3 P.M. ANNUAL CHRISTMAS CONCERT. The Western Kentucky University Bowling Green Community Orchestra, under the direction of Benjamin Woodruff, and the Western Choral Union, under the direction of Jim Jones, both of the music faculty, will present the annual Christmas Concert Sunday, Dec. 8, at 3 p.m. in Van Meter Auditorium. There will be no admission charge.

The program will include two works by English composer Ralph Vaughn Williams: the "Fantasia on Christmas Carols" and the Christmas Cantata "Hodie" (This Day).

Soloists for the performance will include Conra Hester, soprano, of 1081 Alder Ave., Louisville; William Miller, tenor, of 6 Colonial Ct., Glasgow; David Gibson, baritone, of 6103 Middlerose, Valley Station; Michael Dunn, baritone, of 714 Hampton Road, Bowling Green; and Al Mallory, treble.

The "Fantasia on Christmas Carols" was completed in 1912 and first performed in Herford Cathedral on Sept. 12 of that year. It is founded on the following

traditional English carols: "The Truth Sent From Above," "Come All You Worthy Gentlemen," "Sussex Carol" ("On Christmas Night"), and "There Is A Fountain."

Fragments from three additional carols: "The First Noel," "The Virgin Unspotted," and "The Wassail Bough" also may be heard in "Fantasia," scored for baritone solo, chorus, orchestra and organ.

An electronic organ is being furnished for the performance by the Allen Quinn Music Company of Owensboro, according to Woodruff.

The radiant Christmas Cantata, "Hodie," was composed some 40 years after the "Fantasia." It was written in 1953 when Vaughn Williams was in his 82nd year, and was first performed in 1954 on Sept. 8 at Worcester Cathedral. In this work, words from the Scriptures are combined with secular poetry. This great variety of text demands a wide variety of musical style and mood, and Vaughn Williams ably meets this demand with a lifetime's experience, says Director Woodruff.

The work is scored for soprano, tenor, baritone, and treble soloists, chorus, orchestra and organ.
