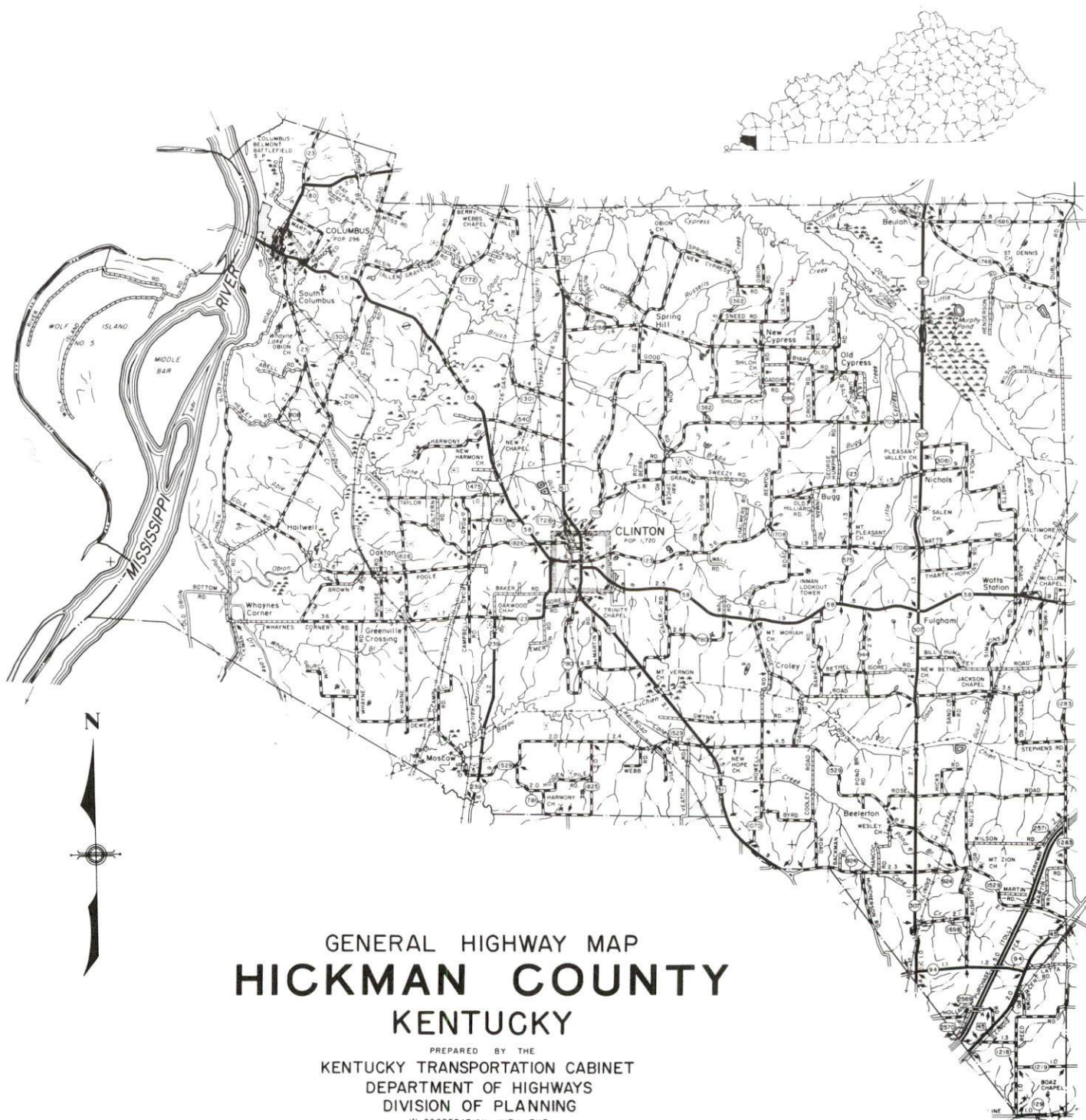

CLINTON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Clinton, the county seat of Hickman County, is located in extreme southwestern Kentucky, nine miles east of the Mississippi River. Clinton is located 248 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; 159 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee; and 207 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri. The city of Clinton had a 1990 population of 1,547.

