

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Pikeville is served by U. S. Highways 23, 460, and 119. The Mountain Parkway is only 51 miles northwest of Pikeville via four-lane U. S. 23-460 and recently improved Kentucky 114.

Plans are complete for the new U. S. 23 Pikeville Bypass which will be routed west of the city. Construction is expected to begin during 1978.

U. S. 23, 460, and Kentucky 80 provide highway access from Pikeville to Elkhorn City. A section of this route, U. S. 23 from Pikeville south to Shelbiana, was improved in 1976.

Approximately 30 miles of new four-lane highway on U. S. 119 between Pikeville and South Williamson is under construction or in the final design stage.

Pike County will soon have a two runway airport comparable to the Tri-State airport in Huntingham, West Virginia. This facility, called the Pike County Regional Airport, will be located less than 4 miles from U.S. 23 at Cowpen, Kentucky. It is designed to accommodate almost any type of aircraft. In addition to two runways, the airport will have a 10,000 square foot terminal building, a 14,400 square foot main hangar, a 40,000 square foot conventional hangar, a 68-unit tee hangar, a 20-unit tee hangar, a 12 space tie down area, and a helicopter touch down pad with parking for 5 helicopters. Paving of the 6,000-foot runway is scheduled for late 1978. The new airport will be within reach of Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties as well as neighboring counties in West Virginia and Virginia. Over 45 million cubic yards of earth are being moved to create a hilltop plateau for the facility. Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, accounts, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Intangible personal property owned by corporations in Kentucky as a result of business transactions performed out-of-state, but having a tax situs in Kentucky (accounts receivable, notes, bonds, credits, non-domestic bank deposits, licensing or royalty agreements, shares of stock of any affiliated company, etc.) is taxed by the state at \$0.015 and is not subject to local taxation.

Presently Pike County is divided into four solid waste collection areas. Private cartage companies are franchised by the county to collect the waste. These companies provide door to door collection for a nominal monthly charge. Pick-up is available for industries at negotiable rates.

The collectors bring the solid waste to "transfer" stations located in each solid waste area. Each station is equipped with a solid waste "hopper" which compacts any type of waste from household litter to large appliances. County owned sanitation trucks then transport the compacted waste to Pike County's licensed landfill near Elkhorn City. Two ecology officers enforce the county's stringent littering laws.

RECREATION

Local

Pikeville has a 15-acre site which is being developed as a public recreational area, and presently offers a baseball and softball field.

An 11.5-acre site has been developed and has a recreation building which houses a day care center on the upper level at the present time. Also shuffleboard, ping pong, locker rooms and a concession stand are available. Tennis courts and a swimming pool are to be constructed and plans are to have these facilities available for the summer of 1978. The high school gymnasium is adjacent to this property and is available for sports activities.

Pikeville has a small city park with basketball goals and playground. Other public facilities available in Pikeville include 8 tennis courts, baseball diamonds, playgrounds and basketball courts.

Private facilities include a country club, golf course, swimming pool, drive-in and indoor movie theaters.

Pike County is presently constructing baseball fields, tennis courts, basketball courts and playgrounds at all the elementary and secondary schools in the county with returned coal severance tax money.

Fishtrap Lake, which lies in Pike County, offers boating, fishing and camping areas. The Fishtrap Lake Wildlife area, approximately 16 miles from Pikeville, offers state regulated hunting in season.

In addition, Breaks Interstate Park, located at Elkhorn City in Pike County, encompasses 3,360 acres and is the site of the largest canyon east of the Mississippi River. Park facilities include a lodge, restaurant, housekeeping cottages, tent and trailer campsites, picnic areas, playgrounds, hiking trails, horseback riding, fishing, fishing boat rentals, community pool, visitor's center, and a gift shop.

Area

Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, 29 miles from Pikeville in Prestonsburg, is a 1,700-acre park in a beautiful setting. The extensive park facilities and activities include a lodge, dining room, housekeeping cottages, primitive campsites, picnic areas, planned recreation, playground, golf, hiking trails, horseback riding, shuffleboard, fishing, fishing boat rentals, pedal boat rentals, an olypmic pool and a gift shop.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Pikeville Cut Through Project

The Pikeville Cut Through Project will create more than 200 acres of level land for commercial and residential development. Phase I of the project is nearing completion. This phase consists of moving more than 13 million cubic yards - 28 million tons - of material and creating a 1,400-foot wide, 3,700-foot long graduated ditch. Phase II of the project will involve the relocation of the river, railroad and highways through the ditch, the development of a railroad yard south of the city to serve customers currently located within Pikeville and designing a proposed inner loop access road through abandoned railway property in the city.

Industrial Development

Pike County is developing a 42-acre site at Robinson Creek known as the Douglas Industrial Park. Located on the site will be a coal gasification plant designed to transfer coal into low BTU gas. Construction is scheduled for completion in February 1979 with operations planned for April 1979. The gas will be used to power industries and other facilities. Housing units, a health care facility, a shopping center and a fire station are also planned for construction. Officials estimate that this development will create approximately 2,000 new jobs.

Pike County is now making plans for a new multi-county industrial park. The park will not be one large unit of land but will be several non-contiguous parcels, each of which will be located within 5 miles of the Douglas Site.

Commercial Development

The City of Pikeville is committed to a comprehensive plan for total development, and is presently at mid-point in this development process. The major thorofare plan and land use development plan are moving toward completion. The focus now is to provide a commercial shopping mall to satisfy the needs of 250,000 central Appalachians.

