MAYSVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Location

Maysville, situated on the bank of the Ohio River, is located in northeastern Kentucky, 64 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio, 114 miles northeast of Louisville, Kentucky, and 65 miles northeast of Lexington, Kentucky. It is the county seat and largest city in Mason County. In 1970 Maysville had a population of 7,411 and Mason County had a population of 17,273.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Mason County averaged 7,300 in 1969. During the decade of the 1960's manufacturing employment increased by about 400 jobs or 20 percent. Major industrial products are machinery and metal products.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1969 was \$2,890 or \$43 above the Kentucky average. Total personal income for the county has increased by over 70 percent since 1959.

Maysville is the hub of a Kentucky labor market area that includes Mason County, and the four surrounding Kentucky counties. Area employment totaled 16,900 in 1969 including 4,800 in agriculture and 3,975 in manufacturing. Area industrial employment has increased by over 45 percent since 1960 with the sharpest gains in the leather, textile, and machinery and metal products industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years the area still has a deficit of 799 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment-population ratio. This indicates an area where the potential for additional manufacturing production is good.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current labor supply of 1,450 men and 1,440 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 3,230 young men and 3,025 young women will become 18 years of age by 1977 and potentially available for work.

- 2. The local transportation capability is good. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company serves Maysville with a variety of services. U. S. Highway 68 directly serves the area, and Interstate 64, which is a major highway artery serving the east and midwest, is only 38 miles to the south at Morehead. The Fleming-Mason Airport will provide the area with light aircraft service when completed. Commercial air service is available in Lexington, 65 miles to the southwest. Navigation on the Ohio River is an important growth asset to Maysville.
- 3. Energy gas is provided by Columbia Gas of Kentucky, and electricity by Kentucky Utilities Company and Fleming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. The local raw water supply from the Ohio River is more than adequate for continued growth.
- 4. Industrial sites Maysville has ten available industrial sites totaling 2,379 acres. This includes a 500-acre site that is to be developed into an industrial park.
- 5. Mason County has a county and an independent city school system and one parochial school with grades 1 through 12. The Maysville Community College and an extension of the Northern Kentucky Area Vocational-Technical School are located in Maysville. Maysville also has the services of a new industrial school.

There are five universities, three senior colleges and one junior college located within 75 miles of Maysville.

Community Programs for Improvement

The City of Maysville and the Mason County Fiscal Court have recently formed a port authority which will have broad powers to facilitate the location of new industries in this area.

Recent community improvements: The Captain Anthony Meldahl Dam near New Richmond on the Ohio River has been completed. It has created a 95-mile pool from Greenup to Meldahl. The pool has a depth of 32 feet. Completion of this dam has resulted in the construction of a boat dock with a large concrete ramp near Beechwood Park.

The Hayswood Hospital has added a new extended care floor at a cost of \$630,000. The hospital has also completed \$763,000 worth of modernization.

Maysville has a new shopping center located on Forest Avenue in the east section of the city which contains four retail and service establishments. Other recent community improvements in Maysville include: the opening of a new nursing home; completion of city-owned parking lots to accommodate 220 cars; construction of a new industrial school, Maysville Community College, and a vocational school; construction of a field house with a seating capacity of 6,000; completion of a new Rotary Park and clubhouse; and extension of gas and water lines 18 miles into the county.

Community improvements under construction: The Fleming-Mason Airport, located approximately 9 miles south of Maysville, will have over 4,000 feet of runway and lights, and will provide the area with light aircraft service. The estimated cost of construction is approximately \$600,000.

One hundred units of low-cost housing for the elderly are under construction near Beechwood Park in the east section of town.

New roads on both sides of the Ohio River are being built and upgraded. Improvements to U. S. 68 between Lexington and Maysville is to be completed by 1973.

Dayton Power and Light Company has a \$400,000,000 plant under construction, with part of the plant already in operation,

An urban renewal program is under way to remodel downtown Maysville.

The new 67-acre Maysville-Mason County Recreational Park will be opened in 1971. The park will include ball diamonds, swimming pool and other facilities. The Mason County School System has a new middle school under construction. It is located on U. S. 68 and is to be completed by the Fall of 1971. The cost of the new building will be approximately \$945,000. It will be a new open concept building designed for individual instruction, flexible scheduling, and team teaching.

Planned community improvements: The East Kentucky Power Cooperative has purchased the Dupont property northwest of Maysville. It is proposed that 500 acres of the property be used for an industrial park. Over 400 acres of the property will be used to build one of the largest ultramodern power plants in the United States.

The Farm Bureau plans to construct a new building in the west section of the city. It will house the Farm Bureau offices, the County Extension Agent's office, insurance offices, and the soil conservation office.

