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



BROWNSVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Brownsville, the county seat of Edmonson County, is a small community located in the central section of the county at the western edge of Mammoth Cave National Park. Nearly 47,000 acres of Mammoth Cave lay beneath Edmonson County. Brownsville, with an estimated 1988 population of 840, is located 30 miles northeast of Bowling Green, Kentucky; 91 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; 96 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 303 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Edmonson County, with a land area of 302 square miles, is located in south central Kentucky, partly within the Western Coal Field Region and partly within the Mississippian Plateaus Region. In 1988, Edmonson County had an estimated population of 9,900.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Edmonson County residents employed in 1989 averaged 3,609. Wholesale and retail trade provided 179 jobs; 245 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 322 employees; and contract construction firms provided 67 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 20,185 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1990 through 1994, 11,917 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Kentucky Highway 259, a "AA"-rated trucking highway, provides direct access from Brownsville to Interstate Highway 65, 15 miles southeast of Brownsville, and to the Western Kentucky Parkway, 24 miles north of Brownsville. There are 11 trucking companies providing interstate and/or intrastate service to Brownsville. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Standiford Field near Louisville, 94 miles northeast and at the Nashville Metropolitan Airport, 97 miles southwest of Brownsville near Nashville. The CSX Transportation Company provides main line rail service at Cave City, 21 miles east of Brownsville.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Brownsville and parts of Edmonson County by the Warren Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Edmonson County is also provided electric power by the Kentucky Utilities Company and Farmers Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is currently not available in Brownsville.

Education - The Edmonson County School System, which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, provides primary and secondary education in Edmonson County. There are three institutions of higher learning within 70 miles of Brownsville. Vocational education is available at the Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School at Bowling Green, 30 miles southwest of Brownsville; the Grayson County Area Vocational Education Center in Leitchfield, 29 miles north; and at the Barren County Area Vocational Education Center in Glasgow, 33 miles southeast.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1989







PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME 1988




AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES

Edmonson County is served by the Bowling Green local office of the Kentucky Department for Employment Services. The focus of the following data is on job placements made by the Bowling Green local office and may therefore be used as an indicator of the wages which employers in the area pay new employees. TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Kentucky Highway 259, a "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway, serves Brownsville and provides access to Interstate Highway 65, 15 miles southeast of Brownsville, and to the Western Kentucky Parkway, a multilane highway, 24 miles north of Brownsville. The Cumberland Parkway is accessible 20 miles southeast of Brownsville via Kentucky 259 and Interstate 65.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Brownsville is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Edmonson County is served by a county judge/executive and six magistrates. The judge/executive and magistrates serve four-year terms.

Planning and Zoning

Currently, there is no active planning and zoning agency in Brownsville or Edmonson County, but mandatory state codes are enforced.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Brownsville levies a one percent occupational license fee on gross wages of individuals and net profits of businesses. The city also levies a 5% tax on insurance premiums and a \$25 per year unloading license fee.

State and Local Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

A community recreation center in Brownsville provides facilities for year-round activities. The county park provides three lighted baseball/softball fields, with plans to construct a tennis court. The Brownsville City Park, located along the Green River, offers picnic areas, campsites, a shelter house, restroom facilities, and a boat ramp.

Other recreational facilities include a playground, a football field, the Baptist Church Camp, fairgrounds, and a private golf course located in southern Edmonson County. The Seven Springs Park, located in southern Edmonson County includes a campground, picnic areas, swimming, fishing and hiking.

Nolin River Lake is just north of Mammoth Cave National Park. The lake has a surface area of 5,800 acres and offers facilities for camping, boating, and fishing.

Mammoth Cave National Park is located 14 miles east of Brownsville near Cave City. Beneath 52,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is the largest cave network ever discovered, with over 300 miles of caverns. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining Room (267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park accommodations include a hotel with distinctive gift shops featuring native Kentucky and Southern Highland handicrafts, a motor lodge, hotel cottages, and woodland cottages. Other park facilities include the hotel dining room and coffee shop, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, boat rides, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts. The park is open for tours every day of the year (except Christmas Day).

Barren River Lake State Resort Park, 43 miles south of Brownsville near Glasgow, is a full-facility resort park offering a 51-room resort lodge, 12 cottages, a coffee shop, a heated lodge and cottage pool, a beach, riding stables, nature trails, open and covered boat slips, a nine-hole golf course, lighted handball and tennis courts, shuffleboard, park camping with a service building, a restaurant, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, picnic areas, and a playground. Barren River Lake, which covers 10,000 acres, is a popular area for skiing, sailing, fishing, and swimming.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

The Edmonson County Emergency Medical Service was recently upgraded to advanced life support status. Staff was increased by 50 percent and a third ambulance will be added in 1991.

The City of Brownsville received funds from the Barren River Area Development District to improve drainage at the existing industrial park. The project involves installing large concrete tiles to level off portions of the site. The \$50,000 project is scheduled to be completed in 1991. The 28-acre industrial park, which is accessable from Kentucky 70, has an access road and utilities in place.


A second industrial park is currently being developed by the Brownsville-Edmonson County Chamber of Commerce. This 15-acre site is adjacent to Kentucky 259 near Kentucky 70. The Chamber hopes to secure funds from local banks, local government and from the state in order to build an access road and a 40,000 square-foot spec building.

The Edmonson County Water District recently approved a twenty-two mile line extension project which will provide service to 185 additional customers.

Planned

The Brownsville Sewer System will undergo extensive improvements to the sewage treatment facility. The \$550,000 project is scheduled to be completed by November 1991.

The Edmonson County Art Council plans to construct an amphitheater at the Green River City Park. The Council has developed an outdoor drama, "Death of Floyd Collins", which will be presented during the spring and summer at the amphitheater.
