
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
GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP

AUGUSTA & BROOKSVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA





Augusta, the largest city in Bracken County with a 1970 population of 1,434, is situated on the south bank of the Ohio River. Augusta is 61 miles southeast of the Covington-Cincinnati area, 67 miles northeast of Lexington, 114 miles west of Ashland and 108 miles northeast of Louisville.

Brooksville, county seat of Bracken County, is located 8 miles west of Augusta. In 1970, Brooksville had a population of 609.

Bracken County covers 204 square miles and lies in the Outer Blue-grass physiographic region of Kentucky. The county had a 1970 population of 7,227.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Bracken County averaged 2,160 in 1971, with agriculture providing 810 jobs, manufacturing 270, government 310 and trade and services 160. Since 1962, manufacturing employment has increased 37 percent or 67 jobs. Major industrial products are polyethylene, vinyl film, metal stampings, metal fasteners and furniture glides.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1970 was \$2,538. Between 1960 and 1970, per capita personal income in the county increased over 81 percent.

The Augusta-Brooksville labor market area includes Bracken and the four surrounding Kentucky counties. In 1971, employment in the labor market area totaled 18,670 with agriculture providing 4,390 jobs, manufacturing 4,440, government 1,960 and trade and services 3,920. Industrial employment in the labor market area has increased nearly 37 percent since 1962 with sharpest gains in non-electrical machinery, metal products, primary metals, and leather industries.

Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 3,140 men and 4,056 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 2,625 young men and 2,490 young women will become 18 years of age by 1979 and potentially available for work.
- 2. The Chessie System serves Augusta with a variety of rail services. The nearest piggyback facilities are located in Cincinnati, 61 miles northwest of Augusta. Two trucking lines serve Augusta and one line serves Brooksville.

Kentucky highways 8, 19 and 435 provide highway transportation to Augusta, while Brooksville is served by state highways 1159, 10 and 19. The Greater Cincinnati Airport, 62 miles away at Florence, is the nearest commercial air service to Augusta and Brooksville. Augusta is located on the Ohio River affording the town with water transportation capabilities.

- 3. Kentucky Utilities Company serves Augusta and Brooksville with electricity. Electric power for Bracken County is provided by Kentucky Utilities Company, Fleming-Mason RECC and Harrison County RECC. The city of Augusta Natural Gas Company provides Augusta with natural gas. Brooksville is served natural gas by the Brooksville Utilities Company. Brooksville has one propane distributor and one distillate fuel oil distributor. Augusta receives distillate fuel oil from a distributor in Brooksville and propane from a distributor in Minerva.
- 4. Two industrial sites are available one at Augusta and one at Brooksville.
- 5. Two public school systems operate in Bracken County the Augusta Independent School District and the Bracken County School System. There are 4 universities, 8 senior colleges, 1 junior college and 2 community colleges within 70 miles of Augusta and Brooksville. The Maysville Area Vocational Education Center located in Maysville, 28 miles away, offers training in five areas. Northern Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School located in Covington, 61 miles away, is the nearest state vocational school and offers training in 22 areas.

Community Programs for Improvement

Augusta

Recent: Three businesses have opened in Augusta.

Four trailer parks have been constructed.

One subdivision is presently being developed

One business has completed renovation and another is now renovating.

A 500 gallon-per-minute artesian well has been drilled for the Augusta Water Works.

Planned: A sewage treatment plant, with a capacity of 300,000 gallons per-day, is being planned.

Expansion of the Augusta City School will include renovation of the gymnasium, cafeteria-kitchen, and the addition of two classrooms.

Renovation of 14 businesses in Augusta is proposed.

Construction of a medical services building for the community has been planned.

The city of Augusta has plans for a new fire station and city garage, and for renovation of the city office building.

Repaving of 20 city streets is planned.

A new subdivision has been planned.

The restoration of 38 old homes and row houses of historic background is planned as a tourist attraction.

Expansion of one of the city park ball fields and construction of a tennis court is planned.

Brooksville

Recent: The city recently annexed 25 acres.

Eight miles of gas line have been constructed by the Brooksville Utilities Company.

Two new subdivisions have been developed.

Two new streets have been paved.

One new business has opened in Brooksville.

<u>Planned</u>: A five-room city hall with municipal parking area has been planned.

Plans are being made to construct a new building for the Bracken County Elementary School.

One new subdivision is proposed.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Three state parks, Big Bone Lick State Park at Walton, Blue Licks Battlefield State Park near Mt. Olivet and Kincaid Lake State Park near Falmouth, are located within 80 miles of Augusta and Brooksville. Facilities and recreational activities include camping area, playgrounds, swimming, fishing, boating, picnicking and hiking.

Cave Run Reservoir, now under construction, located near Farmers is within 80 miles of Augusta and Brooksville. The reservoir, when filled will cover some 8,270 acres making it Kentucky's fifth largest lake. Recreation and facilities will include a lodge, camping area, swimming pool, beach, boat ramps and marina, picnic areas, and fish hatchery.

The Ohio River affords Augusta and Brooksville a wide variety of water recreation and scenic beauty.

AREA OCCUPATIONAL WAGE RATES

Reliable wage data for specific communities are not available for publication. The best source for manufacturing wages in Augusta and Brooksville are the major firms listed in this survey. The Department of Commerce will assist in obtaining data by specific occupation for a specific community.

Associated Industries of Kentucky publishes an excellent annual <u>Survey of Wages and Related Practices</u>. This survey shows wages for eight regions of the state but not for specific communities. It does give a good indication of competing rates in the area.

Augusta and Brooksville are in Area 7 which includes the counties shown on the inset map.

HISTORY

Bracken County, the twenty-third county established in Kentucky dates from 1796. The county was formed from parts of two other counties -- Mason and Campbell. Later Bracken gave lands to help form Pendleton (1798) and Robertson (1867). It lies along the Ohio River in northcentral Kentucky, and has 204 square miles of territory. Its topography is rolling and hilly.

Surveys of Bracken County were among the first in the state. They were made by Captain John Hedges, Captain Thomas Young, Captain Thomas Bullitt, and John Fitzgerald in 1773. John Doran visited the area a year later and was greatly impressed with its possibilities. William Bracken, for whom the two main creeks in the county, Big and Little Bracken, were named, also visited the area and decided to settle near the larger stream. He was killed by the Indians soon afterwards, and his companions gave his name to the creeks to perpetuate his memory. Eight years later, in 1781 Captain Phillip Buckner established Augusta. The town is admirably situated on a high bank above the Ohio River. Augusta was also the first county seat of Bracken County, and had the first courthouse built in the northern part of the state. Buckner also established Bracken Academy, which in 1822 became the first endowed Methodist College in the world.

Brooksville, the county seat since 1842, is nine miles inland from the Ohio River and is situated near the center of the county. It was established by David Brooks in 1839.

Major industrial products for Bracken County are polyethylene, vinyl film, metal stampings, metal fasteners and furniture glides. Since 1962, manufacturing employment has increased 37 percent or 67 jobs.

In 1850, Bracken County had a population of 8,903. The population increased steadily until 1880 when it reached 13,509. Since 1880, the county population has had a gradual decline, showing a 1970 population of 7,227.

The 1970 population of Augusta was 1,434, while Brooksville had a population of 609.
