





# GREENSBURG, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Greensburg, the county seat of Green County, is located in south central Kentucky. The Old Green County Courthouse, the oldest courthouse west of the Alleghenys, is located in Greensburg. The city had a 1984 estimated population of 2,287. Greensburg is located 83 miles south of Louisville, Kentucky; 129 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; and 346 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Green County, with a land area of 289 square miles, is located in the Mississippian Plateau Region of south central Kentucky. In 1984, Green County had an estimated population of 10,971.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Green County residents employed in 1985 averaged 4,870, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 3,900 workers. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 620 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 350 jobs; 185 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 430 employees; and contract construction firms provided 30 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 5,300 men and 5,630 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1986 through 1990, 3,330 young men and 3,220 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Highways serving Greensburg are U.S. Highway 68 (a AAA-rated trucking highway), Kentucky Route 61 (a AA-rated trucking highway), and Kentucky Route 70. Nine trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Greensburg. The Taylor County Airport, twelve miles northeast, has a 5,000-foot paved runway. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is located at Standiford Field in Louisville, 78 miles north of Greensburg. The nearest rail service is provided by CSX Transportation at Campbellsville, 11 miles northeast of Greensburg.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Greensburg and portions of Green County by the Kentucky Utilities Company. Green County is also served by the Taylor County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided to Greensburg by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. Four propane dealers and seven fuel oil dealers are located within fifteen miles of Greensburg.

Education - Primary and secondary education in Greensburg and Green County is provided by the Green County School System. There are seven colleges and universities located within 70 miles of Greensburg. The Elizabethtown State Vocational-Technical School, 40 miles northwest, offers training in 34 areas of study. Vocational training is available locally at the Green County Area Vocational Education Center.

#### LABOR MARKET STATISTICS

The Greensburg Labor Market Area includes Green County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Adair, Hart, LaRue, Metcalfe and Taylor.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

### **Highways**

A major highway providing direct access to Greensburg is U.S. Highway 68, a AAA-rated trucking highway (80,000-pound gross load limit). Kentucky Route 61, a AA-rated trucking highway (62,000-pound gross load limit), and Kentucky Route 70 also serve Greensburg. Interchanges of Interstate 65, a major north-south route, are located near Munfordville (28 miles west) via Kentucky Highways 61 and 88, and at Elizabethtown (38 miles northwest) via Kentucky Route 61. The Western Kentucky Parkway and the Bluegrass Parkway (both multilane, east-west toll roads) are also accessible at Elizabethtown. The Cumberland Parkway (a multilane, east-west toll road) is located 31 miles south of Greensburg via U.S. Highway 68.

# State and Local Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

# **Vocational Training**

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

#### RECREATION

#### Local

The American Legion Park is a 65-acre community park located in Green County. The park was developed and financed by local residents. Recreational facilities available are: a swimming pool, ball fields, pavillon, air-conditioned dining room, horse show ring, fishing area, picnic area, equipped playground, horseshoe pits, and tennis courts. Four other tennis courts, available to the public, are located at the elementary school.

Other recreational facilities in the Greensburg area are an archery range, a 9-hole golf course, two lighted tennis courts, the Green County Sportsman Club, and the Green County Saddle Club.

Many historical and architectural points of interest are located in Green County. Greensburg has the oldest courthouse west of the Alleghenies. This building was completed in 1803. The two-story structure has been renovated and is now open to the public. Other points of interest include the home of Jeremiah Abell, Presbyterian minister who served as missionary and pastor in Green and surrounding counties during the early 1800's; the site of the home of Jane Todd Crawford on whom Dr. Ephraim McDowell performed the first successful ovariotomy in 1809; General E. H. Hobson's Home; a Court Clerk's office built in 1818; a water powered sawmill; Mt. Gilead Church which is built on the site of the camp of the "Long Hunters" who came to Kentucky in 1769; the Old Bank Building which originally housed the Bank of Kentucky; Old Vaughn or Allen's Inn; Pendleton House; Ben Will Penick House; Shreve House, which originally housed the Greensburg Academy; Simpson House, the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln's law partner; and a scenic footbridge.