Plans have been made for a regional shopping center to be located on U. S. 68, with completion expected by April, 1972.

The Maysville City School System has made plans for a new elementary building at the Woodleigh School. This will consolidate the elementary schools of the system.

The Mason County School System plans to initiate non-graded science and social studies for the school year 1971-72, for grade levels two through six. Non-graded reading and math courses have already begun at this level.

Secondary treatment facilities are to be added to the sewage treatment plant in order to meet new Ohio River standards by 1974.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Recreational activities are many and varied in Maysville. Many of the activities are centered around fishing and boating on the Ohio River. The Maysville Country Club and the Tom Browning Boys' Club offer a variety of recreational activities.

Lexington, 65 miles to the south, provides the area with thoroughbred and harness racing at Keeneland Race Course and the Red Mile Trotting Track. The University of Kentucky provides art exhibits, concerts, lectures, drama productions, and collegiate athletics.

Other interesting areas within a short driving distance of Maysville are: Blue Licks Battlefield State Park, Kincaid Lake State Park, Carter Caves State Resort Park, and the Daniel Boone National Forest.

HISTORY

Mason County is located in northeastern Kentucky in the Outer Bluegrass Region and is bounded on the north by the Ohio River. North Fork of Licking River flows from east to west through the central portion of the 239 square mile county. The land surface is rolling to hilly and rough, especially along the Ohio River Escarpment, and there are narrow strips of flat land along the Ohio. The limestone base soil is very fertile, and over 90 percent of the land area is devoted to farming.

The first visitors to the area were Christopher Gist, who came in 1751 as a surveyor for the Ohio Land Company, Mrs. Mary Ingles and an elderly Dutch woman, name unknown, who came in 1756. Prior to 1776 several companies of explorers, Daniel Boone among them, visited the area. The first settlement was made by Simon Kenton on Lawrence Creek in 1776 about three miles southwest of present-day Maysville. Other settlers then came, including George Mefford, the first settler at Maysville, which was then known as Limestone. Because this area lay adjacent to Indian lands, the early pioneers found it difficult to remain, and new settlements were made very slowly until 1784 when the region became safer. Washington, the oldest town, was established by an Act of the Virginia Assembly in 1786. Edmund Byne, Henry Lee, and Daniel Boone, who lived in Limestone at the time, were made trustees.

One of the earliest counties in Kentucky, Mason County was where type for the first newspaper published in Kentucky, The Kentucky Gazette, was set up and then transported to Lexington in 1787. The first Macadam road in the state, completed in 1830, was that part of the Old National Road which stretched the four miles between Maysville and Washington. The Maysville Gas Company was chartered in 1849, making Mason County one of the first in the nation to use gas.

Mason County was established in 1788 by the Virginia Legislature. The eighth county formed in Kentucky, its territory was taken from Bourbon County. Some nineteen counties were eventually created from the territory which Mason County originally included. The county was named for George Mason, a Virginia Legislator who drafted a good portion of Virginia's first Constitution and the famous Declaration of Rights. Mason took an active part in the Constitutional Convention at Philadelphia, though he opposed the ratification of the final document.

Maysville, the county seat, was established as Limestone in 1787. It was renamed in 1793 to honor John May, on whose land it had grown up. Important as a river town in the state's early history, Maysville was a leading port of entry for those on their way to central Kentucky. The Marshall Key home here was a place where Harriet Beecher Stowe made social visits. From watching slave auctions at the Mason County courthouse she acquired much of the material incorporated into Uncle Tom's Cabin.

In 1790 the county had a population of 2,729. By 1850 a population level was reached which has changed very little since then. The total was 18,486 in 1950, 18,454 in 1960 and 17,273 in 1970. Maysville had a population of 7,411 in 1970.

Agriculture accounted for 1,300 of the county's 7,300 employed in 1969, with burley tobacco, corn, hay, milk, cattle and hogs the principal products. Manufacturing employment increased slightly during the 1960's to 2,300 in 1969. The greatest production was in the leather, textile, machinery and metal products industries. Largest of the county's firms are Browning Manufacturing Company, which makes pulleys, sprockets and ball bearings, January and Wood Company, which makes cotton and rayon yarns, and Parker Tobacco Company, and Edith Henry Shoes, Inc.

Maysville was the home of the parents of Supreme Court Justice John Marshall, and his brothers Alexander and Thomas held political positions in Mason County. President Ulysses S. Grant spent a year in school at Maysville, and Albert Sidney Johnston, the famous Gonfederate General, was born there. Stanley F. Reed, U. S. Supreme Court Justice, was born in Maysville, as was singer-actress Rosemary Clooney.