The city shall direct its efforts to preparation of the site, with adequate access both to parking and circulation. The site base shall be composed of two levels of parking as the foundation for the two levels of commercial space above.

The Pikeville River Mall located in the heart of the city adjacent to the old central business district is ideally oriented to compliment and blend with the functions of the Civic Center complex, the professional community, the educational institutions and the financial establishments.

Pike County has plans well underway for the construction of Energy Mall. The new mall will be located on the Douglas Industrial Park and when completed will offer 220,000 square feet under roof which will accommodate 30 to 40 businesses. The new mall will have a 13-acre parking area.

Transportation

Pike County will soon have a two runway airport comparable to the Tri-State Airport in Huntington, West Virginia. This facility, called the Pike County Regional Airport, will be located less than 4 miles from U.S. 23 at Cowpen, Kentucky. It is designed to accommodate almost any type of aircraft. In addition to two runways, the airport will have a 10,000 square foot terminal building, a 14,400 square foot main hangar, a 40,000 square foot conventional hangar, a 68-unit tee hangar, a 20-unit tee hangar, a 12 space tie down area, and a helicopter touch down pad with parking for 5 helicopters. Paving of the 6,000-foot runway is scheduled for late 1978. The new airport will be within reach of Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties as well as neighboring counties in West Virginia and Virginia. Over 45 million cubic yards of earth are being moved to create a hilltop plateau for the facility. The airport will provide area residents and workers with easy access to neighboring cities and states.

Plans are complete for the new U.S. 23 Pikeville Bypass which will be routed west of the city. Construction is expected to begin during 1978.

Approximately 30 miles of new 4-lane highway on U.S. 119 between Pikeville and South Williamson is under construction or in the final design stage.

Utilities

The City of Pikeville Utilities Department has a new 6,000,000 gallon per day filter intake facility under construction and it is to be completed by July 1, 1978.

The City of Pikeville Utilities Department is planning the construction of a new 6,000,000 gallon per day water treatment plant.

The City of Pikeville Utilities Department is in the process of cleaning all sewer lines, motor pump panels are being installed for lift stations, and plans are underway to replace all lift stations and sewer lines in connection with the Cut Through. Also all storm mains and sanitary mains are to be separated.

The Sandy Valley Water District has filed an application for funds to construct a water treatment plant.

The new Shelby Valley Water District will serve as a distribution system and construction is expected to begin in the late spring of 1978.

A new sewage treatment plant was recently put into operation at Elkhorn City.

Education

The Pike County School System has planned an addition to the Millard Vocational School. This project is presently in the design stage. A new Millard Elementary School, grades K-6, was completed and ready for use for the 1977-78 school year.

A new building is being constructed for the Mullins School band room.

South Williamson Grade School is constructing a new lunch room.

Construction was completed in the fall of 1976 on the new Pikeville High School. A new physical education building at Pikeville Elementary is scheduled for completion in the spring of 1978.

Housing

Pike County is planning to construct 450 units of multi-family housing which are to be completed by the mid 1980's. Plans are also underway for 600 units of single family housing which are to be constructed during the next twenty-four to thirty months.

At the present time, the Housing Authority is planning to bring a modular housing industry into the county to help alleviate the housing shortage. Also, the county hopes in the future to work with coal companies to reclaim land for future housing sites.

Health and Public Safety

The Methodist Hospital in Pikeville has added a radiation therapy unit, which was completed in January 1977.

Pike County has recently remodeled its Disaster and Emergency Services Center near the Pike County Courthouse. The new quarters are equipped with a modern communications system which allows county officials and disaster personnel to transmit and receive emergency information during a disaster.

As a result of Pike County's jail renovation program, the county now has a prisoner processing center as sophisticated as any in the state. It is equipped with remote control security gates and a television monitoring and communication system to provide for maximum security in transferring prisoners into the facility.

Pike County will soon open a "non-treatment group home for status offenders." This new pilot program will provide juveniles detained for crimes for which there is no adult equivalent such as truancy with an alternative to detention or incarceration. The juvenile will remain in the non-institutional atmosphere of the home 30 days or until permanent placement is available.

In the fall of 1977 Pike County opened the state's first social setting detoxification center in Pikeville. The center provides a non-institutional homelike setting and emphasizes rehabilitation.

The Elkhorn City Fire Department is planning to begin construction on a new stationhouse in the spring of 1978.

Recreation

Pike County is presently constructing baseball fields, tennis courts, basketball courts and playgrounds at all the elementary and secondary schools in the county.

Pikeville has a 15-acre site which is being developed as a public recreational area.

An 11.5-acre recreation area at Pikeville has been developed. New facilities to be added to the park for the summer of 1978 include tennis courts and a swimming pool.

Pike County School System has built 2 tennis courts at the Elkhorn City School.

A swimming pool was constructed at the city park in Elkhorn City and was open for the 1977 summer season.

Other

Pike County has repaired and remodeled its main courthouse in Pikeville and the courthouse annex in Hellier. Part of the Pikeville courthouse remodeling was the installation of an elevator to make the second and third floor offices easily accessible to the elderly and handicapped. New courthouse annexes have been built at Phelps and Belfry.

Senior citizens centers in Pikeville and Stone are now being operated by the county. A third center in the Virgie area is being planned. These centers provide hot meals and meaningful programs and services to the county's elderly residents. Representatives from the professional community are brought to the centers to keep the senior citizens updated on issues vital to them. The centers work with Pikeville College in offering courses of interest to the senior citizens.
