
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
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### BARDSTOWN, BLOOMFIELD AND NEW HAVEN LABOR MARKET AREA

## BARDSTOWN, BLOOMFIELD, AND NEW HAVEN, KENTUCKY -A RESOURCE PROFILE

Bardstown, settled in 1775, is the largest community in Nelson County, having a 1970 population of 5,816 within its corporate limits. Southern antibellum customs, which were once a lively part of Bardstown, are reflected in several well-preserved historic structures; yet the community with its many reminders of generations past, welcomes the progress brought by new industry, modern education facilities, and expanded housing opportunities. Bardstown is 35 miles from Louisville, Kentucky; 135 miles from Cincinnati, Ohio; and 132 miles from Nashville, Tennessee.

Bloomfield, situated in the northeastern part of Nelson County, is 15 miles from Bardstown. In 1970, Bloomfield had a population of 1,072. New Haven, situated in the southwestern part of the county, is 14 miles from Bardstown. In 1970, New Haven had a population of 977.

Nelson County, the fourth county established in Kentucky, covers a land area of 437 square miles. Located in Kentucky's beautiful Bluegrass Region, the county early became the home of several distilleries. Today the production of bourbon whisky is still one of the county's principal industries. In 1970, the county had a population of 23,477.

#### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Nelson County averaged 6,210 in 1971 with agriculture providing 1,050 of these jobs, manufacturing 1,500 jobs, trade and services 1,540 jobs, and government 720 jobs. Since 1962, manufacturing employment has increased by 24.7 percent. Major industrial products are whisky, ladies' suits, paper cups and plates, plastic cups and containers, and paper ribbons and rolls for business machines.

Per capita income in the county in 1970 was \$2,372, a 78.7 percent increase since 1960.

The Bardstown, Bloomfield and New Haven labor market area includes Nelson County and the seven adjacent counties. In 1971, total employment in the labor market area averaged 43,550, with 36,170 employed in nonagricultural jobs. Manufacturing furnished 7,600 jobs. Area manufacturing employment has increased by almost 69 percent, or 3,095 new jobs, since 1962 with sharpest gains in rubber and plastics, paper, metal products, and stone, clay and glass industries.

Despite important industrial gains in recent years, the area still has a deficit of 9,196 manufacturing jobs when measured against the national industrial employment - population ratio. This indicates an area where potential for additional manufacturing production is excellent.

#### Resources for Growth

1. Labor supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,225 men and 12,535 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 9,355 young men and 8,965 young women will become 18 years of age by 1978 and potentially available for work.

2. Transportation - The Louisville & Nashville Railroad serves Bardstown and New Haven with a variety of services including piggyback facilities at Bardstown. The Blue Grass Parkway, traversing Nelson County with interchanges at Bardstown and Bloomfield, and Interstate 65, only 23 miles from Bardstown, are major links to the industrial south, midwest and east. The nearest commercial airport is located at Louisville, only 35 miles from Bardstown. Samuels Field, 2 miles west of Bardstown, can accommodate small aircraft.

3. Electric power in Bardstown is provided by the Bardstown Municipal Light and Water Company, in Bloomfield and New Haven by the Kentucky Utilities Company, and in Nelson County by Salt River RECC. The Louisville Gas & Electric Company provides natural gas service to Bardstown, Bloomfield and New Haven do not have natural gas service. However, three distributors of propane and butane, and five distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in Nelson County.

4. Industrial sites - There are four sites at Bardstown ranging from 85 to 200 acres, and two sites, 18 and 19 acres, at Bloomfield.

5. Education - The Bardstown Independent School System and the Nelson County School System offer excellent educational facilities and programs. In addition, there are seven non-public schools in the county. Higher educational facilities located within 50 miles of Bardstown include one university, four senior colleges, one junior college, and two community colleges. The Nelson County Area Vocational Education Center at Bardstown offers courses in seven areas, while the Elizabethtown State Vocational-Technical School, 25 miles from Bardstown, offers training in six courses.

#### Community Programs for Improvement

#### Bardstown

1. A plan to relieve traffic congestion is being initiated. Two projects which have been designated for immediate action are the reconstruction of a portion of lower South Fourth Street and Old Gilky Run Road to connect with Kentucky Route 49 and an additional extension of West Broadway to connect with U. S. 62 West.

