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
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
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CARROLLTON LABOR MARKET AREA

CARROLLTON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Carrollton, the county seat of Carroll County, is located in northern Kentucky in the Outer Blue Grass Region. The Ohio River forms the northern boundary of the county. Carrollton, noted as a burley tobacco auction market, is located on the Ohio River near the point where the Kentucky River empties into it. Carrollton is approximately 55 miles from both Louisville, Kentucky and Cincinnati, Ohio. The 1970 population of Carrollton was 3,884 and of Carroll County 8,523.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Carroll County in 1970 averaged 3,400 with agriculture providing 500 jobs, manufacturing 1,200, trade and services 1,150, and government 400. Since 1961 manufacturing employment has increased by approximately 129 percent. Major industrial products are: aluminum appliance trim, tin organic chemicals, metal collapsible tubes, and aluminum extrusions.

Per capita income in the county in 1969 was \$2,840. Between 1959 and 1969, per capita personal income in the county increased approximately 77 percent.

The Carrollton labor market area includes Carroll County and the four surrounding counties. Area employment in 1970 totaled 11,100 jobs with agriculture providing 3,700 jobs, manufacturing 1,685, trade and services 2,040, and government 1,500. Industrial employment in this area has increased approximately 157 percent since 1961 with sharpest gains in chemicals, primary metals, and fabricated metal products.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 2,073 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 900 men and 1,015 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 1,850 young men and 1,665 young women will become 18 years of age by 1978 and potentially available for work.

2. The local transportation capability is good. The Carrollton Railroad, which is a subsidiary of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, serves Carroll County with a variety of services. The county has more than adequate trucking service. I-71, the major highway link between Louisville and Cincinnati, is approximately 4 miles from the Carrollton city limits. Carrollton is also served by U. S. 42, U. S. 31, and U. S. 227. Commercial air service is available at either Louisville or Cincinnati, both approximately 55 miles distant. Due to Carrollton's location at the confluence of the Ohio and Kentucky Rivers, the water transportation potential is excellent.

3. Kentucky Utilities Company provides electric power to Carrollton. Natural gas is furnished by the Carrollton Utilities Company, whose source of supply is the Texas Gas Transmission Corporation.

4. Industrial sites - Carrollton has eleven sites available for industrial use.

5. Education is an important growth asset for Carroll County. One school system operates within the county. One community college, four senior colleges and two universities are located within 55 miles of the county.

The Carroll County Vocational Extension Center is located in Carrollton and offers training in seven different areas. The Northern Kentucky Area Vocational School is only 54 miles from Carrollton and offers 20 different courses.

Community Programs for Improvement

Carrollton received a Certificate of Excellence award in the 1971 All-Kentucky City program. This award was the result of successful community programs. The city is actively continuing its programs for community improvements. Completed projects which have been beneficial to the city include: a \$1,200,000 expansion of the hospital, a new middle school, remodeling of the high school, completion of a lowrent housing project, extension of the Carrollton Railroad, and improvements in the electrical, water and gas systems. Currently under construction at Carrollton is a new Kentucky Utilities Company office, and a \$100,000,000 Kentucky Utilities Company power plant is under construction in Carroll County.

Planned improvements include: expansion of the library, more recreational facilities for the local city park, a new public swimming pool, remodeling of the courthouse, a municipal boat ramp, and a community college.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

The Carroll County Recreation Department provides a variety of organized summer sports and recreational activities. Point Park, located within the city limits, is a three-acre park with playgrounds and picnic tables. It is located at the point where the Kentucky River flows into the Ohio River.

General Butler State Resort Park is an 809-acre park located at Carrollton. This resort-type park is at the site of a 25-acre lake. The Butler Mansion contains a museum of Ohio River lore, with visual interpretation of the riverboat era. The park has a lodge, cottages, a heated lodge pool, beach, and bathhouse. Boat rental, paddle boats, and dock are available. Recreation includes swimming, fishing, camping, hiking, and horseback riding. Other facilities include miniature and nine-hole golf courses, shuffleboard courts, playgrounds, supervised recreation, picnic shelters, and a miniature train ride around the park.

