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
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CARROLLTON LABOR MARKET AREA

CARROLLTON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Carrollton, the county seat of Carroll County, is located in northern Kentucky in the Outer Blue Grass Region. The Ohio River forms the northern boundary of the county. The small but progressive river town is noted for its tree-lined streets and views of both the Kentucky and Ohio Rivers. Carrollton is approximately 55 miles from both Louisville, Kentucky, and Cincinnati, Ohio.

The population of Carrollton was estimated at 5,000 in 1970. The 1970 population of Carroll County is 8,387.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Carroll County averaged 3,555 in 1968, with manufacturing providing 1,175 jobs and government 1,250 jobs. During the first nine years of the decade, manufacturing employment increased by 227 percent. The county's major products are furniture, chemicals, and metal products.

Per capita income in the county in 1968 was \$2,969 or \$324 above the Kentucky average. This indicates a relatively prosperous economy, with adequate room for future economic growth.

In the Carroll County labor market area, which includes Carroll and its four surrounding Kentucky counties, total employment in 1968 averaged 12,900. Manufacturing provided 1,735 of these jobs, while agriculture provided 4,455. Area industrial employment is heaviest in furniture, chemicals, sporting goods, and metal products.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 1,964 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 745 men and 920 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 1, 730 young men and 1, 700 young women in the area will have become 18 years of age by 1976 and potentially available for work.

2. The local transportation capability is good. Interstate 71, the major highway link between Louisville and Cincinnati, is 2 miles from the Carrollton city limits. The Carrollton Railroad, which is a subsidiary of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, serves Carroll County with a variety of services. Commercial air service is available at Louisville and Cincinnati, both approximately 55 miles distant.

3. Energy - both gas and electricity - is available in large quantity. The local water supply is adequate for continued growth.

4. Industrial sites - Carrollton has nine available industrial sites.

5. Education - There are three universities, five senior colleges, and one junior college within a 60-mile radius of Carrollton.

Community Programs for Improvement

Recent community improvements include a new county high school, a vocational extension center, improved parking facilities, new sidewalks, mercury vapor street lights installed, new office building, 20-unit apartment building, two low-rent housing projects, medical center, shopping center, two new restaurants, land fill dump, and a new fire truck. A \$100,000,000 Kentucky Utilities Company is under construction in Carroll County.

Planned improvements include a new parking area, a new middle school, boat ramp, improved services for the health department, a community college, and a low-rent housing project. A contract has been let for a \$1,200,000 expansion of the hospital.

Recreation, Entertainment, and Livability

The Carroll County Recreation Department provides a variety of organized summer sports activities. General Butler State Park, at the southern edge of Carrollton, has a resort lodge with dining room, cottages, tent and trailer camping, boating, swimming, fishing, picnicking, horseback riding, tennis, golf, and an Ohio River Lore Museum. The lodge is open the year round.

Churchill Downs, home of the Kentucky Derby, is located in Louisville, only an hour's drive from Carrollton. Two Thoroughbred racing meets and the world-famous Kentucky Derby are held here annually. Thoroughbred racing is also held at Miles Park. Harness racing is offered at beautiful new Louisville Downs. Four race meets a year are held in Lexington, 76 miles from Carrollton, for Thoroughbreds at Keeneland Race Course, and two for harness racing at the Lexington Big Red Mile Trotting Track.

Latonia Race Course at Florence, 43 miles from Carrollton, is Kentucky's newest race track.

Intercollegiate athletic programs in football, basketball, baseball and track at the University of Kentucky and University of Louisville offer spectator thrills for the sports fan.

Major league sports may be found in Cincinnati, which is the home of the Cincinnati Reds baseball team, the Cincinnati Royals basketball team, and the Cincinnati Bengals professional football organization.

Louisville has two professional teams - the Louisville Colonels baseball team and the Louisville Colonels basketball team.

The Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra presents biweekly concerts throughout the fall and winter seasons. The Cincinnati Summer Opera, where professional casts with Metropolitan artists offer the world's great operas, is held each summer in the historic Music Hall.

Louisville is the home of the Louisville Orchestra. The orchestra gives eight pairs of subscription concerts annually. The Kentucky Opera Association presents four operas in Louisville each season at the Brown Theater with professional artists.

HISTORY

Carroll County, the eighty-seventh county formed in the State of Kentucky, dates from 1838. Its territory was taken from Gallatin County. The first man to visit the Carroll County area, of whom there is definite evidence, was James McBride. He came down the Ohio River as early as 1754. His initials were found carved on a tree near the mouth of the Kentucky River under that date. Some thirty-one years later a settlement on the point at the confluence of the Kentucky and Ohio Rivers was begun. A man named Elliott built a house there. He lost his life in an Indian raid and his house was destroyed. The next year Captain Ellison constructed another blockhouse on the same site. He, likewise, was forced to abandon his home two years later because of marauding Indians. Not until 1789, when General Charles Scott built a third blockhouse on the northern or right bank of the Kentucky River and fortified the elevated spot, was a permanent settlement assured. This blockhouse was occupied until 1792 when the town of Port William (present day Carrollton) was planned. Port William was incorporated in 1794 and after 1798, when Gallatin County was formed, was its county seat until Carroll County was established. Jefferson Peak, a representative from Gallatin County at the time Carroll County was formed, approved its establishment.

Carroll County and her county seat, Carrollton, were named for Charles Carroll of Carrollton, Maryland. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and out-lived all of the others who affixed their signatures to the document. He died in 1832 six years before the county was formed.

An important asset which Carrollton possesses is river transportation. A nine-foot navigation channel is maintained along the Ohio River, and a six-foot channel along the Kentucky River.

Several important people have lived in Carroll County. General Percival Butler, a member of the family for whom Butler State Park was named, was a Revolutionary War soldier who was with Washington at Valley Forge, and later fought in the Battles of Monmouth and Yorktown. He migrated to Kentucky in 1792, settled first in present day Jessamine County, then after becoming adjutant-general of the state moved to the mouth of the Kentucky River in 1796 and helped develop Port William into a thriving Ohio River town.

General William Orlando Butler, son of General Percival Butler, fought in the War of 1812 and in the Mexican War of 1846-48. In 1848, he succeeded General Winfield Scott in the Command of the Army in Mexico until a treaty of peace was signed. He was a losing candidate for the vice-presidency of the United States in 1848.
