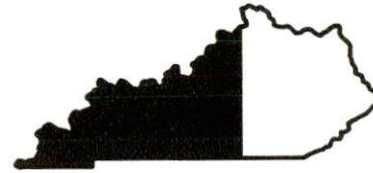

KENTUCKY

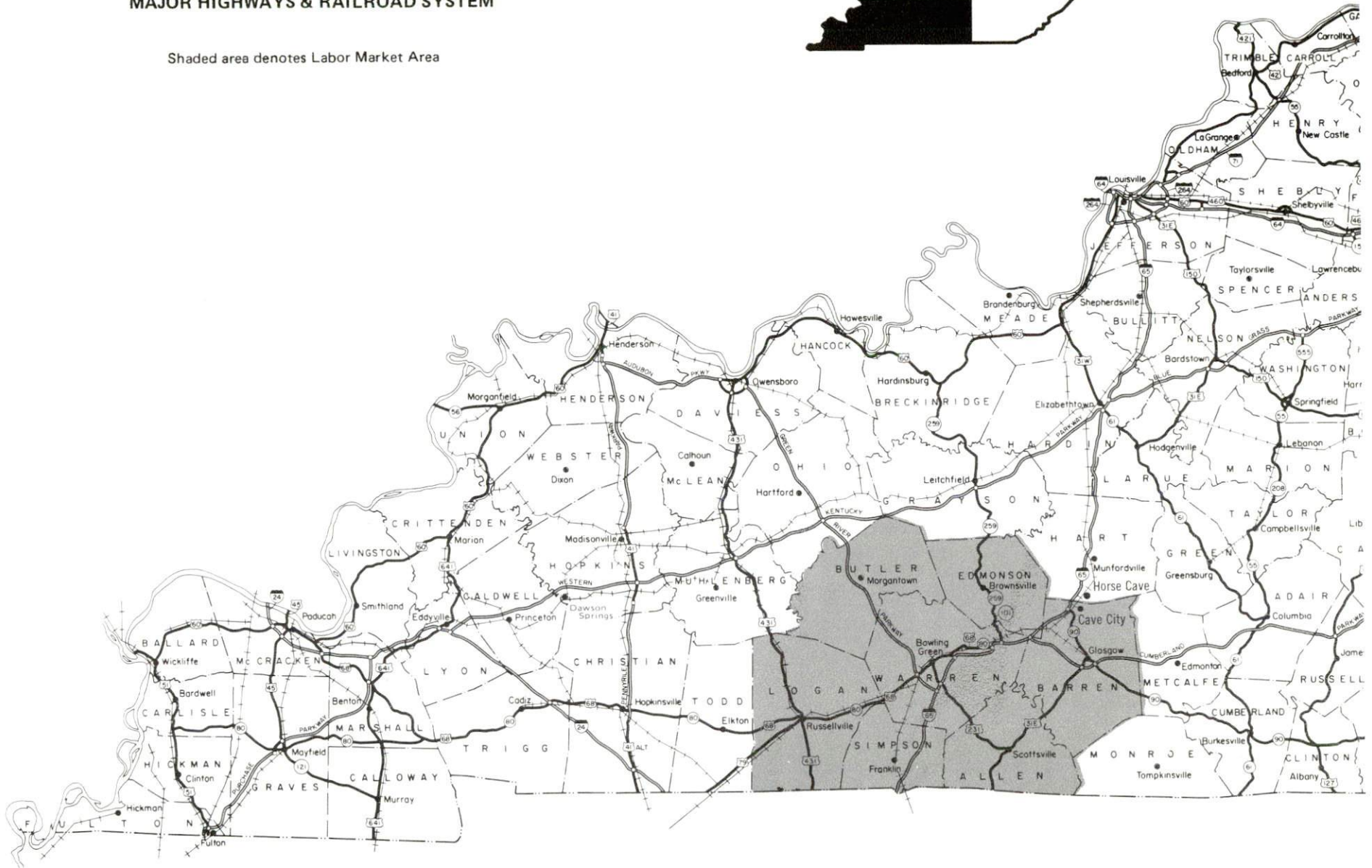

BOWLING GREEN, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Bowling Green, county seat of Warren County and home of Western Kentucky University, is a progressive southern Kentucky city serving the area as an educational, industrial, and commercial center. Bowling Green is Kentucky's fifth largest city with a 1980 population of 40,450. Situated on the banks of the Barren River in the southwestern section of central Kentucky, Bowling Green is 25 miles north of the Kentucky - Tennessee border, 66 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee, 119 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky, and 270 miles southeast of St. Louis Missouri.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Warren County in 1980 averaged 34,300 with 32,900 employed in nonagricultural jobs, including 7,680 in manufacturing, 11,825 in trade and services, 4,300 in government, and 1,500 in construction. Manufacturing employment increased in June 1981 as General Motors began production and provided approximately 1,200 jobs. Manufacturing employment is the greatest in the nonelectrical machinery, electrical machinery, apparel and transportation equipment industries.

