



#### AUGUSTA, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

#### Location

Augusta, a small river town, is located in northcentral Kentucky on the Ohio River. Augusta, the county seat of Bracken County, dates back to 1796. Augusta is 60 miles from the Greater Cincinnati Area, 70 miles from Lexington, Kentucky, and 77 miles from the Ashland-Huntington Area.

The 1970 population of Augusta is 1,406 and the population for Bracken County is 7,025.

#### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Bracken County averaged 2,340 in 1968 with agriculture providing 1,000 of these jobs. During the past nine years there has been a slight increase in manufacturing employment. Major industrial products are plastic materials and metal products.

Per capita income in the county in 1968 was \$2,009, an increase of 54.2 percent in the past nine years.

In the Bracken County labor market area, which includes Bracken and the four surrounding Kentucky counties, total employment in 1968 averaged 18,985. Agriculture provided 5,420 of these jobs while manufacturing provided 4,085 jobs. Area industrial employment is heaviest in metal products and apparel. Despite important industrial gains in recent years the area still has a deficit of 614 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is good.

#### Resources For Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 880 men and 1,330 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 2,660 young men and 2,660 young women will become 18 years of age by 1976 and potentially available for work.
- 2. The local transportation capability is good. Augusta is served by Kentucky Routes 8, 19, and 435. Route 8, approximately 45 miles northeast of Augusta, links with Interstate 75, a major artery to the industrial south and north. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway serves Augusta. Commercial air service is available at the Greater Cincinnati Airport, 60 miles distant. Augusta's location on the Ohio River gives this area an excellent water transportation capability.

- 3. Energy both gas and electricity is available in large quantity. The local raw water supply is more than adequate for continued growth.
- 4. There are five universities, two senior colleges, and one community college within a radius of 70 miles of Augusta.

The Northern Kentucky Area Vocational-Technical School, located in Covington, and the Maysville extension center are within easy driving distance and offer a wide variety of courses.

The recently constructed Maysville Community College, 20 miles distant, has become a vital part of the University of Kentucky's undergraduate program by offering students in the area their choice of an associate degree or a liberal arts curriculum preparatory to an additional two years at a senior college.

#### Community Programs For Improvement

A new post office and furniture and hardware store have recently been constructed. The boating ramp area now has parking space for 50 cars and trailers, and picnic and rest room facilities.

Plans are underway for a sewage disposal plant for the city.

#### Recreation, Entertainment, and Livability

Cincinnati, located 60 miles from Augusta, offers many types of athletic and cultural entertainment. This is the home of professional baseball, basketball, football, and hockey teams, as well as of nationally prominent college basketball and football teams. River Downs Racetrack and Coney Island Amusement Park, both in the Cincinnati area, are available to residents of Augusta during the summer months.

Kincaid Lake State Park is 30 miles west of Augusta. The park has a 220-acre lake, bathhouse and sand beach, boat dock and rentals, picnicking, playground, fishing and primitive camping.

Carter Caves State Resort Park is 50 miles east of Augusta. The park has resort lodge, resort pool, dining room, coffee shop, efficiency and one-bedroom cottages, tent and trailer camp sites with central service building, group camp, picnic shelters, bathhouse, beach, 45-acre lake, boat dock and boat rentals, 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, riding stable, hiking and nature trails, playground and supervised recreation, fishing, and guided tours through electrically-lighted caves. The cave region of eastern Kentucky abounds in natural bridges, rugged cliffs and mountain streams.

Big Bone Lick State Park is 47 miles west of Augusta. The park has a playground and picnic area. A museum, lodging and concessions are planned. A new road gives access to an Ohio River boat launching site and paved parking area.

Blue Licks Battlefield State Park is 41 miles south of Augusta. The park has picnic shelter with rest rooms, bathhouse, Olympic swimming pool, playground, hiking trails, primitive camping and a museum.
