A Star in Each Flag: Conflict in Kentucky Civil War exhibit now open at Kentucky Library & Museum

Last month, The Kentucky Library & Museum celebrated the grand opening of its latest exhibit, "A Star in Each Flag: Conflict in Kentucky." The grand opening weekend, held October 24th, was kicked off with a Bowling Green Area Chamber of Commerce ribbon cutting in the morning along with a "Bourbon & Belles" reception held later that evening for Friends of WKU Libraries and Museum.

During a visit to the exhibit, visitors can see the strong conflict and opposing views regarding slavery between friends, neighbors, and community members in the state of Kentucky. Guests can also walk through a simulated campsite, view a slave cabin, step into a community post office, and examine



period artifacts including John Hunt Morgan's saddle, various medical instruments, Civil War flags, weapons and



more. Families can also visit the Victorian photo studio where they can dress in period clothing and have a picture taken.

"This new ongoing exhibit will illustrate how deeply divided Kentuckians were during the challenging years of 1861-1865." said Timothy Mullin, Head of Special Collections for University Libraries, "We hope to see students and families from every school in the region walk through our doors. There is something for all ages to enjoy and learn."

Recipients of Evelyn Thurman Book Award announced

Western Kentucky University Libraries has selected the children's picture book, *The Dragonfly Door* written by John Adams and

illustrated by Barbara L. Gibson as winner of the second Evelyn Thurman Young Readers Book Award. The national award was created to honor the memory of former WKU librarian, Evelyn Thurman, who made significant contributions to children's librarianship and literacy during her 25 years of service to the university and community. Books eligible for the award must be written or illustrated by a Kentuckyrelated author or illustrator or have a significant Kentuckyrelated theme. Author John

Adams grew up on a farm in Hopkinsville, Kentucky.

Adam's debut picture book *The Dragonfly Door* is a tender story about loss and change

and uses the life cycle of a dragonfly to address the sensitive and difficult topic of death to young children. Gibson uses warm, emotional

> colors to illustrate the story, which concludes with an educational section on the real life cycle of nymphs and dragonflies.

The author and illustrator will be recognized at an awards luncheon in their honor at the Kentucky Library & Museum later this month. Each will receive a \$500 award and commemorative plaque. Adams, who currently lives in Minnesota, will also be visiting area schools during his trip to Bowling Green. His visit will serve as a finale

for the Southern Kentucky Book Fest partners' weeklong Fall into Books program, which brings noted authors to area schools and also provides free books to children.

Community invited to Christmas in Kentucky



WKU Librarians Recognized for Achievements



Davis named Kentucky's Outstanding Academic Librarian of the Year

Rose Davis, Coordinator for Bibliographic Access and Training for the Department of Library Technical Services at Western Kentucky University, received The Outstanding Academic Librarian Award from the Kentucky Library Association (KLA) at this year's annual KLA conference. Davis has held several leadership positions regionally as well as statewide including chair positions for Kentucky Library Association-Academic Section,

Ohio Valley Users Group of Technical Services Librarians, Kentucky Southeastern Library Network Users Group, and Kentucky Virtual Library and Voyager Users Groups.

"Rose Davis exemplifies faculty dedication through her leadership which has spanned decades," said Connie Foster, Head of WKU Library Technical Services, "Her willingness to serve and her leadership in key state positions highlights her contributions to Kentucky academic librarians and reflects well on WKU's reach beyond the community."

Davis is responsible for cataloging and training within the University Library System. She follows a legacy of WKU librarians who have received this honor: Cynthia Etkin (1995), Connie Foster (1999), Elaine Moore (2001) and Rosemary Meszaros (2006).

Smith to present at London conference and receive recognition on new book

Dr. Charles H. Smith, Science Librarian and Professor of Library Public Services, has been invited to give a presentation on the British naturalist Alfred Russel Wallace on November 22 at a conference at The Linnean Society of London- the world's oldest active biological society. The conference celebrates the double occasion of the 150th anniversary of the first presentation of the theory of natural selection in 1858, and the upcoming publication of Smith's Oxford University Press book on Wallace titled, *Natural Selection and Beyond: The Intellectual Legacy of Alfred Russel Wallace*.

"I'm looking forward to personally meeting several of the people I have been corresponding with over the

years," said Smith. "This conference is a great opportunity to share my views on Wallace as well as discuss related theoretical science ideas."

Considered a leading expert on one of history's most influential biology figures, Dr. Smith has reconstructed Wallace's published bibliography and philosophy including making more than 500 of his publications accessible in full-text on the internet. This work has also led to nine published papers and three book projects over the past several years.

Smith was recently nominated for membership in The Linnean Society of London and was made a "Fellow" by vote of Society members on October 9, 2008. While in England, Smith will also be giving a lecture at the Wessex Institute of Technology.

New IRA law encourages giving

Tax free distributions from IRAs allowed for charitable purposes

The Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 permits taxpayers who have reached age 70 + to exclude from gross income certain distributions of up to \$100,000 in both 2008 and 2009 from a traditional IRA or Roth IRA that would otherwise be included in income.

A qualified distribution must be made directly by the IRA trustee to charitable organizations like WKU Libraries. Thus, a distribution made to an individual, and then rolled over to a charitable organization, would not be excludible from gross income.

Another important feature for IRA owners who do not need the distributions from their IRAs (e.g., because of a comfortable financial position), but who are required to take distributions under required minimum distribution (RMD) rules, the qualified charitable distribution rules would allow them to satisfy the RMD rules without having to incur a tax liability, at least up to \$100,000 distributed to charities like WKU in 2008 and 2009.
