

McKEE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

McKee, a small town with a 1970 population of 255, is centrally located in Jackson County and serves as the county seat. McKee is 57 miles southeast of Lexington, Kentucky; 122 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky; 115 miles north of Knoxville, Tennessee; and 138 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Jackson County, with a land area of 337 square miles, is located in the heart of historic Daniel Boone National Forest, in the southeastern part of Kentucky. Jackson County had a 1970 population of 10,005.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Jackson County averaged 2,050 in 1972, with agriculture providing 710 jobs, manufacturing 40, trade and services 123, and government 440. The major industrial product is lumber.

Per capita income in the county in 1971 was \$1,601, a 159 percent increase since 1961.

McKee is the hub of a labor market area that includes Jackson and the seven adjoining counties. Area employment was 38,990 in 1972, with agriculture accounting for 5,600 jobs, manufacturing 5,250, government 9,370, and trade and services 8,775. Manufacturing employment has increased 167 percent since 1963, with the sharpest gains in the paper, food and kindred products, and textile industries.

This area has a deficit of 7,061 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area with a potential for additional manufacturing production.

Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 10,580 men and 9,350 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 7,025 young men and 6,785 young women will become 18 years of age by 1980 and potentially available for work.
- 2. The nearest railroad serving McKee is the Louisville & Nashville Railroad at Berea, 24 miles away. U. S. 421 provides easy access to Interstate 75, 24 miles from McKee. The nearest commercial airport, the London-Corbin Magee Field, is 36 miles away in London.

3. Electricity is supplied to McKee and Jackson County by the Jackson County RECC, whose source of supply is the East Kentucky Power Cooperative.

Natural gas service is not available in McKee; however, there are four propane and butane distributors and two distillate fuel oil distributors serving the area.

Water and sewerage services are provided to McKee by the McKee Water and Sewer Company. Portions of Jackson County are supplied treated water by the Jackson County Water Association.

4. The Jackson County School System serves Jackson County residents. The Annville Institute is a private high school located in Annville.

The nearest area vocational education center is in Manchester, 25 miles distant, and offers seven courses. The Central Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School in Lexington is 57 miles distant and offers nineteen fields of study.

There are three universities, four senior colleges, three junior colleges, and one technical institute located within 60 miles of McKee.

Community Programs for Improvement

Recent community improvements in McKee include:

- 1. The Jackson County School System has expanded the Special Education and Business and Office Education programs, constructed an outdoor recreational area at the primary schools, added new math courses at the elementary level, organized physical education in all schools, and constructed a centralized bus garage.
- 2. A rescue squad has been organized.
- 3. County water service is now available to most of the county.
- 4. The Mountain Toy Makers and the Davison Manufacturing Company have both located in McKee.
- 5. Several of the buildings in the downtown area have been repaired and remodeled.
- 6. The bank has been remodeled.
- 7. A new building has been constructed to house the fire department.

- 8. Three new supermarkets have been opened.
- 9. A camp has been started for the Head Start programs.
- 10. Several road improvements have been completed.

Improvements underway include:

- 1. Water lines are being extended to connect municipal and county water lines. This will provide approximately 225,000 gallons per day for industrial use.
- 2. Construction of additional housing for the elderly is underway.
- 3. Further road improvements are underway.
- 4. A new plant, manufacturing kayaks, will be located in McKee.

Planned improvements include:

- 1. The Jackson County School System is planning to construct a vocational school and a middle school.
- 2. New fire fighting equipment is to be purchased.
- 3. Library facilities are to be enlarged and improved.
- 4. More road improvements are to be undertaken in the future.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Jackson County's new 90-acre reservoir near Tyner will have boat docks, and provide fishing for the area.

McKee's location in the eastern Kentucky mountains provides great possibilities for recreational facilities. Scenic areas that are within 70 miles of McKee are:

Fort Boonesborough State Park is 45 miles away in Boonesboro. The park is the 108-acre site of Daniel Boone's settlement. It offers a restaurant, camping, picnic areas, playground, supervised recreation, swimming beach, fishing, and boat rentals.

Levi Jackson Wilderness Road State Park, located in London, 36 miles away, is an 815-acre park. The park offers camping and features a pool with bathhouse, gift shop, hiking, horseback riding, shuffleboard, picnic area, playground, archery, and the Mountain Life Museum.

