Retired WKU professors **William “Biff” Kummer** and **Alton Little** were recently recognized by the City of Bowling Green, which named its new recreation facility at 333 College St. in their honor. Both professors taught in the Department of Physical Education and Recreation at WKU for more than 30 years. Little is a recent recipient of the Jefferson Award for public service. Kummer serves on advisory boards for the College of Health and Human Services and the Recreation Administration program at WKU. Both men have contributed countless hours to the recreation profession and to quality of life issues in Kentucky. Congratulations!

WKU’s Mechanical Engineering program will continue to develop a prototype for a human-powered water purification device using an “Open Source” design technique thanks to a \$30,000 grant from the American Society of Mechanical Engineering. Professors **Kevin Schmaltz** and **Robert Choate**, who teach the Junior Design class, received the ASME grant to extend the prototypes developed for the 2007 ASME-sponsored student design competition. The prototype uses a stationary bike powered by a human to purify water so that it is drinkable. The device designed by WKU students **Zachary Pearl**, **Ryan Simpson**, **Brent Stubblefield**, and **D.J. Thompson** qualified for this fall’s final competition at the ASME International Mechanical Engineering Conference and Exposition in Seattle.



**Carl L. Kell** (Communication) won the prestigious James A. Applegate Award as the top communication scholar in the Commonwealth of Kentucky for *Exiled: Voices of the Southern Baptist Convention Holy War* (University of Tennessee Press, 2006). Kell is the only two-time winner of the Applegate Award, having previously won in 2001 for *In the Name of the Father: The Rhetoric of the New Southern Baptist Convention* (Southern Illinois University Press, 1999), which also was named National Book of the Year by the Religious Communication Association. Kell is currently working on the third book in his multi-volume study of the rhetorical history of the Southern Baptist Convention.

**Kentucky Gov. Ernie Fletcher recently honored officials from WKU at the first Governor’s Get Healthy Kentucky Summit. WKU received a Community Health Award, an honor bestowed by the governor to recognize efforts to improve the health and well-being of communities.**

WKU, through its Center for Gerontology, has been invited to join the Student Mentoring Conference on Gerontology and Geriatrics. Begun 18 years ago at the University of Georgia, the organization conducts annual conferences featuring student research that rotate at campuses of the sponsoring institutions. In extending an invitation to **Dana Burr Bradley**, director of WKU's Center for Gerontology, Dr. Leonard Poon of the University of Georgia cited the "very positive input on the participation and excellent scholarship of WKU students at the Southern Gerontological Society meeting." He added, "This was indeed an excellent start by mentoring your students in regional and national conferences. Further, WKU is acquiring an international reputation in taking a leadership role in the editing of the new *Journal of Aging, Humanities and the Arts*." According to Bradley, "Presenting research in a student-centered environment is critical to developing world-class scholars. Membership in the consortium is a critical step in WKU's history."

The **WKU Forensic Team** is enjoying another very successful season. In September, the team won the sweepstakes at the William Jewell Invitational in Liberty, MO, and swept the combined sweepstakes at the Hill Country Swing in Austin, TX. WKU team members also co-hosted the WKU Forensics Fiesta with Ohio University on WKU's campus the weekend of Sept. 28-30, in which WKU swept the Ohio U portion of the tournament. WKU's team captured the sweepstakes championships at both halves of the Seventy-Four Swing held on the

campus of Illinois State University the weekend of Oct. 6-7, and WKU followed with a sweep at the Nebraska Double-Up Swing in Omaha two weeks later. Great job, team!

Music majors **Heather Heim** and **Bronson Murphy**, both voice students of Music faculty member **Wayne Pope**, won honors in the 2007 Kentucky National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS) Student Auditions. Heim placed 2nd in the Senior Women division, while Murphy placed 1st in the Senior Men division and 2nd in the Upperclassmen Musical Theatre division. Pope, an active performer and a NATS member since 1986, was recently appointed to the Kentucky chapter's Executive Committee and serves on the Governor's Advisory Committee for the Mid-South chapter.

**Jason Smith**, a student researcher from WKU's Applied Physics Institute, recently traveled to Boston for the Third Annual International COMSOL MultiPhysics Software conference. Smith, a senior who is working on a defense-related project, presented a benchmark test to analyze how accurately sound propagates through walls in the COMSOL acoustic module. "I was able to do a lot of networking while I was there, and received valuable feedback about our project from everyone who attended," Smith said.

**Judy Davison** (Curriculum & Instruction) was selected for a Fulbright Senior Specialists project conducted at the National College of Ireland (NCI) in October 2007. She presented professional development modules for NCI faculty on teaching strategies for diverse learners, and collaborated on institutional research projects concerning community needs and the mission of NCI.

The Governor's Office of Energy Policy recently awarded a grant of almost \$150,000 for environmental sustainability research at WKU's Institute for Combustion Science and Environmental Technology (ICSET). The project led by **Chin-Min Cheng** and **Wei-Ping Pan** will evaluate whether the reuse of coal combustion byproducts could be beneficial to agricultural application.

Two members of the WKU Lady Toppers soccer team, **Meredith Goodson** and **Rachel Friedman**, were named to the 2007 ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District second team for District IV. To be eligible for this honor, student-athletes must be at least a sophomore starter or key reserve, and have at least a 3.2 cumulative GPA. Meredith and Rachel were among only five Sun Belt women's soccer student-athletes named to the teams. Congratulations!

At the recent annual National Collegiate Honors Council (NCHC) conference in Denver, *Areté*, the newsletter of WKU's Honors College, was recognized as the top student-produced Honors newsletter in the country. *Areté* staff members were especially pleased to be recognized because of the relative newness of the publication: the issues entered in the competition were from its first full year of publication (2006-07). The newsletter depends on its dedicated student writers, photographers, and designers, many of whom have worked on its staff since its first issue. Especially deserving of recognition, however, are the newsletter's editors: **Ria Wallace** and **Kat Wilson** co-edited the publication in 2006-07, and **Sam Micallef** and Kat Wilson are its current co-editors. WKU's Elizabeth McWhorter-Harden Forensic Alumni Association named Kentucky House Speaker Jody Richards, a WKU alumnus, "Kentucky Speaker of the Year" on Oct. 11. This new award recognizes an exemplary communicator. "We are delighted that Jody Richards is our first Kentucky Speaker of the Year," said **Judy Woodring**, director of WKU's award-winning forensic program. "Jody is an excellent example of someone who has used his public speaking skills for the betterment of the people of Kentucky."

For the third year in a row, the Kentucky Geographic Alliance (KGA) has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the National Geographic Society to promote geographic literacy in schools and other venues across the state of Kentucky. The KGA is coordinated by WKU professors **S. Kay Gandy** (Curriculum & Instruction) and **Scott Dobler** (Geography & Geology). The KGA will use this year's grant to support a GIS person to develop a series of Kentucky maps for classroom teachers and document all CATS testing data with GIS. The grant also will support a teacher institute next June at Natural Bridge State Park and several National Geographic programs, including the state Geographic Bee and the My Wonderful World campaign.


