
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
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
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BURKESVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA





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BURKESVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Burkesville, the county seat of Cumberland County, is a small quiet river town located in the southcentral part of Kentucky and is situated near the lake country -- Lake Cumberland and Dale Hollow Reservoir are both within a few minutes driving distance. Burkesville is 129 miles south of Louisville; 149 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee; and 128 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee.

The population of Burkesville in 1970 was 1,717, while the population of Cumberland County was 6,850. The land area of Cumberland County is 313 square miles.

The Economic Framework

The economy of Cumberland County is influenced heavily by agriculture. Total employment in the county in 1972 was 2,300 with agriculture providing 820 jobs, government 220 jobs, trade and services 265 jobs, and manufacturing 350 jobs. Industrial employment is heaviest in the apparel industry.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1971 was \$1,835, an increase of 105.5 percent in the past decade.

The Burkesville labor market area includes Cumberland County and its five surrounding Kentucky counties. Additional workers could be expected to commute from Clay County, Tennessee. The Burkesville labor market area employment, measured in 1972, totaled 21,550 including 6,140 in agriculture, 2,620 in government, 2,462 in trade and services, and 3,760 in manufacturing. Area manufacturing employment has increased by over 136 percent since 1962 with the sharpest gains in the apparel industry.

This area has a deficit of 1,554 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area with a potential for additional manufacturing production.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 6,970 men and 5,010 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 2,980 young men and 2,800 young women will become 18 years of age by 1979 and potentially available for work. Also the labor supply would be increased by the number of men and women in Clay County, Tennessee, who are available for work.

2. The local transportation capability is good. Burkesville is 13 miles from U. S. 127 and 49 miles east of Interstate 65, via Kentucky 90. The new Cumberland Parkway from Somerset to Bowling Green has been completed and passes approximately 28 miles north of Burkesville. The new Appalachian Highway System is now under construction through Burkesville and will connect with Interstate 75 when completed in 1975. There is one truckline serving the Burkesville area with a terminal located in Burkesville. The nearest rail service is at Glasgow, 38 miles distant, and the nearest commercial airports are at Nashville, Tennessee, and Louisville, Kentucky, 128 and 129 miles distant, respectively. The nearest local airport is at Albany, Kentucky, 17 miles distant.

3. Electricity is supplied to Burkesville and Cumberland County by the Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation which receives its power from the Tennessee Valley Authority. The Blue Flame Gas Company of Horse Cave, Kentucky, provides Burkesville with liquefied petroleum and there are two distillate fuel oil distributors in Burkesville. The local raw water supply from Cumberland River is more than adequate for continued growth.

4. There is one consolidated school system in Cumberland County. Within a 50-mile radius of Burkesville is one university, one senior college, and one junior college. The Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School offering 23 courses and the Somerset State Vocational-Technical School offering 13 courses are the nearest vocational-technical schools, each 70 miles distant. The nearest area vocational education center, Clinton County Area Vocational Education Center is in Albany, Kentucky, 17 miles distant.

Community Programs for Improvement

Recent community improvements include a new Cumberland-Clinton County Solid Waste Disposal System which was opened in September, 1973; and a remodeled building which now houses the Town and Country Music Hall featuring country, gospel, folk, and rock music.

Community improvements underway include: six-inch water lines extending to city limit boundaries; plans drawn on South Cumberland Water District and the extension and enlarging of lines near Summer Shade and Marrowbone; a new 50-unit intermediate care nursing home to be completed in 1974; and a log cabin that is being restored and converted into a museum.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Burkesville has a supervised recreation program during the summer months. In the city park an old log cabin has been restored for community affairs. Another city building has been remodeled and is now the Town and Country Music Hall featuring country music, gospel music, folk and rock.

Water sports and fishing are enjoyed at Dale Hollow Reservoir, 7 miles distant. Hendricks Creek Resort, 14 miles distant, features swimming, fishing, boating, and playground activities, and provides cabin and houseboat rentals. Sulphur Creek Marina has houseboat rentals, picnic tables and grills, and camping grounds.

Lure Lodge in Lake Cumberland State Resort Park near Jamestown, 35 miles distant, is a modern, air-conditioned complete facility perched on a high bluff above the lake. The park also offers two swimming pools, deluxe cottages, tent and trailer camp sites, riding stable, a nine-hole par-three golf course, rental boats and a launching ramp.

WAGES

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.015 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.15 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, and goods in process inventories are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Property stored in public warehouses is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

HISTORY

Cumberland County lies in the southcentral part of Kentucky in the state's Southern Cumberlands region, and is bordered to the south by Tennessee. The Cumberland River meanders through the 313 square-mile county, and a portion of Dale Hollow Reservoir, a large man-made lake, lies in its southern part. The land surface is hilly and broken and the soil is fertile. About 60 percent of the county's area is forested.

The first pioneers entered Cumberland County in 1776. During the next few years many military claims were staked out in the vicinity, and a little town called Cumberland Crossing was formed. Some years later the town's name was changed to Burkesville for Ishum Burkes, who gave land for the townsite in 1798.

Cumberland became Kentucky's thirty-second county in 1798. Its territory was taken from Green County, and it was named for the Cumberland River. Burkesville became the county seat and has had four courthouses built since 1800.

Three miles up the river from Burkesville is the site of an early oil well tapped accidentally by salt borers. The well, which was drilled in 1829, was named the American Oil Well and served as a source of a rather sizable oil production (the oil was originally sold for medicinal purposes). At the turn of the century Thomas Lincoln, father of Abraham Lincoln, became a constable in the Marrowbone Creek vicinity of Cumberland County, and was a landowner there.

In 1800, two years after its formation, Cumberland County had 3,284 inhabitants. The figure had reached 9,309 by 1950. There has subsequently been a significant decline to 7,835 in 1960, and 6,850 in 1970. Burkesville had a population of 1,717 in 1970.

The county is predominantly agricultural, with farming employing 820 of a total 2,300 employed in 1972. Manufacturing employment has increased 96 percent since 1963 and accounted for 363 jobs in 1973. The two largest manufacturing firms in the county are Sutton Shirt Corporation and Bob Evans of Kentucky, Inc.

With the recreational opportunities afforded by Dale Hollow and Lake Cumberland, just east of Cumberland County, tourism has become an important aspect of the economy.
