#### GENERAL ACADEMIC INFORMATION by Vice President Raymond L. Cravens

The Academic Council, at its meeting on Wednesday, February 26, unanimously adopted a resolution expressing approval of a revised University calendar which is currently under consideration. Western has already been engaged in discussions with representatives of the other regional state universities and Kentucky State College regarding the possible adoption of such a calendar. Outlined below is a hypothetical example of such a revised calendar:

The Council assigned to the ad hoc committee on Faculty Responsibilities consideration of such student evaluations from the faculty standpoint.