Per capita income in the county in 1979 was \$7,421, or \$44 above the Kentucky average. Between 1975 and 1979, per capita income increased by 55 percent.

Bowling Green is the hub of a labor market that includes Warren and its six surrounding counties. Area employment in 1980 averaged 79,000 with 71,700 employed in nonagricultural jobs. The nonagricultural employment included 20,347 jobs in manufacturing, 16,862 in trade and services, 8,272 in government and 2,529 in construction.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 6,845 men and 6,072 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 6,669 young men and 6,350 young women will become 18 years of age before 1986 and potentially available for work.

2. Local transportation capability is excellent. The Louisville and Nashville Railroad provides freight service and a variety of other services including piggyback facilities. Interstate 65, a major highway artery into the industrial south, midwest and east, is routed through Warren County with three interchanges serving Bowling Green. The Green River Parkway also passes through Warren County and the east-west Cumberland Parkway is 21 miles east of Bowling Green via I-65.

3. Electrical power is provided by the Bowling Green Municipal Utilities and the Warren Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation, with the Tennessee Valley Authority serving as the source of supply. Natural gas service is provided by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. There are two distributors of propane and five distributors of distillate fuel oil located in Bowling Green.

4. Education is an important growth asset for Bowling Green. The Bowling Green Independent School District and the Warren County School System are both accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School offers training in 26 different courses.

Western Kentucky University, located in Bowling Green, confers seven undergraduate degrees through 57 academic majors and 38 associate degree programs. The graduate college offers five master's degree programs, the specialist degree and Rank I and II programs. The fall 1980 enrollment was 13,358.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Bowling Green Labor Market Area includes Warren County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Allen, Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Logan, and Simpson.

The General Motors Corporation, GMAD - Bowling Green began production in June 1981 with an employment of 1,200.

The Country Oven Bakery plant is scheduled to begin operations in the summer of 1981 with a proposed employment of 250.

Exceptional Industries has begun production of kits which convert automobiles from gasoline to propane.

The Pepsi-Cola Company is establishing a warehouse facility in Bowling Green. The company plans to add a bottling plant in three or four years.