Cumberland Falls State Resort Park in Corbin is 48 miles away. The park covers 1,720 acres in the Daniel Boone National Forest. Park accommodations include a lodge with a dining room and coffee shop, cottages, and camping. The park features an Olympic-size swimming pool, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, picnic areas, playground, and square dance pavilion. The primary attraction is the beautiful waterfall, with its moonbow during the full phase of the moon; observation points overlook the woodland area and boulder-strewn gorge.

General Burnside State Park in Burnside is 69 miles away on 400-acre Chandler Island in Lake Cumberland. The park offers camping, swimming, bathhouse, beach, fishing, dock, picnic area, playground, and an 18-hole golf course.

Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park, 57 miles away, consists of 750 acres on 1,250-acre Buckhorn Lake and is one of the newest resort parks. Accommodations include a lodge with a dining room, and camping. The park offers fishing, swimming, beach, bathhouse, picnic shelter, playground, boat rentals, launching, boat dock with restaurant, covered and open slips, a 40-foot levy, and fishing pier.

Natural Bridge State Resort Park in Slade is 59 miles away in the Daniel Boone National Forest and consists of 1,500 acres. Park accommodations are a lodge with a dining room and gift shop, cottages, and camping. The park features a swimming pool, 54-acre lake, fishing, bathhouse, boats, paddle boats, hiking, horseback riding, picnic shelter, playground, two ramps and Hoedown Island for summer square dancing. Of the twelve great stone bridges, Natural Bridge is the largest and a fantastic skylift allows easy viewing of the panoramic scene.

Old Fort Harrod State Park in Harrodsburg, 67 miles away, consists of 28 acres. The park offers a reproduction of Fort Harrod, pioneer cemetary, museum, log cabin where Lincoln's parents were married, a gift shop, and the summer outdoor drama of "The Legend of Daniel Boone."

In addition to the parks, there are also six state shrines located near McKee: White Hall State Shrine in Richmond, 34 miles away; Constitution Square State Shrine in Danville, 58 miles away; Isaac Shelby State Shrine in Danville, 58 miles away; William Whitley House State Shrine in Stanford, 54 miles away; Dr. Thomas Walker State Shrine in Barbourville, 55 miles away; and Waveland State Shrine in Lexington, 57 miles away.



WAGES

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

HISTORY

Jackson County is located in the southeastern part of Kentucky in the heart of Daniel Boone National Forest, which covers a major portion of the county's 337 square miles. It is drained by tributaries of both the Kentucky and Cumberland Rivers, with the Middle Fork of Rockcastle River providing the major water supply. The land surface is hilly and broken except on the headwaters of several creeks where there are some areas of level land. The soil is generally thin, consisting of clay and sand, except on Horse Lick and South Fork Creeks, where there is fertile limestone-based soil.

The first settlers in the area were scattered, providing a gradual and widespread development unlike that in most of the state. Among early family names in this county were Casteel, Fowler, McQueen, and Harrison. In 1858 Jackson became Kentucky's one-hundred-fifth county, named for President Andrew Jackson, Tennessee's "Old Hickory."

McKee, the county seat, was named for George McKee of Garrard County and John McKee, a relative, who lived at the present site of the town and did a great deal to promote the establishment of the county. Located at the geographic center of the county, McKee had its first substantial courthouse erected in 1872. In 1917, N. U. Bond moved to Jackson County from Pennsylvania and opened a sawmill at Bond. Although there was never a railroad in the area, Bond built a tramway system to transport lumber.

In 1860, two years after its founding, the county had a population of 3,087. By 1950 the figure was 13,101, after which there was a significant decline to 10,677 in 1960. Although the decline continued in the 1960's, its rate was sharply reduced, leaving a total of 10,005 in 1970.

The economy of Jackson County is influenced by agriculture, which accounted for 710 of a total 2,050 employed in 1972. Burley tobacco, corn, cattle and hogs were the principal products. Manufacturing, which employed 40 in 1972, is primarily in the production of lumber and prefabricated homes. Until 1939 the county had no electricity, but the Jackson County Rural Electric Corporation is now its largest industry.

The most noted Jackson Countian was David R. Francis, who moved to St. Louis and later became its mayor. He also served as Governor of Missouri, Secretary of the Interior under Cleveland, and Ambassador to Russia.
