JACKSON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Jackson, the county seat of Breathitt County, is located in eastern Kentucky, 160 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky, 80 miles southeast of Lexington, Kentucky, and 195 miles northeast of Knoxville, Tennessee. Jackson had an estimated 1973 population of 1,869.

Breathitt County lies in the Eastern Coal Field Region of Kentucky and covers a land area of 494 square miles. In 1974, the county had an estimated population of 15, 300.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Breathitt County residents employed in 1974 averaged 4,610, including 200 in agriculture and 1,220 in government. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 50 workers; trade and services firms employed 740; mining employed 855. Major industrial products are soft drinks and lumber.

Total unemployment in Breathitt County averaged 6.1 percent of the labor force in 1974.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1973 was \$1,810, an increase of 44.6 percent since 1969.

The Jackson labor market area includes Breathitt and the six adjoining counties. The total number of residents of the labor market area employed in 1974 averaged 26,050, including 1,050 in agriculture and 5,810 in government. Manufacturing employers in the labor market area reported 1,025 workers; trade and services firms employed 4,640; mining reported 6,820.

Resources for Growth

- 1. Labor Supply There is a current labor supply of 9,820 men and 7,400 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 5,070 young men and 4,820 young women in the area will become 18 years of age before 1981 and potentially available for work.
- 2. Transportation Rail service is provided by the Louisville and Nashville Railroad. Highway access is provided by Kentucky Routes 15, 30, and 52. Jackson is 21 miles south of the Mountain Parkway which links with Interstate 64. Access to the Daniel Boone Parkway,

which connects with Interstate 75 at London, Kentucky, can be reached 29 miles to the south. Three truck lines serve Jackson. A small craft airport is located at Hazard, 31 miles distant. Commercial air service is available at Blue Grass Field in Lexington, 80 miles away.

- 3. Power and Fuel Kentucky Power Company furnishes electricity to Jackson and parts of Breathitt County. Licking Valley RECC serves the remaining portion of the county. Panbowl Gas Company provides natural gas service to Jackson. There are five distributors of propane and butane and five distributors of distillate fuel oil in the Jackson area. Low sulphur content coal is available locally.
- 4. Education Breathitt County has two public school systems, the Jackson Independent School District and the Breathitt County School System.

Lees Junior College, with an enrollment of 319, is located in Jackson. In addition, two other junior colleges and two community colleges are within 65 miles of Jackson.

The Breathitt County Area Vocational Education Center, located in Jackson, offers seven areas of training. The nearest state vocational-technical school is located at Hazard, 31 miles away, and offers training in twenty areas.



WAGES

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.015 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.15 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment and goods in process inventories are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Property stored in public warehouses is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

All property is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

RECREATION

Local

The people of Jackson are striving to improve their recreational facilities. Jackson already has two parks, four playgrounds, a swimming pool, a baseball diamond, a movie theater, and a supervised little league program. Recently, Lees Junior College constructed two new tennis courts that are open to the public.

Presently an 8-acre park is under construction and is expected to be completed by the summer of 1976. Facilities will include two lighted tennis courts, a softball diamond, a badminton court, a multipurpose court, a tot lot, and a shelter area.

Area (With 35 miles)

Approximately 35 miles from Jackson is Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park. It includes 856 acres of land, a 1,230-acre lake, a lodge, and camping facilities. The area offers fishing, a beach, dock, both covered and open boat slips, picnic shelter, and playground.

The Daniel Boone National Forest lies near Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park. This vast Kentucky timberland encompasses hundreds of natural and historical attractions. Throughout the forest are picnic areas playgrounds, hiking areas, camping, fishing, and boating.

Natural Bridge State Resort Park and the Red River Gorge are within 35 miles of Jackson. This beautiful area of the Daniel Boone National Forest abounds with sandstone arches, rugged cliffs, mountain streams, and scenic overlooks. Other features are a skylift, swimming pool, and lodge.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Prestolite, Wire Division of Eltra Corporation, manufacturers of battery cables, located in Jackson. The plant will employ 150 people by the end of 1976. The remaining 24 acres of the industrial site is being leveled. Excess dirt is being hauled to prepare a site for a new 8-acre park. The completed facilities will feature two lighted tennis courts, softball diamond, badminton court, multi-purpose court, tot lot, and shelter area.

A bypass, connecting Kentucky Highway 15 and Kentucky Highways 52 and 30, is under construction.

With the completion of new office and maintenance buildings, Falcon Coal Company has transferred their operations to Jackson.

The Haddix-Lost Creek Water District is being organized.

The Jackson Independent School District is completely renovating the high school. A new storage and maintenance building is planned.

The Breathitt County School System will complete a new middle school and athletic field by August, 1976.

The construction of 72 low-rent housing units is planned.

HISTORY

Because of its early isolation, little is known of the history of the Jackson area prior to the arrival of the pioneers. A limited number of Indian artifacts found indicate that the many Indian tribes inhabiting the lands of the Appalachian Plateau generally regarded the interior as a forbidden place and avoided it except in time of dire necessity. The early remoteness of Jackson to other areas of Kentucky and the developing areas of the nation had a pronounced effect on Jackson's development.

Jackson is the county seat of Breathitt County. Breathitt County was formed in 1839 from parts of Estill, Clay, and Perry Counties. The county was named in honor of the Governor of Kentucky at that time, John Breathitt. Shortly thereafter, a commission was appointed to locate a county seat. In 1839, Simon Cockrell conveyed to the county a gift of ten acres for a town site, and in 1845, Jackson was named in honor of General Andrew Jackson.

During the period Jackson was establishing itself as a county seat, other functions also developed. Jackson became a small commercial center for a limited area. At that time, the principal means of transportation was the Kentucky River, and Jackson became an unloading point in the transport of commercial goods since most of the stream above Jackson was not navigable. Consequently, many of the early general stores were established near the river. Lodging became a necessity and several hotels were built during this period of Jackson's early development.

In 1891, Jackson incorporated. The Kentucky Union Railroad reached Jackson in 1891, and as the railroad's eastern terminal, the city enjoyed a growing boom that was to last for twenty years. In 1912, the railroad was extended to Hazard, and Jackson's importance as a regional trading center diminished.

Since the early 1900's, the county's economy has relied primarily on coal mining and small sawmilling operations. But today, with the opening of new highways in Eastern Kentucky, Jackson and Breathitt County have the potential of becoming a center of trade and industry.

In 1850, Breathitt County had a population of 3,785. By 1950, this had climbed to 19,964, followed by a decline to 14,221 in 1970. In 1974, the population had increased to 15,300.

The total number of Breathitt County residents employed in 1974 averaged 4,610, including 200 in agriculture and 1,220 in government. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 50 workers; trade and services firms employed 740; mining employed 855. The major manufacturing firms are Royal Crown Bottling Company, a manufacturer of soft drinks, and Mt. Top, Inc., a manufacturer of lumber.
