

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for seven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Princeton is served by the Western Kentucky Parkway. An interchange is located 2 miles north of the city. U.S. 62 and Kentucky 91 also serve Princeton.

An interchange of Interstate 24, which is now under construction will be located approximately 17 miles west of Princeton. When completed, the interstate highway will extend for more than 300 miles, linking Interstate 57 in Illinois and Chattanooga, Tennessee. Expected completion date is 1980.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Intangible personal property owned by corporations in Kentucky as a result of business transactions performed out-of-state, but having a tax situs in Kentucky (accounts receivable, notes, bonds, credits, non-domestic bank deposits, licensing or royalty agreements, shares of stock of any affiliated company, etc.) is taxed by the state at \$0.015 and is not subject to local taxation.



RECREATION

Local

Princeton and the surrounding area provide numerous and varied recreational facilities. There is a supervised sports program - Youth, Inc. - which includes basketball, football, baseball, and softball. There are three public parks, three playgrounds, four tennis courts, six baseball diamonds, two football fields, and six basketball courts.

Private recreational facilities available include: country club, golf course, two tennis courts, swimming pool, an indoor theatre, and a drive-in theatre.

Princeton received a \$292,000 grant for a new recreational facility to be constructed on 36.7 acres located on U.S. 62. Construction of two tennis courts, two softball fields, and swimming pool is to begin early in 1978. Plans are to have the facility in use by the summer of 1978.

Tourist attractions include George Coon Public Library, Old Elkhorn Tavern, and Big Spring Park.

Cultural events in the community include the Art Guild and Community Concert Series.

Area (Within 45 miles)

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, a 3,600-acre park, provides a lodge, cottages, and camping facilities. The park also features a swimming pool, 18-hole golf course, beach, bathhouse, riding stables, hiking trails, picnicking, playground, tennis, and boating and fishing facilities.

Pennyrile Forest State Resort Park is comprised of 435 acres and offers a lodge, cottages, camp sites, a 55-acre lake, swimming pool, beach, bathhouse, boating, fishing, 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, horseback riding, hiking trails and picnic areas.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park, located on Kentucky Lake, is a 1,200-acre park with a village inn, cottages, and camping facilities. Other park features include a swimming pool, beach, 18-hole miniature golf course, playground and picnic area, horseback riding, fishing and boating, and an airport with a 4,000-foot lighted airstrip.

Kenlake State Resort Park, also located on Kentucky Lake, is an 1,800-acre park with hotel and cottage accommodations and camping facilities. The park facilities include a 9-hole golf course, tennis, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, and boating.

Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area is a 170,000-acre woodland formed into a peninsula by Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley and is a major area for outdoor recreation, conservation and environmental learning. There are facilities for fishing, boating, hiking, swimming, hunting, and camping.

Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine, east of Princeton at Fairview, is the site of the birthplace of Confederate President Jefferson Davis. A 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top provides a panoramic view of the scenic countryside.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent:

- 1. Early Childhood Learning Exchange, Inc., opened in August, 1977, is a day care center for children 2 through 5 years of age. The center sponsors a kindergarten program for the 5 year olds.
- The George Coon Public Library has received funds for the renovation and construction of the downstairs portion of the library. The renovation provides two special areas rare book collection and genealogical collection. Also, office and community meeting space is available.
- The First Bank and Trust Company and Farmers Bank and Trust Company have both opened new branch banks.
- 4. A building adjacent to City Hall was purchased to house the two emergency ambulances which now serve the city and county.
- 5. Four new fast food stores have located in Princeton.
- 6. The Elks Club has moved into a new 8,600 square foot building on the south side of Princeton.
- 7. J.C. Penney Company moved to a new and larger location in the downtown area.
- 8. The Princeton Water Company has extended 6- and 8-inch lines approximately 3 miles along U.S. 62 west and into Etheridge Subdivision.

Planned:

- 1. The Princeton-Caldwell County Park and Recreation Board has received a \$292,000 recreation grant. The funds will be used for a swimming pool, two softball fields, and other recreational facilities on the 36.7 acre park site located on Highway 62. Also, a double tennis court is to be constructed which is funded by another grant received in the fall of 1976.
- Plans are underway for the implementation of a kindergarten program in the Caldwell County School System for the 1978-79 school year.
- 3. Eight new classrooms are to be added to the Caldwell County High School. Plans are to have this addition complete and ready for use in the fall of 1978.

- 4. A new \$2 million, 33,000 square foot Research and Education Center is planned for University of Kentucky's Western Kentucky Experiment Substation at Princeton. This facility will provide needed office space and additional laboratories.
- 5. A new ambulatory care wing is planned for the hospital at an approximate cost of \$716,414. It is expected to be complete by summer or fall of 1978. The wing will include emergency room, radiology, laboratory, physical therapy, respiratory therapy, pharmacy, treatment rooms, and minor surgery.
- 6. A new shopping center consisting of 43,800 square feet is under construction west of Princeton on U.S. 62.
- 7. South Central Bell Telephone Company is installing a new facility which will provide a new electronic switching system for the Princeton area and will cost approximately \$2.5 million.
- 8. The City of Princeton is planning an annexation, which would involve approximately 1,700 to 1,800 residents. A general description of areas to be annexed call for inclusion of all outlying areas within a 2-mile radius of the fire station.
- 9. Plans are underway to add lighting and purchase additional property to extend the runway at the Princeton-Caldwell County Airport.
- 10. Princeton Sewer Department is planning to extend 1,200 feet of 8-inch line along Kentucky Highway 293 south, and 850 feet of 8-inch line along Kentucky 62 west to accommodate a new bank and shopping center.