### Area (Within 55 miles)

Green River Lake State Park near Campbellsville, 10 miles east of Greensburg, is made up of 1,300 acres surrounding an 8,200-acre lake. The park is open all year-round and offers 96 campsites, a beach, boat docks, fishing, and a picnic area.

Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Site, located 23 miles northwest of Greensburg near Hodgenville, features the log cabin which was the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln, enclosed within a granite memorial shrine. The grounds include 116 acres of the original Thomas Lincoln farm and a visitors' center with audiovisual programs and exhibits on the Lincoln family.

Nolin River Lake, 43 miles west of Greensburg, is just north of Mammoth Cave National Park. The lake has a surface area of 5,800 acres and offers facilities for camping, boating, and fishing.

Lincoln Homestead State Park, 44 miles northwest of Greensburg near Springfield, is a 153-acre park on land settled by Abraham Lincoln's family. The actual building in which Nancy Hanks, mother of President Lincoln, lived during her courtship with Thomas Lincoln is preserved here as well as a replica of the 1782 cabin where Thomas Lincoln lived as a boy. The park also has a museum, a gift shop, a picnic area, and an 18-hole golf course.

Mammoth Cave National Park is located 44 miles southwest of Greensburg near Cave City. Beneath 52,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is the largest cave network ever discovered, with over 300 miles of caverns. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining Room (267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagra, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park accommodations include a hotel with distinctive gift shops featuring native Kentucky and Southern Highland handicrafts, a motor lodge, hotel cottages, and woodland cottages. Other park facilities include the hotel dining room and coffee shop, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts. The park is open for tours every day of the year (except Christmas Day).

My Old Kentucky Home State Park, 53 miles north of Greensburg in Bardstown, portrays an image of the South's gentle and leisurely home life before the Civil War. The restored Georgian Colonial mansion is where composer Stephen Foster visited and where he was inspired to write "My Old Kentucky Home." One of the nation's most successful outdoor dramas, "The Stephen Foster Story", is presented in the park's amphitheatre during the summer months. The park also offers a 40-site campground, a gift shop, a 9-hole golf course and pro shop, a picnic area, and planned recreation.

Lake Cumberland State Resort Park near Jamestown, 54 miles southeast of Greensburg, is a 3,000-acre park located on the 50,000-acre Lake Cumberland, which sports excellent bass, bluegill, and crappie fishing. The park features a modern 48-room resort lodge which is perched on a high bluff above the lake. The lodge has a swimming pool, a dining room, a gift shop, and a multi-purpose activities center. Other park facilities include an additional swimming pool, riding stables, tennis courts, hiking trails, a 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, a picnic area, and a playground. A marina offers houseboats, and fishing boats and motors for rent plus year-round launching ramps.

#### **COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS**

#### Recent

The Green County School System recently completed construction of a building at the high school which contains a concession stand, press box, and restrooms. This \$70,000 project was completed in August, 1986.

The Greensburg Waste Water Treatment Plant completed construction of additional treatment facilities in the fall of 1985. The cost of the project was approximately \$38,000.


#### Planned

Greensburg Water Works plans to double the capacity of the treatment plant, build a new 200,000-gallon storage tank, and construct new water lines. This estimated \$1.1 million project is scheduled for completion in the summer of 1987.

Renovation of the Green County courthouse is scheduled to be performed in 1987. Estimated cost of the project is \$30,000.

A segment of U.S. Highway 68, from Greensburg to Campbellsville, is scheduled to be straightened and rerouted in 1987. Improvements to Kentucky Route 61 North are also planned.

Renovation of the community building at the American Legion Park and resurfacing of the tennis courts is planned to be performed in the spring of 1987.