2. New sidewalk construction has been completed and several existing sidewalks improved.

3. The city purchased a building which houses the city offices and police and fire departments, and also provides space for several other agencies.

4. Eighty units of public housing were recently completed.

5. A new 82-unit Holiday Inn has been completed and expansion plans include convention facilities such as rooms to accommodate business meetings.

6. Renovation of the Nelson County Courthouse has been completed and a new annex to the courthouse, recently constructed, houses the county offices.

7. First Federal Savings & Loan Association, which is opening an office in Bardstown, is constructing a building which will provide drive-in window service.

8. The Nelson County Building & Loan Association is being moved into a newly renovated building which has a drive-in window facility.

9. A new city park, to be opened in the Spring of 1973, will provide a fully equipped area for toddlers, small children, planned activities for age groups 6 to 12 and for teenagers. A basketball court is proposed for the park.

10. Joint City-County Planning was adopted in April 1970. A Comprehensive Plan for the county has been completed and adopted. Also, a county-wide comprehensive Water and Sewer Plan and a Housing Study have been completed and by January, 1973, final zoning for the entire county should be completed.

11. A new addition to Flaget Memorial Hospital is expected to be under construction by January 1973. The new addition will provide space for 20 additional beds, two new emergency rooms, fracture room, treatment room, new clinical laboratory, new X-ray department, and administrative area.

12. Two major highway projects are underway at Bardstown. Minor construction is underway on the 1.04-mile U. S. 31-E and U. S. 62 connector. Relocation of Kentucky 245 will provide excellent highway access from U. S. 62 northeast of Bardstown to Interstate 65.

13. An expansion of the sewage treatment plant is to be completed in 1974. A \$100,000 sewer line extension will extend service within the city limits and provide service to approximately 70 new customers.

14. A water treatment improvement will be completed in 1973 which will provide a 50 percent increase in filtration capacity; a 250,000 gallon standpipe is to be constructed; and a 12-inch loop beginning west of Bardstown and extending northward is planned for 1973.

15. Bardstown Independent School District improvements include: revision of part of the central administration building which has been redesigned as a curriculum lab for kindergarten through the twelfth grade; restructuring of the elementary program with inclusion of a continuing approach to open climate team teaching; implementation of career education as an infused part of the total curriculum; redevelopment of physical education in the elementary and high schools to fulfill the physical needs of all students; development of phases of independent study within the high school for gifted youngsters; and development of a phase elective English program in the high school.

#### Bloomfield

1. A new city building is being constructed which will house the city offices and the fire and police departments, and provide space for a community center.

2. Commercial improvements include: two service stations have remodeled and expanded facilities, a supermarket has been remodeled, one new business has been established, and an oil company has expanded its facility and increased services.

3. Muir, Wilson & Muir, banking facility, has been completely remodeled.

4. A new subdivision has been developed.

5. Development of a city park is under consideration.

6. A new sewage treatment plant was completed in 1971.

7. A new water system is now in operation. The project included constructing new lines to service new customers, rerouting of several existing lines, and an overall upgrading of the distribution system.

#### New Haven

1. A new pumper is to be purchased for the fire department.

2. A municipal building is to be constructed.

3. The Bank of New Haven has a new building with a drive-in facility.

4. A \$50,000 swimming pool is to be constructed.

5. Preliminary plans have been completed for a sewerage system, and construction is expected to be underway by January 1973.

6. Planned improvements to the water treatment plant will increase the treatment capacity.

7. The Nelson County School System has completed a 16-room, \$300,000 elementary school at New Haven.

#### Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Nelson County is part of Kentucky's ten-county "land of history" region. Bardstown, the county seat, is vibrantly alive in its charming edifices of early Americana and thousands of visitors tour its attractions each year. Most famous of all is Federal Hill, dominated by the three-story brick mansion which has been made world famous by the song, "My Old Kentucky Home," composed by Stephen Collins Foster. Other sight-seeing attractions include Wickland, home of three Governors; St. Joseph's Proto-Cathedral, first Catholic cathedral west of the Allegheny Mountains, which contains paintings by old masters donated by Louis Phillipe, exiled King of France; Old Talbott Tavern, erected in the latter part of the 18th century; Our Lady of Gethsemane Monastery, first monastery of Trappist Monks in the United States; and the Barton Museum of Whiskey History, depicting 170 years of the distilling industry in the United States.

