NOTE OF APPRECIATION

The successful opening of a school year requires the cooperative and coordinated efforts of the University community. The smoothness and effectiveness which characterized the opening of the residence halls, orientation, registration, and commencement of institutional activities reflected effective planning, enthusiastic participation, and hard work on the part of large numbers of people across the campus. I want to use this means to express my personal appreciation and the appreciation of the University for the many ways in which each of you contributed to this successful beginning.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF REGENTS

The Board of Regents met in regular session on Saturday, September 23, 1972. Dr. W. Gerald Edds, a physician from Calhoun; Dr. Chalmer P. Embry, an Owensboro dentist; and Michael A. Fiorella, a student from Owensboro, were sworn in as new members of the Board. In the reorganization of the Board, Dr. William R. McCormack of Bowling Green was elected Chairman and Mr. Albert G. Ross of Campbellsville was elected Vice Chairman. Mr. Harry K. Largen, Vice President for Business Affairs, was renamed Treasurer; and Miss Georgia Bates was reelected Secretary to the Board.

In other action approval was given to an agreement between Western and Lourdes Hospital School of Medical Technology for training medical technologists. Approval was also given to a continuing education unit (c. e. u.) which follows the guidelines of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools for measuring units earned in non-degree courses of study in the field of continuing education. The c. e. u. is defined as a minimum of ten contact hours of participation in an organized continuing education experience under responsible sponsorship, capable direction, and qualified instruction. As a unit of credit the c. e. u. may be used for the measurement, recording, reporting, accumulation, transfer, and recognition of participation by students in programs which in the past have seldom been recorded in any formal or systematic way.

In other action the Board approved a major emphasis in student personnel services in higher education under the existing counselor education program offered under the master of arts in education degree. The master of arts in education curriculum for teachers of special education was modified to update and enhance the program for preparation of teachers of the educable mentally retarded. The Board also approved plans for implementing the educational specialist degree with an emphasis in counselor education. The Board approved a proposed plan providing for a study tour covering theatre productions in London, England, during December and January of the current school year.

As has been stressed on other occasions, it is extremely important that each member of the faculty make certain that the official class roll carries the name of each student attending class.

UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES

Miss Sara Tyler, University Archivist, is making significant progress in collecting, identifying, and cataloging documents and materials relating to the history of Western Kentucky University. During this phase of the progress, it has come to our attention that brochures and other printed items frequently do not include a date of release. Department heads and faculty members who are working with the printing of brochures and other items are requested to make a concerted effort to date the publications so that they may be of greater value to the archival collection.

UNITED GIVERS FUND

The annual United Givers Fund campaign began September 1, and by this time you should have received your pledge card and the other information from Western's U. G. F. committee. The University endorses the U. G. F. campaign and encourages you to support it.
