



FLEMINGSBURG, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Flemingsburg, the county seat of Fleming County, is located in the outer Bluegrass Region in the northeast portion of Kentucky. Flemingsburg is 56 miles northeast of Lexington, 127 miles east of Louisville, and 81 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The population of Flemingsburg in 1970 was 2,483, while the population of Fleming County was 11,366.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Fleming County averaged 3,900 in 1969 with agriculture providing 1,300 of these jobs and manufacturing providing 700 jobs. Major industrial products are ladies' shoes and automotive and appliance trim.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1969 was \$2,300, an increase of \$1,340 since 1959.

In the Flemingsburg labor market area, which includes Fleming and its six surrounding counties, employment in 1969 totaled 23,700, with agriculture providing 6,200 of these jobs and manufacturing providing 5,245 jobs. Area industrial employment is heaviest in textiles, leather, and machinery industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 2,100 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 3,345 men and 2,390 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. By 1977, an additional 4,570 young men and 4,160 young women will have become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.
- 2. The local transportation capability is good. Flemingsburg is served by Kentucky Routes 32, 57, and 11, and Interstate 64 is only 23 miles distant. Rail service is available at Ewing, 6 miles distant. The Fleming-Mason Airport is presently under construction and will have a 3,900-foot paved runway when completed. Commercial air service is available at Lexington, 56 miles distant.

- 3. Natural gas service is furnished by the Flemingsburg Utilities System. Electricity is furnished by the Kentucky Utilities Company and the Fleming-Mason RECC.
- 4. Industrial sites Flemingsburg has one available industrial site with all utilities.
- 5. There are three universities, one senior college, one junior college, and one community college within a 60-mile radius of Flemingsburg.

Community Programs for Improvement

Recent community improvements include: new natural gas system, expansion of water and sewer facilities, new extended care section (40 beds) on hospital, remodeling of city hall, new building for fire department, municipal parking lot, paving of city streets, water district for Fleming County (under construction), airport (under construction), and a new subdivision.

Planned improvements: a city park and additional low-rent housing units.

Recreation, Entertainment, and Livability

Flemingsburg is located close to two of Kentucky's state parks - Blue Licks Battlefield State Park, 20 miles distant, and Carter Caves State Resort Park, 39 miles distant. Both parks offer full recreation programs.

Within a short distance of Flemingsburg is Lexington, Kentucky, where the finest thoroughbred and harness racing in the world is available at Keeneland Race Course and the Red Mile Trotting Track at several meets each year. The University of Kentucky provides nine months of sports excitement every year. The Central Kentucky Concert and Lecture Association presents an annual subscription series. Theater groups, lectures, and art exhibits are sponsored by both Transylvania University and the University of Kentucky. Some of the beautiful and well-known horse farms are open to the public.

HISTORY

Fleming County is situated in the northeastern portion of Kentucky covering 350 square miles of territory. Its area is about equally divided between the Knobs and Bluegrass geographical regions of the state. The surface of the county is rolling in the western portion and hilly to mountainous in the eastern portion. It is well-drained by the Licking River and its tributaries and has unusually fertile creek bottoms. Limestone is abundant in the area, which is dotted with mineral springs.

The county's first explorers came in an expedition led by General William Thompson of Pennsylvania in 1773; but due to Indian problems there was no settlement made until 1790, when John Fleming came from Virginia. Joined by his half brother, George Stockton, and several others, Fleming fortified a settlement which was called Flemings' Station, later named Flemingsburg. Colonel Fleming remained in the area fighting Indians until his death at their hands in 1794. Four years later in 1798, Fleming County became Kentucky's twenty-sixth county, taking its name from Colonel Fleming.

Flemingsburg, the county seat, was incorporated in 1872 and named for the Fleming family. Its courthouse, until recently replaced, was one of the oldest in the state. With a 1970 population of approximately 2,500, Flemingsburg has recently completed a number of modern buildings and community facilities.

The earliest recorded population figure for Fleming County was 5,016 for 1800. An all-time high of 17,074 was reached in 1900, with a subsequent decline to 11,962 in 1950, and 10,890 in 1960. In the next decade, however, the population trend was reversed due to industrial growth, for a total of 11,366 in 1970.

Agricultural employment accounted for 1,300 of the county's 3,900 jobs in 1969. Principal agricultural products are corn, hay, tobacco, poultry, cattle and hogs. Industrial growth was up over 200 percent since 1959 to 680 in 1969. The most important manufactured products of Fleming County are shoes and metal products, produced by Flemingsburg's two largest firms: U.S. Shoe Corporation, and Randall Company.

Transportation in Fleming County will be enhanced by the new Fleming-Mason Airport.

Fleming County has produced four governors of other states and territories. Alvin Sanders served as the last territorial governor of Nebraska (1861-1867), Clairborne F. Jackson was elected Governor of Missouri in 1861, Willis A. Gorman was the territorial governor of Minnesota (1853-1857), and Richard M. Bishop was governor of Ohio (1878-1880).