Hickman County, covering a land area of 245 square miles, is one of eight counties which comprise Kentucky's Jackson Purchase Region. Hickman County had a 1990 population of 5,566.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Hickman County residents employed in 1991 averaged 2,472. In 1990, manufacturing firms in the county reported 451 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 180 jobs; 205 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 217 employees; and contract construction firms provided 20 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 6,893 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1992 through 1996, 3,702 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

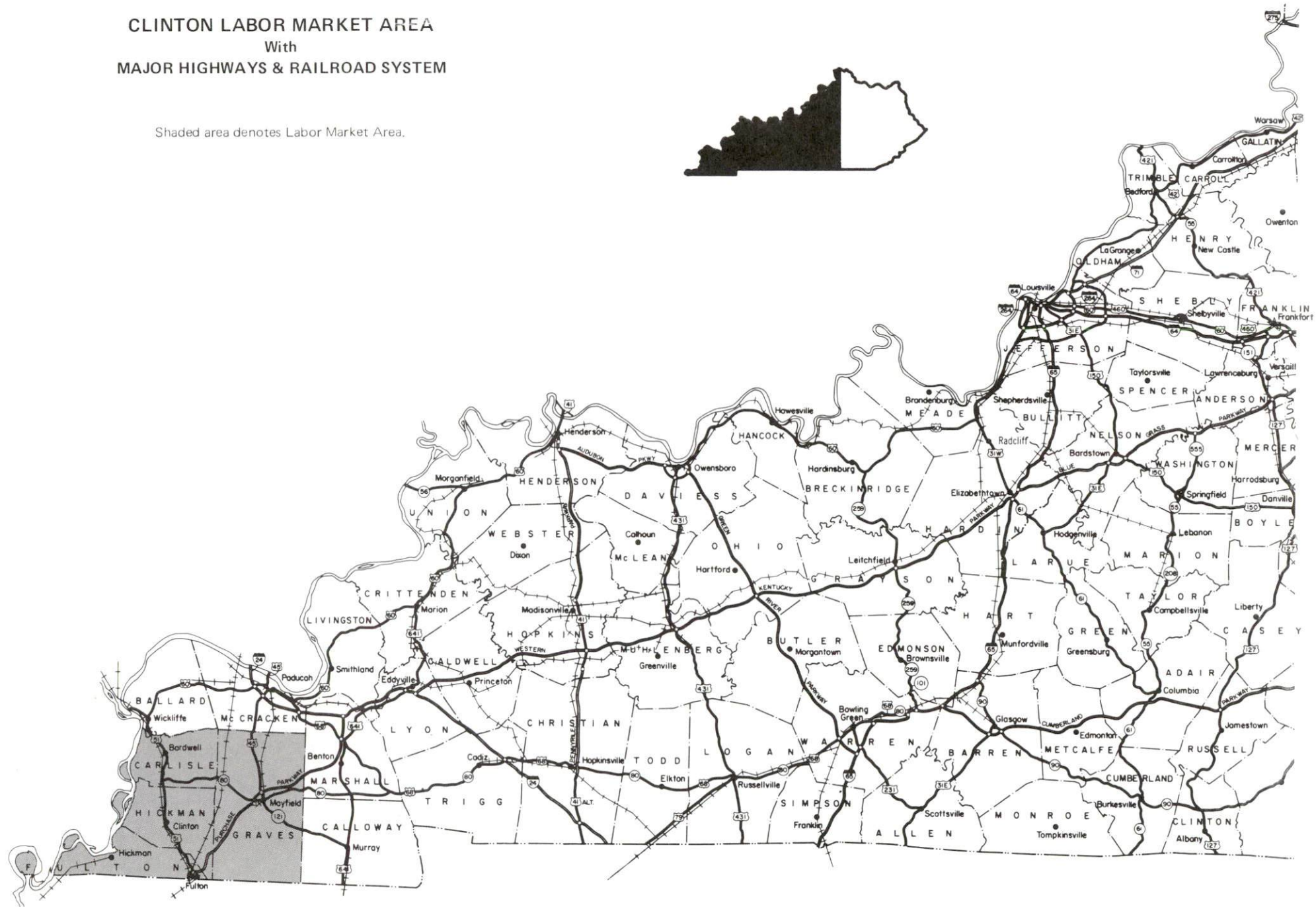
Transportation - Highways serving Clinton are U.S. Highway 51 and Kentucky Highway 58 both "AAA"-rated trucking highways. The Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane toll road can be accessed 13 miles southeast of Clinton via U.S. 51. Twenty trucking firms provide service to Clinton. Illinois Central Railroad provides rail service to the city. The nearest commercial airline service is available at Barkley Regional Airport near Paducah, 41 miles northeast, and the nearest small craft airport is in Fulton, Kentucky, 12 miles southeast of Clinton. Public riverport facilities are located at Hickman, Kentucky on the Mississippi River, 18 miles southwest of Clinton.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Clinton and portions of Hickman County by the Kentucky Utilities Company. The remainder of Hickman County is served by the Hickman-Fulton County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation and West Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided by the Commonwealth Service Corporation.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Clinton by the Hickman County School System. Four senior colleges and one community college are located within 59 miles of Clinton. The nearest state vocational-technical school is located at Paducah, 45 miles distant. The nearest area vocational education centers are located in Hickman, 18 miles distant, and Mayfield, 22 miles distant.