Bardstown also offers ample facilities for recreation provided by the city's outstanding Recreation Department. Professional planning has resulted in a recreation program designed for all age groups, and facilities and equipment to provide many hours of relaxation and entertainment. The Department is looking ahead to future needs and plans are already underway to expand the recreational facilities.

Other interesting historic sites within 35 miles of Bardstown include Lincoln Homestead State Shrine, restored settlement of Lincoln's grandparents; Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Site, 100 acres of the original Thomas Lincoln farm where Abraham Lincoln was born; and Lincoln's Boyhood Home, his last home in Kentucky.

Opportunity for fishing, boating, and water skiing is available at the 250-acre Sympson Lake near Bardstown. Also near Bardstown is Bernheim Forest, 10,000 acres of Kentucky Woodlands preserved as a natural forest and wildlife sanctuary.

Nelson County is only 35 miles from Louisville, allowing easy access to the numerous cultural and sporting events of this Metropolitan area.

#### HISTORY

Nelson County was formed in 1784 by the Virginia General Assembly, the fourth county established in the district of Kentucky. The county was named in honor of Thomas Nelson, Revolutionary War general, signer of the Declaration of Independence, and Governor of Virginia. The county covers 437 square miles. Chaplin Creek and Beech Fork of Salt River flow along a greater part of its eastern and southeastern boundaries, and Rolling Fork of Salt River forms its southwestern line.

Bardstown, county seat of Nelson County, is rich in history and tradition. Even in its early years, Bardstown rivaled Louisville and Lexington as a center for social and educational facilities. In fact, Bardstown held a position in national affairs of far greater proportion than its size of population. A great emphasis was placed on education. Salem Academy was established in 1778 by James Priestley. The Bardstown Grammar School was started in 1782. Nazareth Academy for girls was founded in the early 1800's and St. Joseph College for boys was launched in 1819. Both attained a high reputation in educational circles, and today St. Joseph's Proto-Cathedral houses several paintings accredited to such masters as Murillo, Rubens, Jacob Hart, Van Bree, Van Dyck, and the Van Eyck Brothers.

Federal Hill, the home of John Rowan, Jr., ranks among the finest of old mansions. It is one of the best preserved homes in the country. And due to its setting and the way of life around the mid 1800's, it became the inspiration of a ballad set to music in 1852 by Stephen Collins Foster, a cousin of the Rowan family, entitled "My Old Kentucky Home." This threestory brick mansion, built by Judge Rowan in 1795, is renowned as the gracious image of the South's gentle, leisurely way of life before the Civil War. Visitors to the fine old home can step for a moment into another world, charming and mellow, in the golden age of belles and gallantry.

Wickland, a perfect example of Georgian architecture, was built in 1817. It is the "Home of Three Governors," Charles A. Wickliffe and J.W.C. Beckham of Kentucky and Robert Charles Wickliffe of Louisiana. Wickland rivals "My Old Kentucky Home" in historical importance, and certainly equals it from the standpoint of natural beauty.

Bardstown's courthouse square is historic in itself. It is here that we find the John Fitch Monument, a memorial to the inventor of the steamboat, who died at Bardstown in 1798. The monument was built in 1927 from appropriations made by the U. S. Congress. The old Slave Block, where negro slaves were bought and sold prior to the Civil War is located on the courthouse lawn. Erected in 1779, the Old Talbott Inn, originally a stagecoach stop, is said to be the oldest inn in continuous operation west of the Alleghenies.

In 1850, population in Nelson County was reported at 14,788. By 1900, the population had increased to 16,587. Population increased slightly to 16,830 in 1910 and then decreased to 16,137 by 1920. At that time, population began increasing, reaching 18,004 in 1940, 22,168 in 1960, and 23,477 in 1970.

Employment in Nelson County is well diversified. In 1970, total employment in the county averaged 6,210, with 1,050 employed in agriculture, 1,500 in manufacturing, 1,540 in trade and services, and 720 in government. Largest of the county's firms are Bardstown Manufactors, Inc., Barton Brands, Inc., Burroughs Corp., Heaven Hill Distilleries, Inc., and Lily-Tulip Division of Owens-Illinois, Inc.
