
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
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GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP

EDMONTON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Edmonton, county seat of Metcalfe County, is located in the rolling Pennyrile Region of southcentral Kentucky. The Cumberland Parkway, located 2 miles northwest of Edmonton, connects with Interstate 65 running north and south. Bowling Green is 50 miles west; Lexington is 115 miles northeast; Louisville is 110 miles north; Nashville, Tennessee, is 108 miles southwest; and Knoxville, Tennessee, is 178 miles southeast. Edmonton's proximity to the cave area and the Lake Cumberland area provides the city with many recreational advantages.

Edmonton had a 1970 population of 958 and Metcalfe County had a population of 8,177. Metcalfe County has 296 square miles of territory.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Metcalfe County averaged 2,550 in 1972 including 1,140 in agriculture. Manufacturing provided 250 jobs, trade and services 190, and government 330. Major industrial products are men's work clothing and uniforms.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1971 was \$2,084. Between 1961 and 1971, per capita personal income in the county increased almost 136 percent.

The Edmonton labor market area includes Metcalfe and its six surrounding counties. In 1972, employment in the labor market area totaled 35,380 including 9,780 in agriculture. Manufacturing furnished 6,460 jobs, trade and services 5,585 jobs, and government 3,830 jobs. Industrial employment in this area has increased approximately 129 percent since 1963 with sharpest gains in the machinery and apparel industries.

This area has a deficit of 1,977 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area with a potential for additional manufacturing production.

Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 4,040 men and 4,360 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 4,740 young men and 4,420 young women in the area will become 18 years of age by 1979 and potentially available for work.
- 2. The local transportation capability is good. The Cumberland Parkway from Bowling Green to Somerset is located just 2 miles northwest of Edmonton. Two trucking companies serve Edmonton. The nearest rail

service is at Glasgow, 18 miles distant. Air charter service is provided at the Glasgow Airport and the nearest commercial airports are Louisville, Kentucky, and Nashville, Tennessee, 110 miles and 108 miles, respectively.

- 3. Electricity is provided to Edmonton and Metcalfe County by Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation which receives its power from the Tennessee Valley Authority. Portions of Metcalfe County are served by Farmers Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation which receives its power from East Kentucky Power Cooperative. Edmonton's municipal gas system is supplied by Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation. The Edmonton area is served by two propane distributors and two distillate fuel oil distributors. The treated and raw water supply is adequate for continued growth.
- 4. Edmonton and Mercalfe County are served by one consolidated county school system. One university, one senior college, and one junior college are located within 50 miles of Edmonton. The Edmonton area is served by two area vocational schools, both 18 miles distant: the Glasgow Area Vocational Education Center offers 4 courses and the Monroe County Area Vocational Education Center offers 7 courses. The nearest state school, the Bowling Green State Vocational Technical School, is 48 miles distant and offers 23 courses.

Community Programs for Improvement

Edmonton's recent community improvements include: a new telephone exchange office; a new park; the Metcalfe County Recreational Lake which includes a 25-acre lake for fishing and swimming, and facilities for playing basketball, volleyball, tennis and softball, and playground equipment.

Improvements underway include: a new 25,000 KVA Tennessee Valley Authority substation to be completed in the fall of 1975; a new gym underway at the Summer Shade school; and a new library, arts, and science complex at the Metcalfe County High School.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Edmonton offers a supervised recreation program during the summer months. The new Metcalfe County Lake, only 3 miles from Edmonton, offers a variety of summer activities such as swimming, fishing, and picnicking.

Mammoth Cave National Park, located 29 miles from Edmonton, features 150 miles of charted caverns and vast areas not yet mapped. Also offered in this region is a national park and a state park, both with motel and lodging accommodations and camping facilities.

The Green River Lake is located 40 miles north of Edmonton. The dirt and rockfill dam - 141 feet high and 2,350 feet long - impounds a lake of 8,360 acres. Recreation includes fishing, boating, swimming, and picnicking.

Dale Hollow Reservoir, located 40 miles southeast of Edmonton, is a lake of approximately 27,000 acres which lies partly in Kentucky and partly in Tennessee. Boating and fishing are two main attractions.

Lake Cumberland State Resort Park, on the west side of Lake Cumberland, a 50,250-acre lake, is located 41 miles east of Edmonton. The park has a lodge, cottages, and camping facilities; and offers such recreational activities as swimming, boating, riding, hiking, golfing, picnicking, fishing, and tennis.

The Barren River Dam and Lake, southwest of Edmonton, provides fishing, swimming, and boating. The Barren River Lake Resort Park, open all year, features lodge accommodations and camping facilities.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.015 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.15 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, and goods in process inventories are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Property stored in public warehouses is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

All property is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

HISTORY

Metcalfe County, the one hundred sixth county formed in Kentucky, dates from 1860. Parts of it were taken from Adair, Barren, Cumberland, Green, and Monroe Counties. It has a great variety of soils, and the land surface ranges from flat riverside meadows to gently rolling hills. The Little Barren River and its tributaries drain most of the area.

Settlers entered Metcalfe County soon after the Revolutionary War, attracted by the well-drained and fertile lands as well as the comparative safety the region enjoyed from Indian raids. The well-known and frequently used Indian trails were to the north and west of the county. The John C. Hamilton family become the wealthiest and perhaps the best known of all the early settlers. This family owned several thousandacres of the best lands in the county, and carried on a profitable trade with the Natchez merchants.

Edmonton, the county seat of Metcalfe County was founded several years before the county was organized by Edmond P. Rogers, a Revolutionary soldier who migrated to Kentucky to claim lands set aside for those who rendered military services during that conflict. He added lands to his original grant and eventually owned several thousand acres. During his lifetime, however, the settlement at Edmonton was little more than a trading post and center of operation for farm activities. In 1860, when Metcalfe County was formed, Edmonton was incorporated and became the county seat.

Metcalfe County was named in honor of General Thomas Metcalfe, stone mason, soldier, state legislator, United States Congressman, governor and United States Senator.

In 1860, Metcalfe County had 6,745 inhabitants. The figure had reached 8,367 in 1960. There has been a decline since 1960 to 8,177 in 1970. Edmonton had a population of 958 in 1970 with a county area consisting of 296 square miles.

The county is predominantly agricultural, with agriculture employing 1,140 of a total 2,550 employed in 1972. Manufacturing employment has remained stable since 1963 and accounted for 220 jobs in 1973. The largest manufacturing firm in the county is the Edmonton Manufacturing Company.

With the recreational opportunities afforded by Lake Cumberland and Mammoth Cave region, tourism has become an important aspect of the economy.