Lake Jericho Recreation Area, 20 miles south of Carrollton, has a 426-acre play area. Lake Jericho, 138 acres, has been stocked for fishing. Facilities include campsites, bathhouse, boat rentals, dock, launching ramps, and picnic areas.

Churchill Downs, home of the Kentucky Derby, is located in Louisville, only 55 miles from Carrollton. Two thoroughbred racing meets and the world-famous Kentucky Derby are held there annually. Thoroughbred racing is also held at Miles Park in Louisville. Harness racing is offered at Louisville Downs in the spring and summer.

Both thoroughbred and harness racing are featured at Latonia Race Track, located at Florence, 43 miles northeast of Carrollton. Two meets for thoroughbreds and one for harness racing are held annually.

Proximity to Louisville, which is only 55 miles distant, provides the area with entertainment such as the Kentucky State Fair, Actor's Theatre, the Kentucky Opera Association, Louisville Ballet, Louisville Orchestra, as well as collegiate and professional sporting events.

Cultural and sporting events are also available at Cincinnati, Ohio, 55 miles away, which is the home of the Cincinnati Summer Opera, the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, the Cincinnati Reds baseball team, the Cincinnati Bengals football team, and the Cincinnati Swords hockey team.

HISTORY

Carroll County is situated in northcentral Kentucky and covers an area of 131 square miles. Its surface is predominantly hilly, its soil fairly fertile, and timber grows throughout its area. The Ohio River forms the northern boundary of the county, and the Kentucky River flows through the middle of the county. Carrollton, the county seat, is located at the point where the Kentucky River flows into the Ohio.

The first man to visit the Carroll County area was James McBride, who came down the Ohio River as early as 1754. Some thirty-one years later a settlement was begun on the point at the confluence of the Kentucky and Ohio Rivers, but it was destroyed in an Indian raid. Marauding Indians also forced Captain Ellison, who had built a blockhouse on the same site the next year, to abandon his home. Not until 1789, when General Charles Scott built a third blockhouse and fortified the site was a permanent settlement assured. This blockhouse was occupied until 1792 when the town of Port William (present-day Carrollton) was planned. Port William was incorporated in 1794. In 1838 Carroll County became the eighty-seventh county established in Kentucky; its territory was taken from Gallatin County.

Both Carroll County and Carrollton, the county seat, were named for Charles Carrollton of Carrollton, Maryland. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and out-lived all of the others who affixed their signatures to the document.

Carroll County's population increased from 5,526 in 1850 to a high of 9,825 in 1900. From 1900 the population slowly decreased to 7,978 in 1960, but rose again to 8,533 in 1970.

Since 1961 manufacturing employment has increased by 130 percent and in 1970, 2,900 of the county's 3,400 workers were employed in nonagricultural jobs. In 1971, manufacturing provided 875 jobs. Major industrial products are furniture, metal products, and chemicals. Largest among Carrollton's industrial plants are: M & T Chemicals, Incorporated; Kawneer Company, which produces aluminum trim and auto parts; Teledyne Wirz, which makes metal collapsible tubing; and Consolidated Aluminum Corporation, which does aluminum extrusion.

Several important people have lived in Carroll County. General Percival Butler, a member of the family for whom Butler State Park was named, was a Revolutionary War soldier who was with Washington at Valley Forge, and later fought in the Battles of Monmouth and Yorktown. He migrated to Kentucky in 1792, settled first in present day Jessamine County, then after becoming adjutant-general of the state, moved to the mouth of the Kentucky River in 1796, and helped develop Port William into a thriving Ohio River town. General William Orlando Butler, son of General Percival Butler, fought in the War of 1812 and in the Mexican War of 1846-48. In 1848, he succeeded General Winfield Scott in the Command of the Army in Mexico until a treaty of peace was signed. He was a losing candidate for the vice-presidency of the United States in 1848.
