

CUMBERLAND COUNTY KENTUCKY





BURKESVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Burkesville, the county seat of Cumberland County, is situated on the banks of the Cumberland River in south central Kentucky. Burkes-ville's location places it within close proximity to two large recreational lakes -- Lake Cumberland to the east and Dale Hollow Lake to the south. Burkesville is 134 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky, 116 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee, and 145 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee. In 1973, Burkesville had an estimated population of 1,629.

Cumberland County covers a land area of 310 square miles in south central Kentucky. The Tennessee state line forms the southern boundary of the county. The 1975 estimated population of Cumberland County was 6,800.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Cumberland County residents employed in 1975 averaged 3,430, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 2,850 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 650 workers; mining and quarrying 10; construction firms 30; transportation, communications, and public utilities 20; wholesale and retail trade 200; finance, insurance, and real estate 30; and employees in the service industries 160. Major industrial products are shirts and men's and women's uniforms.

Total unemployment in Cumberland County averaged 5.1 percent of the labor force in 1975.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1974 was \$2,798, an increase of 62.4 percent since 1970.

The Burkesville labor market area includes Cumberland County, the five adjoining Kentucky counties, and Clay County in Tennessee. The total number of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area employed in 1975 averaged 22,670, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 17,430 workers. Manufacturing employers in the area reported 4,020 workers; mining and quarrying 80; construction firms 250; transportation, communications, and public utilities 200; wholesale and retail trade 1,855; finance, insurance, and real estate 290; and employees in the service industries 1,020.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 4,420 men and 3,610 women available for industrial jobs in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area. In addition, 2,830 young men and 2,670 young women in this area will become 18 years of age before 1983 and potentially available for work. The current labor supply would be supplemented by the number of men and women in the adjoining Tennessee county who are available for industrial jobs.

- 2. Transportation The Louisville and Nashville Railroad at Glasgow, 39 miles from Burkesville, provides the nearest rail service. Burkesville is 13 miles west of U.S. 127 and 50 miles east of Interstate 65, via Kentucky Route 90. The Cumberland Parkway, a four-lane toll road from Somerset to just northeast of Bowling Green, passes 28 miles north of Burkesville. The new Appalachian Highway System, now under construction, will connect Burkesville to Interstate 75. One truck line serves Burkesville with a terminal located in the city. The nearest commercial airport is located in Nashville, Tennessee, 116 miles southwest of Burkesville. The Albany Airport, 17 miles distant, provides service for small aircraft.
- 3. Utilities and Fuel Electricity is supplied to Burkesville and Cumberland County by the Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation which receives its power from the Tennessee Valley Authority. There is no natural gas service in Burkesville; however, three distributors of propane and three distributors of distillate fuel oil serve the city. The local raw water supply from the Cumberland River is more than adequate for future growth.
- 4. Education There is one consolidated public school system serving all of Cumberland County. One university, one senior college and one junior college are located within a 60-mile radius of Burkesville. The Somerset State Vocational-Technical School, 69 miles from Burkesville, offers 17 courses, and the Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School, 73 miles away, offers 24 courses. In addition, seven courses are offered at the Clinton County Area Education Center in Albany, 17 miles distant.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtanied by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for seven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Beginning January 1, 1977, local school tax rates were reduced by \$0.30 per \$100 valuation and the state rate was increased by \$0.30 per \$100 (from \$0.015), resulting in no net change in the combined state and local rates.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. Beginning January 1, 1977, local school rates were reduced by \$0.30 per \$100 valuation and the state rate was raised by \$0.30 per \$100 (from \$0.15).

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Intangible personal property owned by corporations in Kentucky as a result of business transactions performed out-of-state, but having a tax situs in Kentucky (accounts receivable, notes, bonds, credits, non-domestic bank deposits, licensing or royalty agreements, shares of stock of any affiliated company, etc.) is taxed by the state at \$0.015 and is not subject to local taxation.

RECREATION

Local

A supervised recreation program is held each summer at the VFW-American Legion Park in Burkesville. The park's facilities include a swimming pool, baseball diamond, miniature golf course, picnic area, and stands. The city plans to purchase 16 acres of land adjoining the park for the development of a camping area and tennis courts. Other public recreational facilities include four school playgrounds, four basketball courts, a tennis court, and a football field. Burkesville also has one bowling facility with six lanes.

The Town and Country Music Hall in Burkesville features country music, gospel music, folk and rock. The "Old Kentucky Barn Dance" is held here every Saturday night, the year-round.

The 76 Falls Country Club, 15 miles from Burkesville, has a swimming pool and a 9-hole golf course. Membership is open to residents of Cumberland and Clinton Counties.

Area (Within 30 miles)

Burkesville's location places it within close proximity of two large recreational lakes -- Dale Hollow and Lake Cumberland. This lakeland area offers numerous recreational facilities for water sports, fishing, boating and camping.

Dale Hollow Lake State Park, located on 3,407 lakeside acres in southeastern Cumberland County, has a marina, picnic area, and 144 sites for tent and trailer camping. Hendricks Creek Resort, also located on the lake, provides facilities for swimming, fishing, boating, and playground activities, and offers cabin and houseboat rentals. Sulphur Creek KOA and Marina has 60 sites for tent and trailer camping, houseboat rentals, and a picnic area.

Lake Cumberland is located just northeast of Burkesville and provides over 1,200 miles of shoreline. Lake Cumberland State Resort Park is a 3,000-acre park on the lake. The park features a modern resort lodge which is perched on a high bluff above the lake. The lodge has a swimming pool, dining room, gift shop, and multipurpose convention center. Cottages and camping sites are also available. Recreational facilities available at the park include swimming pools, riding stables, tennis courts, hiking trails, 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, picnic area, playground, boat rentals and a dock.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

- 1. A new \$1 million 60-bed intermediate care nursing home opened in April 1977.
- 2. The Bank of Cumberland relocated into a new bank building in October 1975.
- 3. The Burkesville-Cumberland County Fire Department acquired a truck with a 250-gallon water tank for use in the county.
- 4. The Cumberland County Rescue Squad constructed a 50- by 80-foot building to house rescue equipment.

Underway

- 1. The Bureau of Outdoor Recreation has approved a \$42,000 grant for the City of Burkesville to purchase 16 acres of land adjoining the VFW-American Legion Park. The city plans to develop this land as a recreational area with camping facilities and tennis courts.
- 2. A medical arts building which will contain offices for three physicians, a laboratory, and an X-ray room will be occupied in July of 1977.
- 3. Cominco American, Inc., NL Industries, Inc., and ASARCO, Inc., jointly announced plans to sink a 2,000-foot exploratory zinc shaft in Cumberland County 3 miles east of Burkesville. This multimillion dollar exploratory project will take approximately three years to complete.
- 4. Cumberland County is in the process of developing a county-wide refuse collection system. Refuse containers will be placed at various locations throughout the county and the county will provide pick-up service at these collection points.

Planned

- 1. The Burkesville Municipal Water Works is planning to extend water lines to an area east of town and to construct a 500,000-gallon water storage tank. Total cost of the project is \$225,000. There are future plans to connect the Burkesville water system with the Marrowbone Water District.
- 2. There are plans to add drying beds to the municipal sewage treatment facilities and to extend sewer service into several new areas.
- 3. There are plans to construct a 20-unit federally subsidized apartment complex in Burkesville.
- 4. The Marrowbone Community Park Association has applied for a \$37,000 grant to develop a 16.5-acre site into a recreational area with three tennis courts, a ballfield, and a picnic area.
- 5. The City of Burkesville and Cumberland County are applying for funds to construct a community center.
