Additional Insurance Benefits Provided by the University

As you know, all full-time regular employees of Western Kentucky University are now receiving the benefit of group life insurance coverage in the amount of \$2,500. I am pleased to inform you that the Board of Regents has approved the recommendation made in a recent meeting and has authorized the University to increase the insurance coverage to \$5,000 at no cost to the individual. An effort is now being made to make this additional benefit effective at the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1, 1969. A large percentage of the faculty and administrative faculty are benefitting also by participation in the optional provision of the group life insurance plan.
