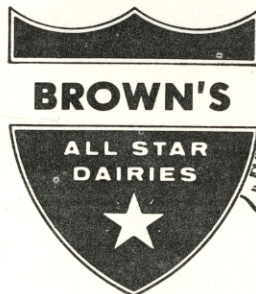
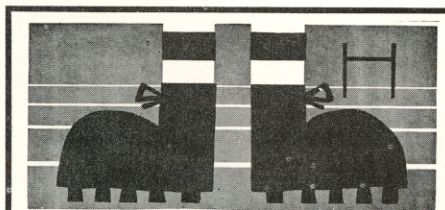

Ohio Valley Conference Enters 24th Season

With the 1971 football season underway, the Ohio Valley Conference enters its 24th athletic season with a colorful past history and a promising future as one of the nation's strongest athletic conferences.

Growth and national recognition have accompanied the OVC since its birth date in 1948. Prior to 1955, only three OVC members had been ranked as major basketball powers, with Western Kentucky receiving six invitations to participate in the National Invitational Tournament in New York. But in 1955, the National Collegiate Athletic Association formally designated the OVC as a major basketball conference, thereby assuring the loop of representation in the NCAA Tournament. In 1965, the OVC had two participants in post-season tournaments: Eastern Kentucky in the NCAA and Western Kentucky in the NIT.

Likewise the OVC has become a respected football power as the caliber of competition and interest rises with each season. Bowl bids are common for the OVC which has participated in the Tangerine Bowl, the Grantland Rice Bowl and the Refrigerator Bowl.

Administrative growth has paralleled the rising progress of its athletic teams. In 1960, presidents of the member colleges expanded a three-man judiciary committee to a seven-member Executive Committee, which still exists.



The evolution of the office of commissioner has been the key to the conference's maturation and organization. The current Ohio Valley Conference commissioner, Arthur L. Guepe, is also the league's first full-time commissioner.

Among Commissioner Guepe's responsibilities is the interpretation and enforcement of conference regulations and eligibility rules, in addition to his publicity and statistical duties.

The Ohio Valley Conference is one of the nation's most cohesive governing bodies of athletics. Continually striving to make improvements in the league's structure, the OVC should continue to grow as it has during the past 23 years.

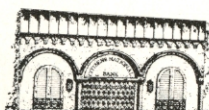
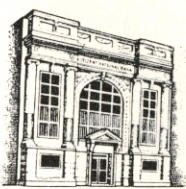
