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#### LEE COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

#### Location

Lee County is located at the edge of historic Daniel Boone National Forest in southeastern Kentucky. Beattyville, county seat of Lee County, is 137 miles from Louisville, Kentucky; 128 miles from Huntington, West Virginia; 140 miles from Cincinnati, Ohio; and 150 miles from Knoxville, Tennessee.

Lee County had a 1970 population of 6,587 and Beattyville had a population of 923.

#### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Lee County averaged 1,500 in 1969. Government jobs accounted for 300 of this figure with trade and services providing 230 jobs and agriculture and manufacturing each providing 200 jobs. During the 1960's manufacturing employment increased by approximately 130 percent. The county's major industrial product is women's shoes.

Per capita income in the county in 1969 was \$1,480, an increase of 120 percent since 1959. Total personal income has increased by 105 percent in the past decade.

The Lee County labor market area includes Lee County and its six surrounding counties. Area employment in 1969 totaled 12,200 including 3,200 agricultural jobs, 3,100 government jobs, and 1,000 jobs in manufacturing. Area industrial employment has increased by approximately 52 percent since 1960, with the sharpest gains in the leather, machinery and metal product industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 4,925 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing is excellent.

#### Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 5,020 men and 4,670 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 4,425 young men and 4,240 young women will become 18 years of age by 1977 and potentially available for work.

- 2. The local transportation capability is good. The Louisville & Nashville Railroad provides the county with a variety of services. The Mountain Parkway, which is only 20 miles north of Beattyville, provides the area with easy access to Interstates 64 and 75. Commercial air service is provided by the London-Corbin War Memorial Airport, 55 miles to the southwest, and Blue Grass Field, 69 miles northwest at Lexington.
- 3. Electricity is provided by the Kentucky Utilities Company and the Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. The water supply from the Kentucky River is more than adequate for industrial growth.
- 4. Industrial sites Lee County has five industrial sites, totaling 206 acres, available for industrial use.
- 5. Lee County has a consolidated school system and a private elementary school. The Hazard Area Vocational School, 54 miles distant, is the nearest area school. There is a vocational extension center located in Beattyville, which provides training in seven courses.

There are four universities, two senior colleges, three junior colleges, and one community college located within 75 miles of Beattyville.

#### Community Programs for Improvement

The communities of Lee County are actively striving to improve living and recreational conditions for their present and prospective inhabitants.

Recent community improvements: The Southside Water Association, Inc., has been formed and is now in operation. It purchases treated water from the Beattyville Water Works and serves an area that includes Proctor and an area south of Proctor and south of Beattyville.

Beattyville has completed 45 units of low-rent housing and 25 more units have been approved.

In 1968 Lee County completed the construction of a middle school to accommodate 500 sixth, seventh, and eighth grade pupils. In 1971 the new board of education offices were completed and \$40,000 worth of blacktopping was done to school parking lots and playgrounds in the county.

Community improvements under construction: Beattyville has a 65-unit home for the aged under construction. The total cost of the structure will be in excess of \$300,000.

The Lee County Board of Education has an auditorium, which will seat 500 people, under construction adjacent to the present high school. Adjacent to the auditorium will be a health and nutritional classroom with facilities for a school nurse, and a physical education facility to serve the Lee County Upper Elementary School.

#### Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Beattyville's location in the eastern Kentucky mountains provides a great recreational potential.

Beattyville is located at the edge of the Daniel Boone National Forest. Other scenic areas that are only a short driving time from Beattyville are: Natural Bridge State Resort Park, Fort Boonesborough State Park, Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park, and Levi Jackson Wilderness Road State Park.

#### HISTORY

Lee County lies in southeastern Kentucky, covering 210 square miles. Near its center at Beattyville is the confluence of the North and South Forks of the Kentucky River, from which point the Kentucky flows to the county's western border. The land surface is hilly to mountainous, with the soil thin on the hillsides but fertile in the river valleys. Daniel Boone Natural Forest extends throught the western half of the county, and over three-fourths of the area is forested.

The earliest visitor to Lee County was Dr. Thomas Walker, who in 1750 explored several eastern Kentucky counties, and then rejoined the remainder of his party in Knox County. Walker gave a very favorable report concerning eastern Kentucky to the Loyal Land Company of Virginia. The trails cut by Walker were later used and charted by the armies fighting the French and Indian War. Another group of visitors was the McAfee Company, which had been surveying land near Harrodsburg in 1773. The first settlers in the area were primarily ex-soldiers and Indian fighters, including A.D. McGuire who fought in the Battle of Tippecanoe, Jacob Miller, who had been a scout for Daniel Boone, and John Wyatt, who had fought at New Orleans with Andrew Jackson.

In 1870 Lee became Kentucky's one-hundred-fifteenth county, named for General Robert E. Lee, leader of the Confederate Armies in the Civil War. The Kentucky River played an important role in the early commerce of the county, and steamboats made regular runs to Beattyville. The county seat, Beattyville was named for an early settler, Samuel Beatty. A trading center for the county, Beattyville had a 1970 population of 923.

At the year of its founding, 1870, Lee County had a population of 3,055. By 1950 this had reached 8,739, followed by a decline to 7,420 in 1960. The decline continued, but at a slower rate during the next decade, leaving 6,587 in 1970.

Agriculture accounted for 200 of a total 1,500 employed in 1969, with burley tobacco, corn, cattle and hogs the principal products. Manufacturing employment rose over 200 percent since 1959 to 200 in 1969, with most production in the leather products industry. Largest of the county's firms is Lycoming Shoe Company, which makes women's shoes.

Lee County is rich in natural beauty, holding potential for increased tourist trade. Pinnacle Rock rises over the Kentucky River at Old Landing, offering a magnificent view of the countryside, and there is a small horseshoe canyon with a scenic waterfall on Mill Creek.
