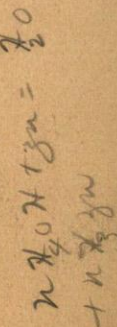
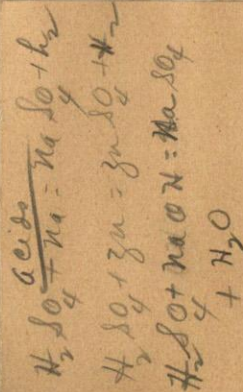
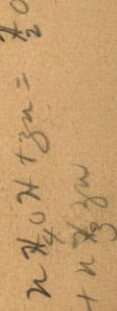
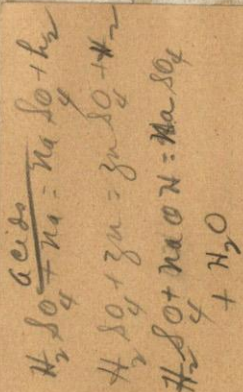
It is hoped that you will come and spend the entire day in order that you may have time to see the Hill, renew former associations and do other things.

## Delicious Pie Crust Formula

The following advantages are claimed for this method of making pies:

1. The dough will not become as tough as ordinary pie dough.
2. It will produce an exceptionally tender and flaky crust.
3. It will not absorb moisture as ordinary pie crust, and, therefore, the pies will keep fresh two or three days after being made.

FIRST: Take two (2) cups of flour; one and one-half ( $1\frac{1}{2}$ ) cups shortening, and one (1) heaping teaspoonful of salt. Mix until smooth.

SECOND: Add two (2) cups of flour, one (1) cake of Fleischmann's Yeast (dissolved in one (1) cup of cold or "ice" water).

Mix thoroughly but lightly.

Use immediately.

The above will make two ordinary size pies—four (4) crusts.

By MISS ANNA MAJORS, Student.

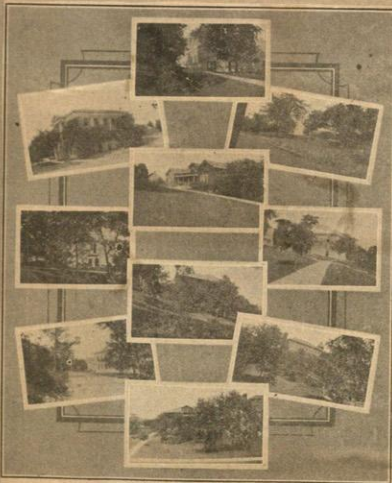
