Headquartered in Bowling Green since 1991, VSA arts of Kentucky conducts programming and services in all six (6) Kentucky congressional

Our Guiding Principles:

- Every young person with disabilities deserves access to engaging and inclusive arts learning experiences.
- All artists in schools and art educators should be appropriately prepared to include all students, including students with disabilities, in their instruction.
- All children, youth, and adults with disabilities should have complete access to community arts and cultural facilities, events and activities.
- All individuals with disabilities who aspire to careers in the arts should have the opportunity to develop essential knowledge and skills.

Disability affects 1 out of 5 Americans in their lifetime. According to the 2000 census, one quarter of Kentucky's population lives with a disability and nearly 10% of children in public schools have some form of disability.

Children and adults drive our organization every day. They inspire our programs and services and guide our vision of an inclusive, creative world. We serve approximately 6,000 adults, children, and educators directly, and over 25,000 students, parents, and community members indirectly each year. We offer programs, services, and events based in four core areas: arts education, professional development, cultural access, and public awareness and outreach.

Junior Achievement



whith credit debt at an all-time high and personal savings at an all-time low, America has fast become a consuming society. Junior Achievement of South Central Kentucky and its volunteers are trying to reverse that trend by educating students on personal finance and economics at an early age – even as young as kindergarten.

Junior Achievement, once an exclusively after school program for high school students, has evolved into a program with many innovative offerings for all grade levels. JA uses hands-on curriculum to help young people understand the economics of life. In partnership with business and educators, JA brings the real world to students.

Altogether in the five-county region, Junior Achievement of South Central Kentucky impacted 11,450 students during the 2006-07 school year. With age-appropriate curricula, Junior Achievement programs begin at the elementary school level, teaching children how they can impact the world around them as individuals, workers and consumers. Junior Achievement programs continue through the middle and high school grades, preparing students for future economic and workforce issues they'll face.

The energy that brings business and economics theory to life is JA's volunteer dimension. Classroom volunteers serve as role models and enrich the learning environment with their own life experiences. They show the students how business works, how to be fiscally responsible and why it is so important to stay in school. Many volunteers agree they get as much or more out of the program as the students in their classroom.

Heather Rogers, President of JA of South Central KY, said, "Whether its teaching fifth graders about how to write a check or showing high school students how to prepare a resume, JA volunteers are making a difference in the future of our community. After all, today's students are the homebuyers, employees, money managers, and credit card users of tomorrow."

Financial literacy and workforce development are hot topics with legislators and key components of JA's programs. Preparing students for the future is what JA is about. "Businesses support JA because they understand the tremendous need for a well educated workforce," Rogers said. JA has partnered with the Chambers of Commerce in Bowling Green, Franklin and Edmonson County to instill a strong work ethic among high school seniors. JA's program, Success Skills, is one component of the Chamber's Work Ethic Seal initiative. Participating students have the opportunity to earn scholarships and a special seal on their diploma by completing set criteria related to work ethic and workforce-ready skill development.

Junior Achievement has become innovative in its approach to impact more students each year by offering classes not only in the traditional school setting, but by partnering with organizations like Girls Inc., Community Education, the YMCA and the Housing Authority. In these after school settings, JA is teaching kids how to make smart decisions about money through a new program, Dollars and \$ense.

For the past four years, JA has collaborated with the Warren Regional Juvenile Detention Center, to teach at-risk youth the Economics of Staying in School. JA's volunteers work with these young adults to help them make better decisions for their future. When asked how he would define success, one student from the Detention Center answered, "Success would be someday when I have a family and I could teach them not to make the same mistakes I've made."

Junior Achievement offers a great opportunity to make a measurable, positive impact in education. And it only takes five to eight hours to make a difference as a JA volunteer.

Voices4Justice


