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



PAINTSVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA



Location

Paintsville is the county seat of Johnson County. The city is located in the east central portion of the Eastern Coal Field Region of Kentucky, 195 miles east of Louisville, Kentucky, 195 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio, and 255 miles from Knoxville, Tennessee. Paintsville had a 1970 population of 3,868.

Johnson County contains 264 square miles and had a 1970 population of 17,539.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Johnson County in 1971 averaged 5,270 with agriculture providing 300 jobs, manufacturing 340, trade and services 2,225, government 1,240, and mining and quarrying 340. Since 1961 manufacturing employment has increased by approximately 311 percent or 258 jobs. The major industrial item is plumbing products.

Per capita income in the county in 1970 was \$1,973. Between 1960 and 1970, per capita personal income in the county increased approximately 154 percent.

The Paintsville labor market area includes Johnson and the five surrounding counties of Floyd, Lawrence, Magoffin, Martin and Morgan. Area employment in 1971 averaged 21,760 jobs with agriculture providing 2,020, manufacturing 1,760, trade and services 4,780, government 4,880, and mining and quarrying 3,200. Area industrial employment has increased approximately 296 percent or 1,276 jobs since 1961 with sharpest gains in the machinery and metal products, apparel, textiles and leather industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 6,793 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,880 men and 10,205 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 5,690 young men and 5,125 young women will become 18 years of age by 1978 and potentially available for employment.

- 2. The local transportation capability is good. The Chessie System provides Paintsville with a variety of rail services. U.S. Highways 23 and 460, which are "AAA" north-south trucking routes, serve the county. The Mountain Parkway is only 20 miles distant, and I-64 is only 55 miles distant. The Combs Airport has a 2,800-foot paved runway capable of accommodating light aircraft. Commercial air service is available at Tri State Airport (Walker Long Field) only 50 miles distant at Kenova, West Virginia.
- 3. Electric power is provided in large quantity by Kentucky Power Company, which has a major generating plant only 35 miles distant, and by Big Sandy RECC. Natural gas service is provided by Paintsville Gas System, whose source of supply is the Kentucky-West Virginia Gas Company. Three distributors of propane and butane, and three distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in Paintsville and the immediate area. Low sulphur content coal is available locally.
- 4. Two public school systems operate within Johnson County and educational television is available. One university, one senior college, two junior colleges and one community college are located within 50 miles of Paintsville.

The Mayo State Vocational-Technical School is located in Paintsville and offers training in 28 different courses.

Community Programs for Improvement

Projects for community improvement under construction include: a city maintenance building and an office, maintenance, and storage building for the city Gas and Water Department. Planned improvements include: a \$750,000 neighborhood facilities complex which will have a 9,583 square foot building located on 7 acres.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

The city operates a park and playground which covers a 16-acre area inside the city limits. Facilities include a modern swimming pool with separate wading pool and brick bathhouse, three all-weather tennis courts, all-weather basketball and volleyball courts, lighted softball and baseball diamonds, croquet and horseshoe courts, and picnic tables and grills. A full-time park supervisor is employed during the summer months.

Paintsville also has an 18-hole golf course and modern country club. The facilities of this club are open to the citizens of Paintsville and neighboring towns and to tourists. Several notable golf tournaments are held there each year.

A stadium owned by the Paintsville Independent School District is the site for football games, an annual horse show and events connected with the annual Apple Festival. The Festival, held in October of each year, brings 20,000 visitors to the city.

Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, 12 miles distant, provides 1,700 acres of water recreation on Dewey Lake, surrounded by 12,000 acres of forest. The facilities include a lodge, cottages, camping areas, sky lift and amphitheater. The recreational facilities include boating, swimming, fishing, golfing, hiking, riding, shuffleboard and picnicking.



HISTORY

Johnson County, the ninety-seventh county formed in the state, contains 264 square miles and dates from 1843. Its land area was taken from Floyd, Lawrence, and Morgan Counties. The Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River and its tributaries drain the county. These streams have chiseled that section of the Cumberland Plateau into a network of low hills and shallow valleys. The average elevation of the county is under 700 feet above sea level, while 100 miles to the south the elevation is 1,000 feet higher.

The first man to traverse Johnson County territory was Dr. Thomas Walker who was in the employ of the Loyal Land Company. Soon several members of the Long Hunters came into the area. Five miles upstream from Paintsville is a fifty-acre tract now known as Block House Bottom, where Matthias Harman built a hunting lodge. Several years later in 1787 he returned and built a fort at present day East Point. It was from this station that settlers went out to establish Paintsville, Prestonsburg, Pikeville, and other nearby communities. It was also to this fort that Jenny Wiley, the pioneer heroine of Eastern Kentucky, fled after a dramatic escape from the Indians. Her name is preserved today in the Jenny Wiley State Park on Dewey Lake a few miles over in Floyd County.

Paintsville, the county seat, dates from 1810 and was named for Paint Creek, which flows through the town. Early settlers found many of the large trees along the creek stripped of their bark and embellished with drawings of birds and animals, painted in red and black on the smooth undertrunks. They also found odd figures of buffalo and deer painted on the clifflike sandstones along the stream. The town was settled by families from East Point who were searching for fertile lands.

Johnson County was named for Colonel Richard M. Johnson of Scott County. He was educated at Transylvania University, passed the bar examination at the age of nineteen, served in the State Assembly at the age of twenty-two, was elected to the National Congress when only twenty-four (he took his seat a few days after he reached twenty-five), was a United States Senator, and in 1836 was named the vice-president elect.

The 1850 population of Johnson County was 3,873. The population had a steady increase until 1940 when the county reached an all time high of 25,771. Since then the population has slowly declined to its 1970 figure of 17,539.

Agriculture accounted for 300 of the county's 5,270 employed in 1971, with corn, burley tobacco, cattle and hogs the principal products. Manufacturing employment increased from 83 in 1961 to 341 in 1971. Largest of Paintsville's firms are American Standard, Inc., and Paintsville Outerwear, Inc. Johnson County ranks high among the producers of coal and petroleum in the state.

William N. Randolf and John B. Wheatley were school teachers in the county immediately after its formation. John C. C. Mayo, who lived in Paintsville around the turn of the twentieth century, originated the idea of mining coal on a large scale. His dream was realized when a railroad was built into the area.
