



# BARDWELL, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Bardwell, the county seat of Carlisle County is located in western Kentucky in the Jackson Purchase region of Kentucky. The western boundary of the county is formed by the Mississippi River. Bardwell is 30 miles southwest of Paducah, 246 miles southwest of Louisville, 172 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee, and 169 miles south of St. Louis, Missouri.

The 1970 population of Bardwell was 1,049. Carlisle County is composed of 195 square miles and had a population of 5,354 in 1970.

#### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Carlisle County averaged 1,490 in 1971 with agriculture providing 370 jobs, manufacturing 280, government 210 and trade and services 200. Major industrial products in the county are lamps, room dividers and tables.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1970 was \$2,231. Since 1960 per capita personal income in the county has increased nearly 74 percent.

In the Bardwell labor market area, which includes Carlisle and its four surrounding Kentucky counties, total employment in 1971 averaged 41,360 with agriculture providing 3,410 jobs, manufacturing 9,560, government 5,060, and trade and services 12,360. Since 1962 area manufacturing employment has increased more than 28 percent or 2,230 jobs with the sharpest gain in the rubber industry.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years the area still has a deficit of 370 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio.

### Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 8,095 men and 8,430 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 5,280 young men and 4,940 young women will become 18 years of age by 1979 and potentially available for work.
- 2. Bardwell is served by U. S. Highways 62 and 51 and is located 24 miles from the Purchase Parkway. Bardwell is served by four truck lines with a United Parcel Service shipping center at Paducah, 30 miles away. Rail service is provided by the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad, with the nearest piggyback services at Fulton, 29 miles away and Paducah, 30 miles away. Commercial air service is also available at Barkley Field in Paducah.

- 3. Electricity for Bardwell is provided by Bardwell City Utilities. Electricity for Carlisle County is provided by the Hickman Fulton RECC, Jackson Purchase RECC and West Kentucky RECC. Natural gas service for Bardwell is provided by the Commonwealth Service Corporation. Bardwell is served by four distributors of propane and two distributors of distillate fuel oil.
- 4. Bardwell is served by the Carlisle County School System. There are two universities and one community college within a 65-mile radius of Bardwell. The nearest state vocational-technical school is located in Paducah, 30 miles away. An area vocational education center is also in Paducah.

#### Community Programs for Improvement

#### Recent:

Bardwell has four new businesses.

Bardwell's major city streets have recently been repaved.

The Bardwell Volunteer Fire Department has a new fire truck with a 1,000 gallon per minute pumper.

A new subdivision has been developed.

The Carlisle County School System has recently opened a new elementary school.

#### Under Construction:

A new 20-acre city park is under construction. Facilities will include a lighted softball diamond, horse show ring, basketball court, tennis court, picnic shelter, horseshoes, croquet and volleyball.

The Bardwell Deposit Bank is presently being remodeled.

# Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Columbus Belmont Battle field State Park is located 11 miles from Bardwell at Columbus. This historic park, which overlooks the Mississippi River, features a Civil War Museum which has a diorama of the famous battle fought there. Other facilities include miniature golf, hiking trails, shelter, snack bar and gift shop.

The Ballard County Wildlife Management Area, approximately 20 miles from Bardwell, offers a 10,000-acre paradise for hunters and fishermen. There is a controlled season on doves, water fowl and squirrels as well as 10 small lakes for fishing.

The Land Between the Lakes, approximately 60 miles away, is a peninsula 5 to 10 miles wide stretching for 40 miles north to south between Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley. Hunting is a prime attraction in fall and winter and fishing is a year round sport along the 3,500 miles of lake shoreline.

Kenlake State Resort Park is located approximately 55 miles distant, near Aurora. Facilities include lodge, gift shop, camping, swimming pool, sand beach, picnic area, playground, hiking, horseback riding, tennis, boat dock and golf course.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park is located approximately 55 miles away near Gilbertsville. Facilities include a lodge, gift shop, cottages, camping, pool, beach, bathhouse, miniature golf course, playground, picnic area, horseback riding, supervised recreation, fishing, boat rental and car rental.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park is located approximately 70 miles distant near Cadiz. Facilities include a lodge, gift shop, cottages, camping, pool, beach, bathhouse, riding stables, hiking, picnic area, playground, supervised recreation, boat rental, and fishing.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

#### Property Taxes

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.015 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.15 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, and goods in process inventories are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Property stored in public warehouses is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

All property is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

#### HISTORY

Carlisle County was formed from the southern part of Ballard County in 1886. It was the one-hundred and nineteenth county established in the state and was the last of the eight counties established in the Jackson Purchase.

The first settlers came into Carlisle County soon after the Chickasaw Indians moved west of the Mississippi in compliance with the terms of the Treaty of Purchase in 1818.

Bardwell, the county seat, was in a semi-swamp area and covered with large trees. During the construction of the Illinois Central Railroad water had to be provided for the workmen. It was difficult to dig a well due to the water and gumbo soil that rushed into the pit when a shovelful was removed. Finally the foreman decided to put up boards to hold back the muck. This was successful and a plentiful supply of water was made available. The well became famous throughout the region.

It was called the "Boarded Well" hence the name of the place came to be Bardwell due to the difficulty in pronouncing "Boarded Well."

In 1850 the population of Carlisle County was shown at 5,526. By 1900 the population had nearly doubled to 10,195. Since then the population has shown a steady decline with the 1970 figure at 5,354. The 1970 population of Bardwell was 1,049.

Total employment in Carlisle County averaged 1,490 in 1971 with agriculture providing 370 jobs, manufacturing 280, government 210, and trade and services 200. Major industrial products in the county are lamps, room dividers and tables.
