

The United Steelworkers of America represents manufacturing workers at America Standard, Inc.

TRANSPORTATION:

Rail: The Chessie System serves Paintsville. Services include freight stops on demand, 5 eastbound and 5 westbound through freights daily; switching facilities; team track for 8 cars; siding space for approximately 30 cars; nearest piggyback facilities at Huntington, West Virginia, 65 miles distant.

Highways: U.S. Highways 460 and 23 and Kentucky Highway 40 serve Paintsville. The Mountain Parkway is 19 miles away at Salyersville via U.S. Highway 460.

<u>Truck</u>: Overnite Transportation Company and Smith's Transfer Corp. serve Paintsville. Smith's Transfer Corp. provides interstate service only.

<u>Water:</u> The nearest navigable river is the Big Sandy River approximately 27 miles from Paintsville.

<u>Air</u>: Combs Airport is 5 miles south-southeast of Paintsville; there is one 3,200 foot paved runway. The nearest commercial airport is Tri-State Airport (Walker-Long Field) located at Huntington, West Virginia, 65 miles north of Paintsville.

UTILITIES:

<u>Electricity</u>: Kentucky Power Company serves Paintsville and parts of Johnson County. Johnson County is also served by Big Sandy RECC.

<u>Natural Gas</u>: Paintsville is served by the Paintsville Gas and Water Company, which is supplied by the Kentucky-West Virginia Gas Company.

Other Fuels: Seven propane distributors and six distillate fuel oil distributors serve the area.

WATER AND SEWERAGE:

<u>Water</u>: Paintsville Gas and Water Company serves the city. The source of supply is Levisa Fork of Big Sandy River and the treatment plant capacity is 1,500,000 gpd. Average daily consumption is 1,200,000 gallons and peak daily consumption is 1,500,000. The present storage capacity is 1,160,000 gallons. Within 15 months, the treatment plant capacity should be increased to 3,000,000 gpd and an increase of 750,000 gallons in storage capacity is planned.

<u>Sewerage</u>: Paintsville sewerage service is provided by Paintsville Gas and Water Company and design capacity of the treatment plant is 730,000 gpd. Average daily flow is 475,000 gallons and treatment is primary.
