
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CARTER COUNTY LABOR MARKET AREA



CARTER COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Carter County is located in northeastern Kentucky. It is bordered by Greenup and Lewis Counties on the north, Rowan County on the west, Elliott and Lawrence Counties on the south, and by Boyd County on the east. Carter County, with its natural bridges, rugged cliffs, and mountain streams, is the perfect setting for Carter Caves State Resort Park, one of Kentucky's excellent vacation attractions.

Grayson, the county seat, and Olive Hill are the largest communities in Carter County. Grayson, 24 miles from the Ashland, Kentucky-Huntington, West Virginia area, has a population of 2,184. Olive Hill has a population of 1,197; the county has a total population of 19,850.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Carter County averaged 4,500 in 1969, with trade and services providing 1,200 jobs and manufacturing providing 1,000 jobs. The major industrial products are apparel, refractory brick, and greeting cards.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1968 was \$1,302. Between 1959 and 1968 per capita personal income in the county increased by 59 percent.

The Carter County labor market area includes Carter, Boyd, Elliott, Greenup, Lawrence, Lewis, and Rowan Counties. Area employment totals 45,000 including 11,000 in manufacturing and 9,535 in trade and services. Agriculture employs 3,600 workers. Area manufacturing employment has increased by 2,850 jobs since 1960 with sharpest gains in the primary metals; machinery and metal products; apparel, textile, and leather; and chemicals and petroleum products industries.

The Carter County labor market area has a deficit of 3,566 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing is excellent.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 5,800 men and 6,200 women available for industrial jobs in the Carter County labor market area. In addition, 8,600 young men and 8,125 young women will become 18 years of age by 1977 and potentially available for employment.

- 2. The local transportation capability is good. The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway serves the county with a variety of services. Interstate-64 traverses the county with construction completed as far as Grayson. By 1972, construction will be completed to Catlettsburg, at the northeastern border of the state. Common carrier service is provided by five truck lines. The Olive Hill Airport is equipped to handle small aircraft. The Tri-state Airport, 35 miles from Grayson, has commercial service provided by four airlines.
- 3. Energy both gas and electricity is available in large quantity. Grayson is provided electric power by the Kentucky Power Company. The municipal electric company in Olive Hill is supplied by the Kentucky Power Company. The Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company serves as the source of supply for both the Grayson Utility Commission and the City of Olive Hill Gas Company.
- 4. Industrial sites Olive Hill has four available industrial sites ranging in size from 8 to 46 acres. Grayson has three sites, ranging from 25 to 40 acres, available for industrial use.
- 5. Education Carter County is located within 100 miles of four universities, one senior college, two junior colleges, and two community colleges. Morehead State University is only 19 miles from Olive Hill via Interstate-64. Ashland Community College, an extension of the University of Kentucky, is located in neighboring Boyd County.

A vocational extension center is located at Olive Hill and training is offered in six different courses. An area vocational school is located in Ashland.

Community Programs for Improvement

The county school system has engaged in a building program which, upon completion, will add two new high schools to the system. East Carter High School is designed to accommodate 750 students and West Carter High School will accommodate 700 students. Both schools are expected to be in operation for the September 1971 term. The county school system is also in the process of equipping its schools with ETV facilities.

Recent community improvements in Olive Hill include a community building which serves as an office for the housing inspector and mayor, and provides space for council and Chamber of Commerce meetings. A new storage warehouse has been constructed by the Quality Manufacturing Company. New base radio equipment has been installed at the police station and a new fire truck was delivered in 1970. A new building, constructed by the George Transfer and Rigging Company, provides sleeping quarters for the drivers

and houses loading equipment. A parking area, which will be paved and have space for 50 cars, is being developed at the airport. The city is planning to improve its recreational facilities with a swimming pool and equipped playground. Olive Hill is also planning to improve its water system with a new storage facility, enlarge some of the present distribution lines and add new lines. The improvement will also increase the water pressure.

The City of Grayson has a new building which houses the fire department equipment, and is completing major renovations to the water treatment facilities, increasing the water storage capacity, and strengthening the water distribution system. The Grayson Utility Commission is increasing its gas distribution with the construction of additional line. The city's sewerage system is being renovated and new lines are being added which will extend service to all parts of the city. Showgrounds are being developed which will cover 12 acres and include facilities for horse shows, a lighted show ring, 50 stalls for horses, a concession building, and seating capacity for 2,000 people. A lighted ball park is being developed. The Jaycees are planning to construct a community building which will have cooking equipment, a short basketball court and auditorium, and rest room facilities. The new Kentucky Power Company building has a 200-seat auditorium which is available to the local residents for civic or business meetings. Three new subdivisions are being developed. Thirty-two units are being added to a local motel.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Carter County is located in a area that provides numerous recreational activities, including golf, swimming, boating, camping, fishing and hiking. Carter Caves State Resort Park at Olive Hill, is a 1,000-acre resort park located in a region of natural bridges, rugged cliffs and mountain streams. The resort has a mountain top lodge that overlooks 45-acre Smoky Valley Lake. Guided tours are available through three electrically lighted caves which are open year round.

The American Folk Song Festival is held annually the first weekend in June at Carter Caves State Resort Park. Music with the Elizabethan flavor of the Sixteenth Century and traditional mountain hymns are played on quaint lutes, fiddles, recorders and dulcimers.

Other state parks within 100 miles of Carter County are Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, Greenbo Lake State Park, Natural Bridge State Resort Park, Fort Boonesborough State Park and Blue Licks Battlefield State Park.

HISTORY

Carter County, the eighty-eighth county formed in the state, dates from 1838. Land was taken from Greenup and Lawrence Counties to form Carter County. Its surface is hilly and broken, the soil in the valleys is rich, and there are several workable veins of coal under the hills. It is well drained by the Little Sandy River and its tributaries. Despite all of these favorable aspects the land is not suitable for extensive agricultural production.

Carter County was named in honor of Colonel William G. Carter, a member of the State Senate when the county was formed. He favored establishment of Carter County, and introduced a bill which required every man over twenty years of age who lived within 5 miles of the Little Sandy River to give five days of labor each year to keep it navigable. There were similar laws affecting other rivers in the state. These laws remained on the statute books for almost half a century, until the advent of the railroads in the early 1830's which made the laws unneccessary. William G. Carter lived in Greenup County, migrated to Arkansas in 1847, but returned to Kentucky two years later when the second epidemic of cholera occurred and died a victim of the disease.

Grayson, the county seat, was named for General William Grayson, who received a grant of land from Isaac Shelby during his second term as governor, and Colonel Robert Grayson, a brother, who was an aide-de-camp to General George Washington. Grayson is 752 feet above sea level.

The first settlement made in Carter County was around the turn of the nineteenth century by persons interested in salt-making. Surplus salt was shipped down the Little Sandy River to the Ohio on flat boats. Salt was later brought down the Ohio from Pittsburgh and sold for a cheaper price than Kentuckians could make it. Carter County's residents then turned to agriculture and working with iron ores for a livelihood.

Names worthy of remembrance are:

William J. Fields - Governor of Kentucky from 1923 to 1927.

Heman H. McGuire - guided the development of Carter County schools for over a quarter of a century.

Simon Kenton - early prominent salt producer and pioneer.

Thomas Scott - early prominent salt producer.
