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CAVE CITY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Cave City, a small community of 1,818 inhabitants, is located in the heart of the Kentucky cave country, in northern Barren County. Located 2 miles from an accessway to Interstate 65, it is midway between Louisville and Nashville. Easy access to these major cities in Kentucky and Tennessee, in addition to its proximity to Glasgow, Bowling Green and the Mammoth Cave area, provide Cave City with many recreational and cultural advantages.

Barren County, which had a 1970 population of 28,677, encompasses an area of 468 square miles in the Pennyrile Region. Barren Lake forms the southwest boundary of the county.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Barren County averaged 13, 320 in 1972 with manufacturing providing 3, 460 of these jobs, trade and services 2, 965, and agriculture 2, 350. From 1963 to 1973, manufacturing employment increased 146 percent or by 2, 330 jobs. The major industrial product made in Cave City is work clothing.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1971 was \$2,775. Since 1961 per capita personal income has increased 80 percent.

The Cave City labor market area includes Barren and the six adjoining counties. Total employment in the area in 1972 averaged 59, 760 with agriculture providing 9,620 jobs, manufacturing 12,900, government 8,450 and trade and services 12,900. Since 1963, area manufacturing employment has increased over 136 percent or 8,540 jobs, with sharpest gains in the apparel and machinery and metal products industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 430 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current labor supply of 13,215 men and 11,090 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 6,930 young men and 6,560 young women will become 18 years of age by 1979 and be potentially available for employment.

- 2. The Louisville & Nashville Railroad provides Cave City with rail service. The nearest piggyback service is at Glasgow, 11 miles away. An Interstate 65 interchange is located within Cave City's western city limits. Cave City is served by eight truck lines with a United Parcel Service shipping center at Bowling Green, 31 miles away. The nearest commercial air service is at Standiford Field in Louisville, 75 miles away.
- 3. Cave City is served by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. Electricity for Cave City and Barren County is provided by the Kentucky Utilities Company and Farmers RECC. Barren County is also served by Warren RECC. Two distributors of propane and four distributors of distillate fuel oil serve Cave City.
- 4. Barren County is served by the Caverna Independent and the Barren County School Systems. One state university, one senior college, one junior college, and one community college are located within a 55-mile radius. The nearest state vocational-technical school is located at Bowling Green, 31 miles away. The nearest area education center is located at Glasgow, 11 miles away.

Community Programs for Improvement

The Cave City firehouse and city jail have recently been expanded.

Recent improvements in the Barren County School System include the new Barren County High School, Barren County Vocational School and a new football field.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Cave City is located in the heart of Kentucky's beautiful cave country. Mammoth Cave is located approximately 10 miles away. Features at Mammoth Cave National Park include guided tours of the cave, a scenic boat cruise, lodge, cottages, dining room, coffee shop, service station, tennis, shuffleboard, wildlife preserve and nature trails. Other caves in the area include Diamond Caverns, Mammoth Onyx Cave, Jesse James Cave, Crystal Onyx Cave, and Hundred Dome Cave.

Within 50 miles of Cave City are Barren River Reservoir, Nolin Reservoir, and Green River, providing many water sports and activities.

Barren River Lake State Resort Park is located approximately 25 miles from Cave City. Facilities and activities at this park include a lodge, coffee shop, cottages, camping, swimming, boating, picnic area, playground, fishing, restaurant, pool, riding stables, nature trails and golf course.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

HISTORY

Barren County, thirty-seventh county in Kentucky, was established in 1798. Its territory was taken from Green and Warren Counties. Later, parts of Barren County helped form Allen, Monroe, and Metcalfe Counties.

Barren County got its name from the dominance of young and undersized trees in the area which resulted from the Indian practice of clearing the land to facilitate hunting buffalo and other game. The county is in the heart of the fabled hunting grounds of the Indians.

The area was also a favorite locale of prehistoric people as shown by numerous mounds that dot the country side. Archaeologists believe that the mounds were built by prehistoric Indians.

Two of the Commonwealth's chief executives have been Barren County residents: Preston H. Leslie, the State's twenty-sixth governor, assumed duties in 1871, and nearly 97 years later, another Barren Countian, Louie B. Nunn, was inaugurated to the same office.

Barren County's population increased 1.3 percent from 28,303 in 1960 to 28,677 in 1970. Cave City had a 1970 population of 1,818, a 28 percent increase from the 1960 population of 1,418.

Manufacturing employment in Barren County increased 146 percent from 1,593 in March 1963 to 3,923 ten years later. The major product made in Cave City is work clothing. Major manufacturers are Mammoth Cave Garment Company, Rolco Manufacturing, Inc., and Space Travelers, Inc.
