Dr. BARRY SHOLLENBERGER Head Coach

Dr. Barry Shollenberger, a veteran of the high school, junior college and college coaching ranks, is in his second year as head coach of the Western Kentucky University baseball program.

The 37-year-old Pennsylvania native came to the Hilltoppers after a one-year stint at Middle Georgia College, where he led the Warriors to a 44-10 record and the Georgia State Junior College Conference championship.

In 1974 and 1975 he was assistant baseball coach at the University of Alabama, where he helped mold the Crimson Tide pitching staff into one of the strongest in the nation. Alabama's staff had a combined earned run average of 2.06, ninth best in the nation, in 1974 and 2.85 in 1975.

He spent five seasons in professional baseball after signing with the Boston Red Sox in 1961. Pitching for Waterloo, Iowa, in 1962, he led the Midwest League in strikeouts with 226, posted the league's lowest ERA at 2.14 and was named the league's Rookie of the Year.

However, he injured his arm in September of that year. After being drafted to the major league roster of the Cincinnati Reds in November, 1962, he advanced as high as San Diego in the Class AAA Pacific Coast League before retiring from pro baseball in August 1965, because of chronic tendonitis.

He received the B.A. degree from Moravian College in 1965, his M.A. degree from Western in 1970, and the Ed.D. degree from the University of

Shollenberger is married to the former Renee Ryals and they have two daughters, Kimberly 12, and Juli, almost 3.

Other experienced returnees include sophomore Ricky Baker (1-3), junior Mark Biven (2-2 with 2 saves), senior Tony Martines (4-2), and senior Mike Riggs (2-0 with 2 saves). All four are righthanders.

"We are very deep in pitching," Shollenberger says, "and all of them are capable of being front-line pitchers. The real question is whether we will have two who will take charge and become our stoppers when we get into conference play."

"Defense was one of our glaring weaknesses last year," Shollenberger

admits, "and I have tried to shore it up by making some personnel changes. The late season improvement of sophomore Mike Murray (who batted .299 and was second in the OVC in stolen bases his freshman season) at shortstop makes us optimistic that this phase of our game will be much improved this season."

A fixture for the Hilltoppers at first base in recent years has been senior tri-captain Terry Tedder, who will be returning for his fourth campaign. An All-OVC selection last year and bona fide All-American candidate, the lefthander led the team with a .359 average last year and set school records in number of hits (55), doubles (11), home runs (7) and runs batted in (41). "And there is no telling how many throwing errors he saves with his glove," Shollenberger adds. The second base position was won outright in the fall by junior college

season there.

Tommy Sapp, an All-State performer while at Middle Georgia College, where he batted .345, could step in at any infield position and is a valuable reserve for the Hilltoppers.

He played his collegiate baseball at Chipola Junior College, Marianna, Fla., which was ranked fifth nationally, before completing his career at the University of Florida, where he led the Southeastern Conference in stolen bases in 1975.

He has also spent two years in the high school coaching ranks at Crestview High School, Crestview, Fla., where he compiled a 37-12 record.

His areas of expertise in assisting Head Coach Barry Shollenberger will be in working with the outfielders and teaching the Hilltoppers the proper techniques of good baserunning.

The 24-year-old native of Russell, Ill., is completing an M.A. degree in Education while at Western and is married to the former Wanda Brunson of Marietta, Fla.

1978 OUTLOOK


"I feel I have learned a lot in my first year of coaching here at Western," Head Baseball Coach Barry Shollenberger says, "and I feel the program here is developing very much to my liking."

After a successful season last year - a "rebuilding" year in which the Hilltoppers established 23 new team and individual records, including most wins ever in a season (20) - Shollenberger feels he has an excellent mixture of veterans and recruits to make Western a serious contender for the Ohio Valley Conference Western Division crown.

"We have a very poised team this year," he adds, "and I am very pleased with the team attitude, the willingness of the players to do what is needed to win."