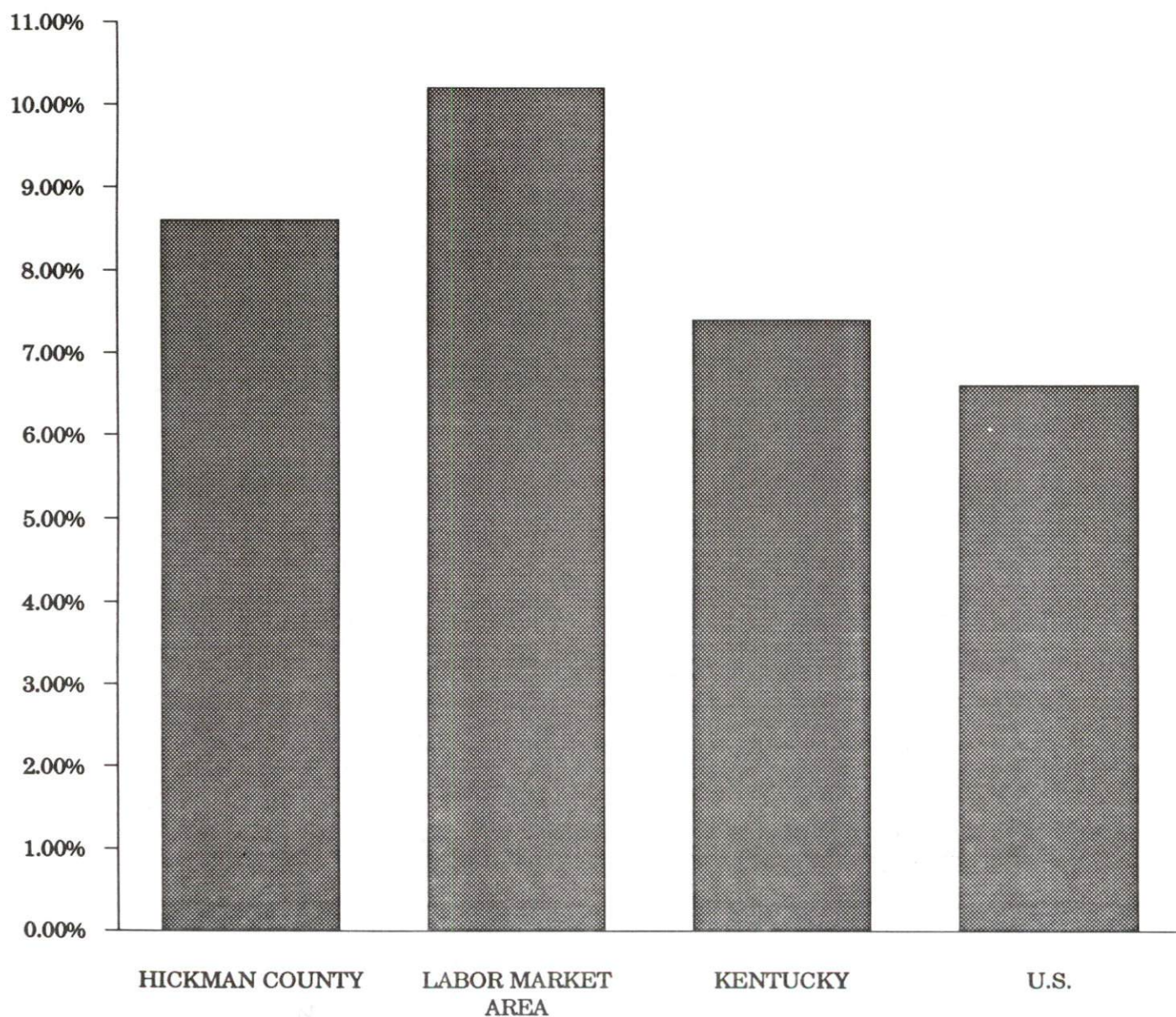

UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1991

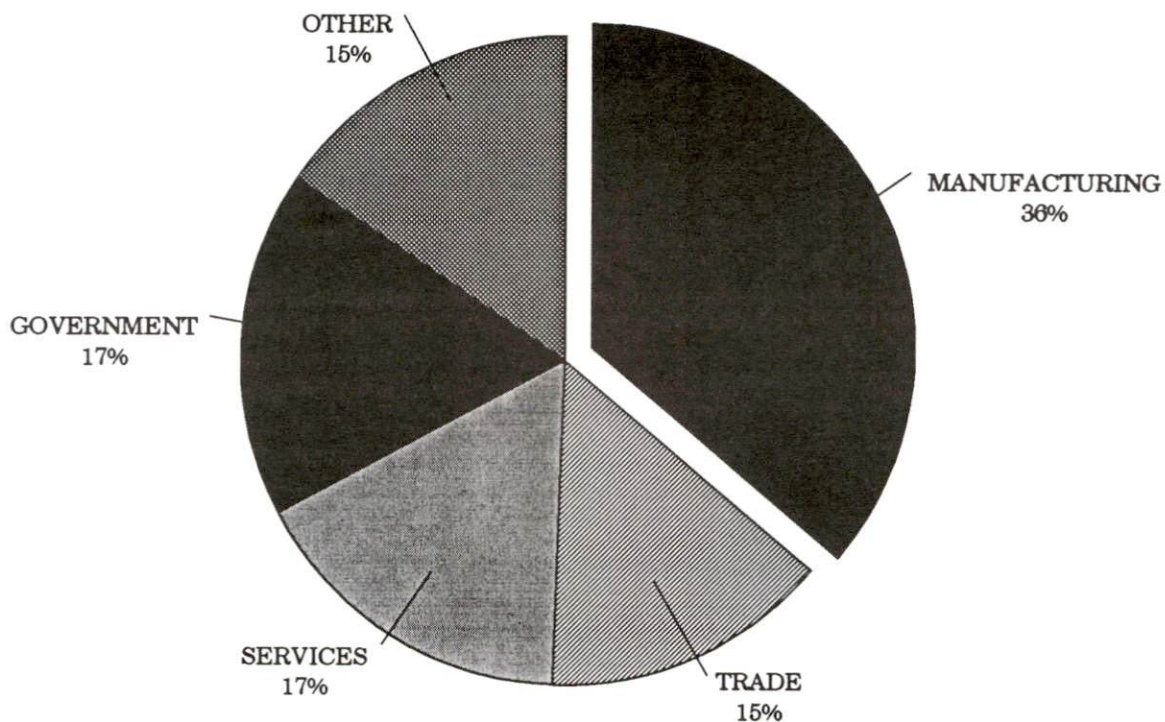

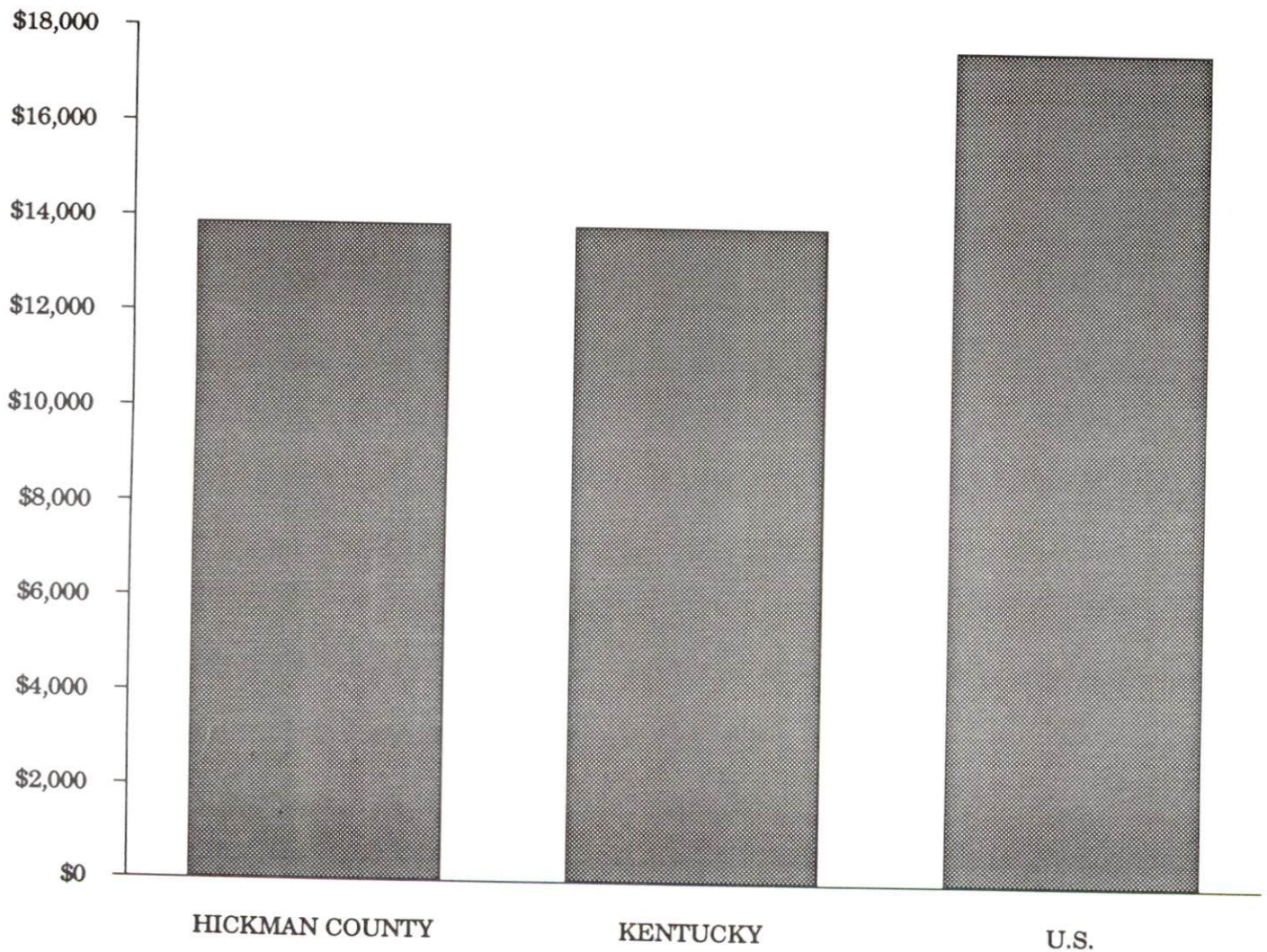

AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES

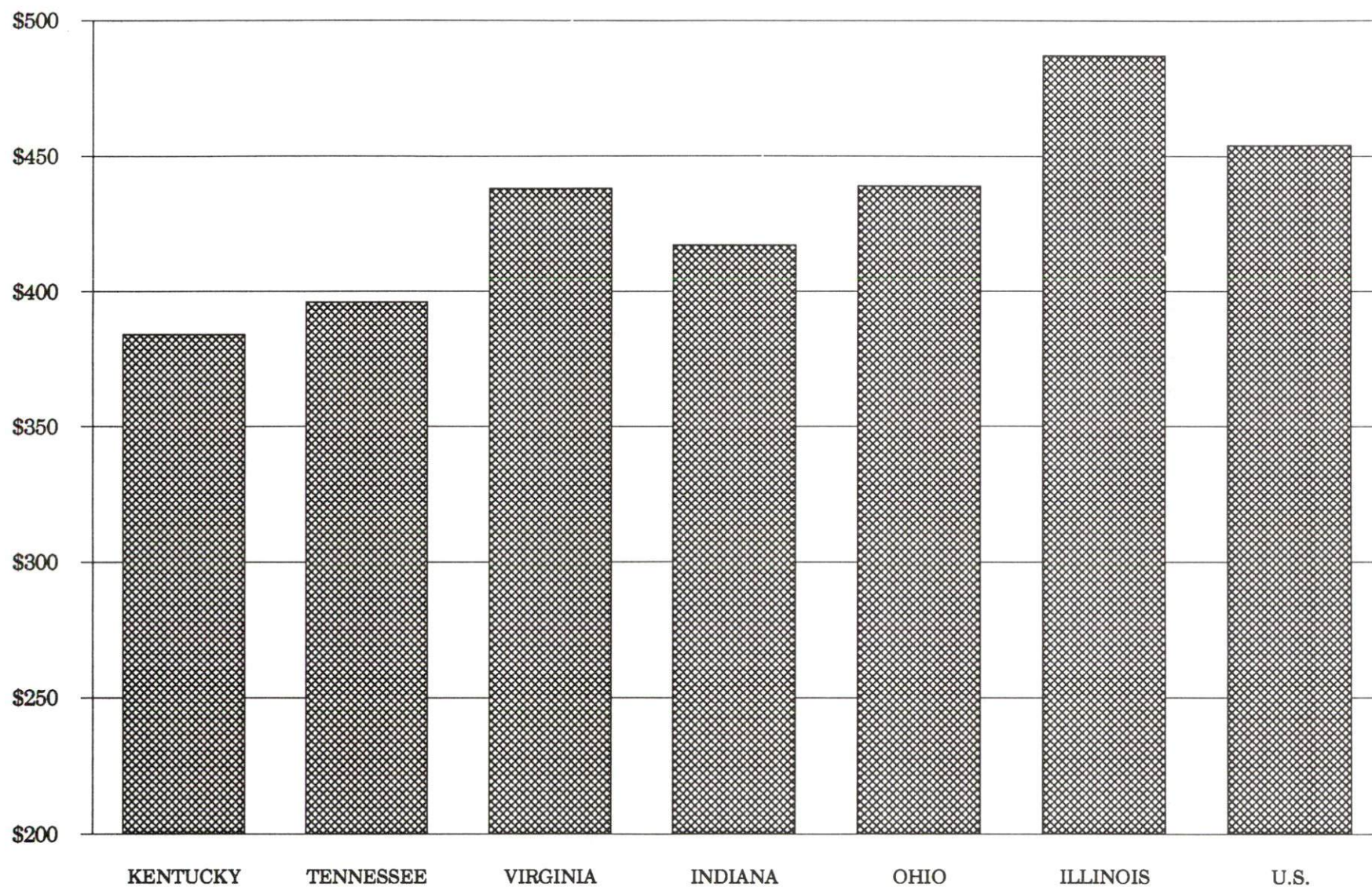
Hickman County is served by the Mayfield local office of the Kentucky Department for Employment Services. The focus of the following data is on job placements made by the Mayfield local office and may therefore be used as an indicator of the wages which employers in the area pay new employees. During the twelve months which ended on June 30, 1990, the local employment office filled 2,823 job openings in various occupational categories. The average hourly wage for selected occupational categories were:

TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Clinton is served directly by U.S. Highway 51 and Kentucky Highway 58, both "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. U.S. Highway 51 connects Clinton with both the Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane toll road 13 miles southeast near Fulton, and Interstate 57 near Cairo, Illinois, 35 miles northwest. Kentucky Highway 58 also connects Clinton with the Purchase Parkway, 14 miles east near Wingo. Interstate 24 can be accessed 41 miles northeast of Clinton via U.S. Highway 51 and U.S. Highway 62.

