We remember them as we look ack on bomecoming, 1981. It all started in 1906...



Dr. Henry Hardin Cherry 1906-1937

Dr. Henry Hardin Cherry assumed presidential duties at Western in 1906. Already an internationally-known proneer in the field of higher education. specially in teacher training. Dr. Cherry led Western from a small, relatively unknown normal school to a large, widely recognized teachers college.

A college is not its campus, its walks, its buildings," Dr. Cherry once said. "A college is an ideal, a spirit, a long tradition, a zeal for more life and more knowledge."

That statement, in substance has come down through the years to be known as "The Western Spirit." That spirit has remained through the years, and has lifted the college to great heights in meeting an infinite variety of challenges. It was one of many gifts from Western's founder. whose personality influenced the school and left many legends and traditions on the Hill.

Dr. Cherry was a member of the executive committee which organized a statewide campaign for better educational condition memorializing the General Assembly of 1908, which enacted more constructive legislation possibly than any other legislature in the history of the Commonwealth up to that time.

The Student Government Association has established the following policies and requirements for nominating a homecoming queen candidate. Each recognized university student organization and residence hall council shall be eligible to nominate a queen candidate subject to the following requirements.

- 1. A candidate, to be eligible, must be a full time student in good standing with the university, possess a 2.3 GPA if a college grade point average has been earned, and not be on disciplinary probation.
- 2. No more than two organizations, two residence halls, or one residence hall area may jointly sponsor the same candidate.
- 3. Queen candidate registration forms should be submitted with a \$100.00 entry fee (payable to W.K.U. Alumni Association) to the office of Student Activities, Room 326, Downing University Center, no later that 4:00 p.m., October 22, 1997. The entry fee pays for 4 banquet tickets, plaques, and other candidate activity costs.
- 4. The form must contain all requested signatures and information.
- 5. Queen candidates should be able to attend scheduled events. Reasonable exceptions will be made.

The homecoming queen elections will be held in the Downing University Center on Tuesday, October 28, between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Ten finalists will be selected from the election results and announced at Big Red's Roar on Friday, October 31. The finalists will be interviewed by a panel of judges during a brunch on Saturday, November 1 at 8:30 a.m. in the Downing University Center, Room 226. The queen will be announced at half time of the ball game along with the remaining nine finalists.

Cosby named queen of Hill

Senior was Phi Delta Theta candidate

Sitting on a blanket among an assortment of books and notes she was using to study for a World Geography test. Stephanie Cosby was still suffering from shell shock after becoming the new 1998 Homecoming queen.

"Oh my gosh. I didn't know what to do," Cosby said. "I just stood there for a while until somebody told me that they wanted me."

After the second runner-up's name was called, the next place was between two Phi's. Cosby didn't know if it would be the Phi Mu sorority candidate or her, the Phi Delta Theta fraternity candidate. After Jean-Marie Lawson, the Phi Mu candidate, was announced as first runner-up and the winner was about to be named, the Phi Delts started going crazy because they knew Cosby had won,