The Hilltoppers will certainly be tested this season, for in addition to the rugged Conference schedule, they will also be playing four clubs that went to the NCAA playoffs last year: third-place Southern Illinois (the only team to beat NCAA Champion Arizona State), the University of Florida, the University of Miami and Morehead State.

Western will also be taking on NAIA national champion David Lipscomb, as well as Georgia Southern and Florida State, two teams which combined for 74 victories last season.

PITCHING

As a former professional baseball pitcher himself, Shollenberger knows the importance of a strong mound staff.

"Pitching means the difference between a successful and a non-successful season." Shollenberger says, adding that "last year our pitchers were young, but talented. This year we have our top eight pitchers back, as well as several newcomers who fit into our program well."

Among the newcomers are junior college transfers Wayne Denton and Rick Gittens. Denton is a lefthander who played two years at Volunteer State Junior College in Gallatin, Tenn., while Gittens is a righthander from Middle Georgia College. According to Shollenberger, the experience gained by both while at junior college will be invaluable to the Hilltoppers.

Leading the returnees is senior tri-captain Paul Orberson, who had a disappointing 1-4 record last year in pitching Western's "tough" games. An All-OVC performer last year because of his .323 batting average, Orberson, whom Shollenberger rates as potentially the best pitcher on the staff, will concentrate only on his mound work this year.

Another leading returnee is junior Jeff McKinley, a lefthanded fireballer who recorded 58 strikeouts in 47 1/3 innings of work to rank fifth nationally in strikeout ratio. "All Jeff needs to be a really dominating pitcher is more consistency," Shollenberger says.

INFIELD

There are three contenders for the third base slot: transfer Ron Rocco, a native of Pittsburgh, Pa.; junior college transfer Charlie Payne, who was a two-time Tennessee State Junior College Batting Champion at Volunteer State Junior College; and freshman Rene Zarate, who was the leading hitter for Tampa Catholic High School last year - a school ranked among the top 10 prep schools in the nation.

OUTFIELD

"Our outfield will be much stronger, defensively, this year and we will have more overall speed," Shollenberger says.

Frank Hughes, an All-OVC selection last year as a second baseman, returns to his natural position as he moves into leftfield. A very steady player, he made a school record 167 appearances at the plate last year, belting out another school record 11 doubles and finishing with a .311 batting average. The senior tri-captain also won the Golden Glove Award last year as he committed only four errors.

Centerfield will be patrolled by junior college transfer Mike Atwell, whom Shollenberger labels "a prototype centerfielder." An All-State selection while playing at Wabash Valley Junior College in Illinois, Atwell has excellent speed, a strong and accurate throwing arm, and good leadership qualities to go along with a batting average that has consistently hovered around the .400 mark.

Two Hilltoppers are battling for the rightfield position, Jim Atkinson and Leonard Phillips. Atkinson, who held down the thrid base slot last year, is better able to utilize his exceptional speed and rifle throwing arm from the outfield position and carries a dangerous bat. He hit .305 last year. Phillips, a junior college transfer, batted .324 at Middle Georgia College last season, including seven home runs and five triples. He also recorded 14 steals in 14 attempts.

Reserves Larry Mitchell, a freshman from nationally-ranked Tampa Catholic High School; David Hawes, an Owensboro, Ky., freshman walk-on; and Lloyd Williford, a junior from Bowling Green, provide the Hilltoppers with excellent depth.

CATCHING

Shollenberger is a firm believer in having two starting catchers n his squad. "Catching is the most hazardous position on the field, as far as injuries are concerned," he says. "With two starting catchers, if one goes down, the other is ready to step in."

The two Hilltoppers who will be sharing starting assignments behind the plate are David Kendall, a senior from Bowling Green, and Mike Green, a junior from Gainesville, Ga. Both are excellent receivers, with Green getting the nod as the better offensive player and Kendall the better defensive player. Both work their pitchers well and are blessed with strong and accurate arms to cut down baserunners.

The two will be backed up by two freshmen: Tim Pickerrell, a 6-0, 185-pounder from Elizabethtown, Ky., and Sam Royse, a 5-10, 190-pounder from Glasgow, Ky.