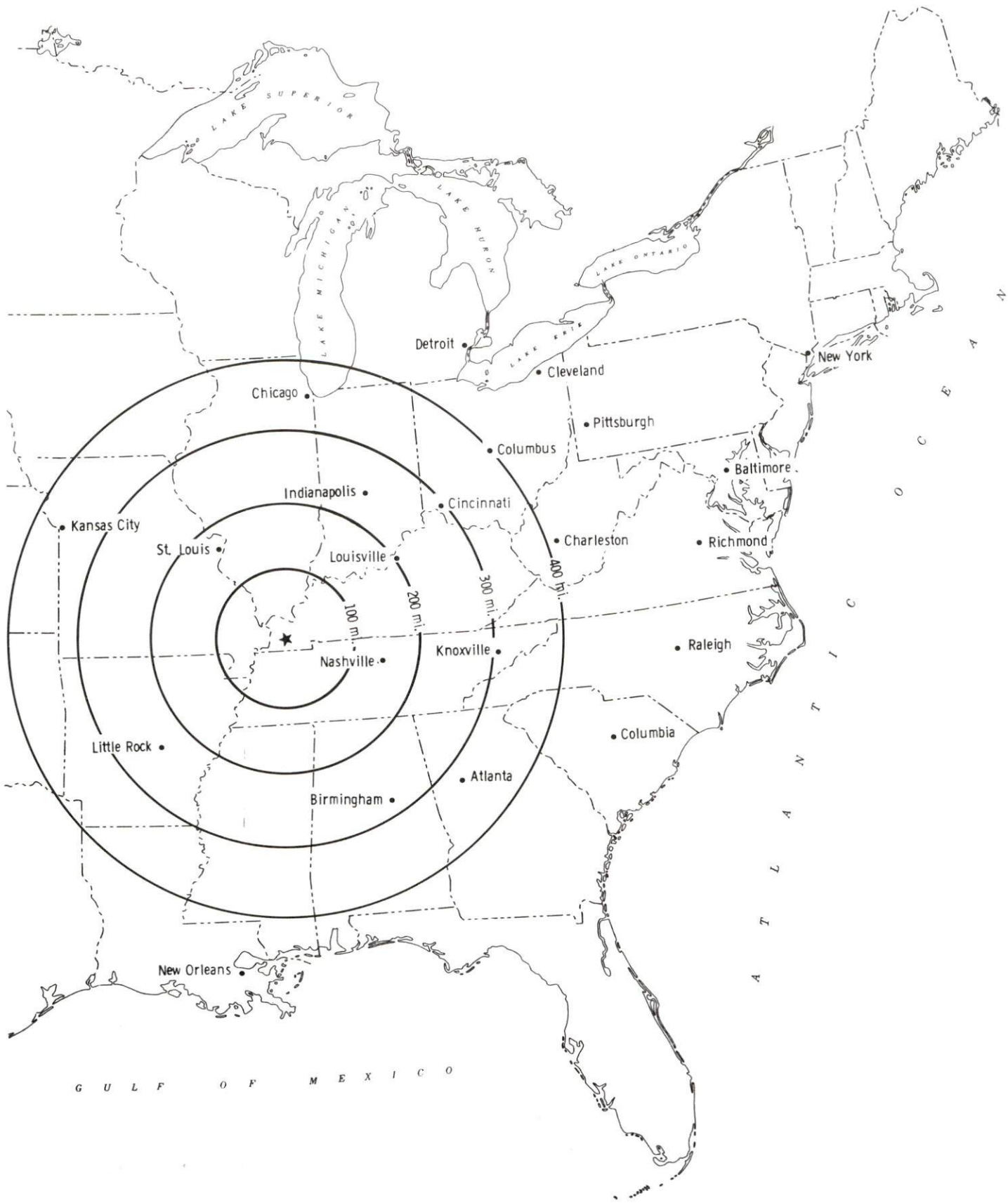

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The city of Clinton is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Hickman County is served by a judge/executive and three magistrates. Each county official is elected to a four-year term.

Planning and Zoning

There is not a planning and zoning commission in Clinton or Hickman County at the present time.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The city of Clinton levies an annual occupational license fee ranging from \$25 to \$250. License fees for manufacturers range from \$75 to \$250.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

The Hickman County Parks and Recreation Board maintains two parks within the city of Clinton, and one park in the community of Fulgham. The Blair Street Park consists of a basketball court, picnic area, and playground. Two baseball/softball fields, a gazebo for musical and theatrical performances, and a community center are available at the Clinton-Hickman County Park. The Fulgham Park has a baseball field and a softball field.

Clinton residents have access to privately owned and maintained tennis courts and a swimming pool. A privately owned country club in Clinton maintains a golf course, tennis courts, and a swimming pool.

The Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park at Columbus, nine miles northwest of Clinton, provides an array of recreational opportunities. Attractions at the park include a Confederate cannon, a network of earthen trenches, and a massive chain and anchor from the Civil War era that was strung across the Mississippi River to stop union forces. In addition, the 156-acre park has a campground, miniature golf, a picnic area, playground, snack bar, gift shop, boat ramp, and a historical hiking trail. A visit to the museum at the park, which is in a building that served as a Civil War infirmary, offers a display of Civil War relics and early Indian artifacts and an audiovisual slide program on the Battle of Belmont.

Murphy's Pond, a biologically unique section of eastern Hickman County, is a very primitive area that contains every kind of wildlife native in Kentucky and most of the central United States. Murray State University, the owner of Murphy's Pond, developed portions of the pond into a wildlife recreational area so that visitors may better observe and understand the pond's many rare species and abundance of wildlife.

Hunting and fishing are popular sports among residents of Hickman County. Game at the Clinton Shooting Preserve includes quail, pheasant and chukar partridge. Guides are available. Fishing in various privately owned lakes throughout the county are opened to the public.
