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WKU student creates touching video for KODA

Brendan Sullivan, a WKU Photojournalism graduate, created a video titled "Young At Heart" which is featured on vimeo.com. The video tells the story of Jon Clark, an 18-year-old Bowling Green resident whose organs were donated after a car crash claimed his life in September of 2000, to Jerry Mudd, a Louisville resident. "On September 23, 2000, our lives came crashing together and we became one," said Jerry Mudd. "He is a part of me forever."

Jon was described by his mother, Linda Clark, as being "Happy, energetic, creative, fun, passionate. He just loved life." According to Mrs. Clark, Jon's decision to become an organ donor was an easy one. When she explained to Jon exactly what it meant to be an organ donor, he responded with "Well, yeah, that would be stupid not to do that."

GEAR UP Student Featured at Commonwealth Commitment News Conference

Ben Whitlock, a GEAR UP student from Green County, was selected to represent all Kentucky Students at the news conference on September 1st to announce The Commonwealth Commitment. The Commonwealth Commitment is the new term for Senate Bill 1 which was passed by the last session of the General Assembly. One of the requirements in Senate Bill 1 is a much closer working relationship between secondary and post secondary education to insure students are prepared when they reach post secondary education. The News Conference included all eight university presidents, President of the Council on Post Secondary Education, Commissioner for the KY Department of Education, and the First Lady, Jane Beshear.

Whitlock spoke at the conference and told those present that he was excited about his future, "Education in Kentucky offers a lot of opportunities and some challenges," said Whitlock. "I think the biggest challenge is low expectations for our students. Kentucky students are smart and capable but they need to be challenged and more needs to be expected from them."

This is not the first time Whitlock has been in a leadership role. Last September he was selected to speak to the audience for the first session of the First Lady, Jane Beshear's, Graduate Kentucky Summit in Frankfort. In July, 2009, he was selected as one of 30 students in the country to participate in the NCCEP Youth Leadership program in San Francisco. He also

was selected to participate in Roger's Scholars the summer of 2009 and in Governor's Scholars the summer of 2010. He is still trying to decide which university he wants to attend. He is a senior this year at Green County High School, and he has decided he will go to an in-state college. WKU is still in the running but he has not finalized his decision yet. His long term goal is a career in medicine.

KRS Instructor Bill Edwards Inducted Into Hall Of Fame

Bill Edwards, a part of the athletic training scene at Western Kentucky University for nearly 40 years, was honored last month when he was inducted into the Kentucky Athletic Trainers Society Hall of Fame in ceremonies at Northern Kentucky University.

“Doc E”- as he is known to both Hilltopper athletes and coaches- continues to enjoy his lengthy career at the helm of the WKU athletic training program.

A veteran of both the Ohio Valley and Sun Belt Conferences, Edwards was named Head Athletic Trainer at WKU in August, 1983, after serving as an assistant athletic trainer for six years. He joined the Topper training staff as an undergraduate in 1970, then served as a graduate assistant trainer before joining the full-time training staff in 1977. He holds a bachelor's degree in physical education and a master's degree in secondary education from WKU.

Recently promoted to Associate Athletic Director and Director of Athletic Training and Sports Medicine, Edwards coordinates a large group of sports medicine specialists.

In addition to his daily athletic training duties, he also serves as an instructor in the department of Kinesiology, Recreation, and Sport (KRS) at WKU.

Edwards was a founding member of the Kentucky Athletic Trainers Society and served as treasurer of the organization from its beginning in 1983 through 1992.
