12:30 p.m. WORKSHOPS. Western Kentucky University begins sessions for two workshops which will continue on the campus for the next three weeks.

"Consumer Financial Problems," sponsored jointly by the Departments of Home Economics and Family Living and Business Education and Office Administration, will meet in Room 335 of Grise Hall each day until 3:30 p.m.

Members of the education profession will hear lectures covering insurance, social security and government programs, investments and securities and the stock market, money management, sound use of credit and other topics centered around financial know-how, according to Dr. Peggy Keck who is coordinating the workshop along with Dr. Grace Calloway, both of the Western faculty.

A workshop for high school business teachers in modern data processing gets underway today also in Grise Hall and class meetings each day will run until 3:30 p.m.

Sponsored by the Department of Business Education and Office Administration, the workshop will cover the principles of data processing and will include the use of computer equipment, according to Mrs. Georgia Miller, workshop leader.

1:30 p.m. PRESS TOUR OF KENTUCKY BUILDING EXHIBIT. Area news media representatives, Bowling Green and Warren County civic leaders and members of both state and local Bicentennial Celebration planning committees have been invited to preview "Kentucky -- Aspects of the Commonwealth's Heritage," a specially-prepared exhibit tour, which will open to the public at the Kentucky Building Sunday, July 7.

The approximately half-hour tour in Room 202 at the Kentucky Building will cover subjects ranging from prehistoric Kentucky, Indians and settlements to the coming of the first settlers to the state. The exhibit will feature crafts, textiles, tools, and

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music and also includes special sections on the Shaker religious sect and selective architecture of the state. In celebration of the Commonwealth's Bicentennial, the exhibit, which focuses on "the common man who made Kentucky what it is today," will open to the public Sunday, July 7 from 1 to 4 p.m.

TODAY

1 p.m. - 4 p.m. KENTUCKY EXHIBIT OPENS. A special exhibit, entitled, "Kentucky -- Aspects of the Commonwealth's Heritage," opens to the public today as part of Western Kentucky University's participation in the Commonwealth's Bicentennial Celebration.

The exhibit, which is housed in the Kentucky Building, is based upon the common man, the nameless person who settled in Kentucky and made it what it is today and is open to the public free of charge.

The exhibit features a six-minute slide presentation in a mini-theatre upon entering Room 202 of the museum area. Visitors will then walk through the specially-prepared area and may view subjects ranging from prehistoric Kentucky, Indians and settlements, to the coming of the first Virginia and North Carolina settlers. The exhibit features crafts, textiles, tools and music and also includes special sections on the Shaker religious sect and selective architecture of the State.

The exhibit will remain open during the following weekday and weekend hours:
Monday through Friday: 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Saturdays: 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Sundays: 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

YOUTH MUSIC CLINIC. High school musicians from across the United States will be members of "Summer Youth Music '74," a clinic-camp for outstanding young musicians sponsored by the University Department of Music.

Today begins a week-long session for band students who will meet and study with visiting artists and Western music faculty who will give instruction, sectionals and general music classes.

In charge of the clinic-camp is Dr. Kent Campbell, associate professor of music at Western and a highlight of the week's activities, he has announced, will be a free public performance by these young musicians Saturday at 11 a.m. at the Outdoor Theatre, Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts.

Master conductor for the band clinic will be Joe Barry Mullins, director of bands at the University of Southern Mississippi.

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The workshop also will feature Dale Kelly Love, associate director of bands and director of the "Pride of Mississippi" Marching Band at Southern Mississippi.

Sessions will be held in the Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts.

3 p.m. SPORTS CAMP. Boys and girls ages 10-13 will begin registration for Western Kentucky University Sports Camp which is scheduled at the University through Friday, July 19.

Camp activities will include "majors" in basketball, football, baseball, track and field and athletic student training with "minors" in tennis, golf, marksmanship-archery and weight training. Campers select one sport from the list of "majors" and up to two "minors."

Instruction will be under the supervision of members of Western's coaching staff.

Today begins the session for vocalists who will meet and study with visiting artists and Western music faculty who will give semi-private instruction, sectionals and general music instruction.

In charge of the vocal clinic-camp is Jim Jones, assistant professor of music at Western, and a highlight of the week's activities, he has announced, will be a free public concert given by participants Saturday at 11 a.m. in Recital Hall, Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts.

The students will work with Don Neuen, director of choral programs at the University of Tennessee. He has served as assistant conductor and director of choral programs for the Atlanta Symphony and choral director at the University of Wisconsin.

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TUESDAY

8 a.m. SEMINAR. The Latin American Studies Committee of the Center for Intercultural and Folk Studies at Western will present a series of seminars beginning today on "Changing Latin America."

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Today's seminar features Professors Carmelo Mesa-Lago, specialist in U.S. Latin American relations, and Cole Blasier, specialist in the Cuban Revolution, of the University of Pittsburg discussing "Social Revolution in Latin America and the U.S. Reaction."

The seminar is open to the public without charge and will be held in Grise Hall, Room 335.

2 p.m. SEMINAR. Western, through the International Dimensions Project (COSID), will present "Latin America in the 1970's," a seminar on the social, economic and political problems of Latin America, in the Dero Downing University Center, Room 230.

10 a.m. - 5 p.m. ART EXHIBIT AND SALE. The University will sponsor the exhibit and sale of original graphic art made available by the Ferdinand Roten Galleries of Baltimore.

The event will feature approximately 1,000 original prints by talents such as Picasso, Chagall, Miro, Dali, Goya and Renoir and will be held in the Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts.

Works spanning six centuries will be presented in the show, which will include prints by the old masters and many of today's artists, famous and not yet famous. In addition, there will be a collection of Western and Oriental manuscript pages, some dating to the 13th Century.
