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




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CAVE CITY LABOR MARKET AREA

CAVE CITY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Cave City is a small thriving community, located in the heart of the Kentucky cave country, in northern Barren County. It lies on the newly completed Interstate 65, midway between Louisville and Nashville. Easy access to both cities, in addition to its proximity to Glasgow, Bowling Green, and the cave area, provides Cave City with many unique recreational and cultural advantages.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Barren County in 1968 was 12,265, with manufacturing providing 2,420 of these jobs. This represents a 123.7 percent increase in manufacturing in the past nine years. The major industrial products of the county are machinery and metal products and apparel.

Per capita income in Barren County in 1968 was \$2,384. This figure was slightly below the Kentucky average, indicating a potential for economic growth.

In the Cave City labor market area, which includes Barren and its six surrounding counties, total employment in 1968 was 52,335. Manufacturing furnishes 10,860 of these jobs. Area industrial employment is heaviest in the apparel, lumber and furniture, and metal products and machinery industries.

Despite industrial growth of almost 100 percent in the past nine years, the area still has a deficit of 2,417 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

Resources For Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 4,985 men and 2,525 women available for industrial jobs in the Cave City labor market area. By 1975, 6,445 boys and 6,185 girls will have become 18 years of age, gradually augmenting the labor supply.

- 2. The local transportation capability of Cave City is excellent. The town is provided with both freight and passenger service by the Louisville & Nashville Railroad. Because Cave City is located on Interstate 65, there is easy access to the Blue Grass Parkway and the other major highways throughout the state. Commercial air service is available in Bowling Green, 34 miles distant.
- 3. Energy both gas and electricity is available in large quantity. The local water supply is adequate to accommodate additional industrialization.
- 4. Industrial sites Cave City has eight sites available for industrial use, including a 26-acre industrial park within the city limits.
- 5. Education Western Kentucky University is located in Bowling Green, Kentucky, 31 miles from Cave City via Interstate 65.

Community Programs For Improvement

The newly completed Interstate 65 has an interchange within the city limits. The interchange has spurred the tremendous development of motels and restaurants which service both the Mammoth Cave area and Interstate travelers. Other community improvements include the construction of a 20-unit low-rent Federal housing project, renovation of the school's heating system, construction of a new Caverna Memorial Hospital, completion of a new public library, and the formation of a new county water district.

Presently under construction is a wax museum recreational center, wildlife museum, and a re-created frontier town - all designed to further the community's tourist industry.

Planned improvements for the community include the construction of the Cave Land Country Club. The new country club will have a clubhouse, swimming pool, golf course, and tennis courts. A new lake for fishing and swimming is also planned.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Cave City is located in the heart of Kentucky's beautiful cave country. The area's six major caves, including the renowned Mammoth Cave, are open to visitors year round. Cave City is 10 miles from the Mammoth Cave National Park. Green River boat trips, a nature sanctuary, cave tours, nature trails, lodging and restaurant facilities are provided by the park.

Fishing is excellent in the Cave City area. Barren River Reservoir in southern Barren County, Nolin Reservoir, and Green River are all well stocked and provide excellent fishing.

Cave City enjoys unusual cultural advantages for a small community. It has its own outdoor drama during the summer months. Proximity to Bowling Green and to Western Kentucky University provides the town with a variety of collegiate concerts, plays, and art exhibits in addition to varsity athletics.

HISTORY

Barren County was established in 1798 as the thirty-seventh county in Kentucky. The county was so named because of the sparse amount of timber found there when the pioneers first visited the area. It is thought that the Indians purposely kept the trees undersized in order to better hunt buffalo and other game. Barren County is in the heart of the fabled hunting grounds of the Indians.

Two of the Commonwealth's chief executives have been Barren County residents: Preston H. Leslie, the state's twenty-sixth Governor, assumed duties in 1871. Nearly 97 years later another Barren Countian was inaugurated into the same office. He was Louie B. Nunn, the present Governor of Kentucky.

Agriculture has always been an important factor in Barren County's economy. It is still one of the state's leading tobacco producers, the second largest hen and pullet producer, and is sixth in number of hogs and sheep.