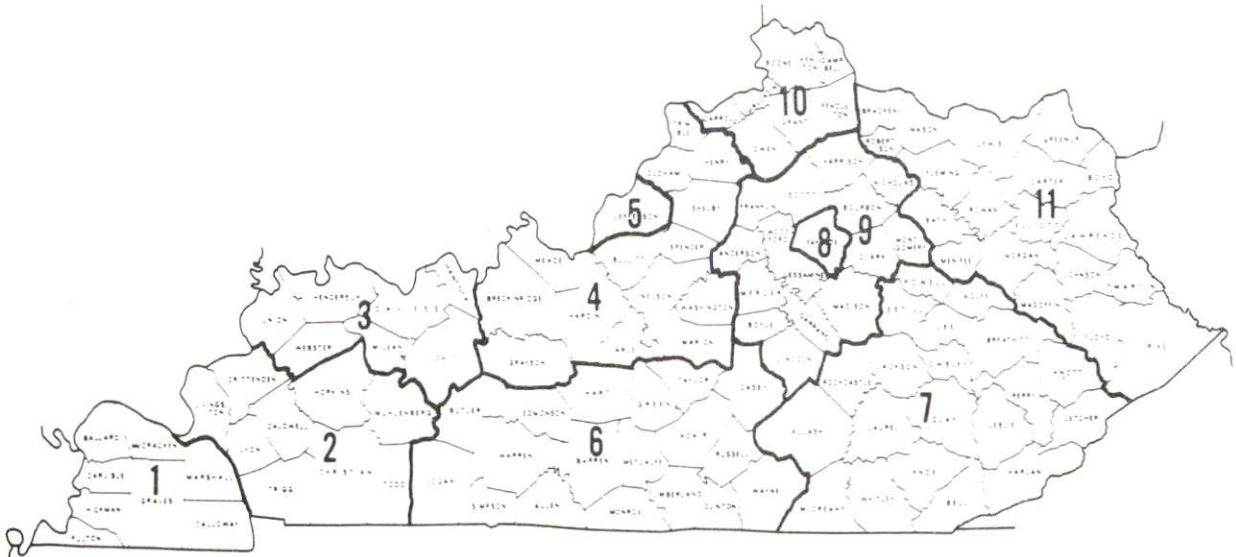

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Bowling Green is served by an excellent highway system. Interstate 65, a major north-south highway, serves Bowling Green with three interchanges. The Green River Parkway, a four-lane toll road, serves the community with three interchanges and provides access to major east-west highways. Access to the Cumberland Parkway, a four-lane toll road, is 21 miles east of Bowling Green via I-65.

Bowling Green is also served by U.S. Highways 31-W, 231, and 68. In addition, Kentucky Routes 185 and 234 serve the area.

Within Bowling Green, traffic flow has been greatly improved by an east-west connector completed in December 1980. In addition, a north-south connector is currently in the final design stage. Construction is expected to begin in late spring 1982.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.241 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

Located on a hill overlooking the city of Bowling Green, the Western Kentucky University campus is acclaimed as one of the most beautiful in the nation. There are 66 major buildings on the approximately 200-acre main campus, with another 800 acres on the University Farm.

Western's undergraduate division provides four-year programs leading to the Bachelor of Arts, the Bachelor of Fine Arts, the Bachelor of Science, the Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the Bachelor of Music Degrees. Fifty-seven academic majors, sixty-three academic minors, and forty-five areas of concentration are available. A number of professional and pre-professional curricula provide additional options. Thirty-eight associate degree programs are offered leading to the Associate of Arts degree, Associate of Science degree and Associate of Liberal Studies degree.

The Graduate College offers the Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Education, Master of Business Administration, Master of Science, Master of Music, and Master of Public Service. Western also offers the Specialist Degree and Rank I and II programs. Joint doctoral degree programs are offered in cooperation with the University of Kentucky and cooperative doctoral degree programs are offered with the University of Louisville.

Bowling Green Business College, also located in Bowling Green, is a candidate for junior college accreditation. Nine programs are offered through six academic departments, including Secretarial Science, Accounting and Finance, Medical Secretarial Science, Business Administration and Fashion Merchandising.

Vocational Schools

The state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers are operated by the Kentucky Department of Education. The state vocational-technical schools enroll persons full time who are at least 16 years of age and not in school. These students attend classes for six hours each day. The area vocational education centers are designed to accommodate high school students who are at least 15 years of age. These students attend vocational school for three hours each day. In Bowling Green, the high school program and the adult program are both taught at the state vocational-technical school. The state vocational-technical schools and the area education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

RECREATION

Local

The Bowling Green Parks and Recreation Department manages 15 parks, eight supervised playgrounds, two youth centers, two swimming pools and two golf courses which are open to the public. There are also numerous ball fields, basketball and tennis courts, and picnic areas in the parks. Various organized recreational programs include tennis and swimming lessons during the summer months.

Other facilities open to the public include eleven movie theaters, one drive-in theater, and Beech Bend Park. Beech Bend features a swimming pool, small zoo, an amusement park, stage entertainment, horseback riding, restaurants, playgrounds and 6,500 campsites. Beech Bend International Raceway, an NHRA sanctioned track, hosts several national drag racing championships.

Two private country clubs are located in Bowling Green - each has an 18-hole golf course, swimming pools, and tennis courts. Other private facilities include two private swim clubs, a racquetball club and a spa.

Western Kentucky University is the focal point for many cultural and educational activities. Hardin Planetarium, the largest in the state, is located at the university. The Kentucky Building houses an outstanding collection of materials on the history of Kentucky and its contiguous states. Lecture series and university drama and music productions are popular attractions. The art gallery in the Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts has outstanding revolving exhibits.

Hobson House, used as a Confederate arsenal during the Civil War, is a popular historical attraction. Completely restored, the house is open to visitors and the grounds are used for special community activities.

Warren County is presently developing the Three Springs Park, which will feature a \$1,900,000 athletic complex. When completed, the park will contain four baseball fields, eight tennis courts, a community center gym, a swimming pool, eight outdoor handball courts, picnic shelters, facilities for day camp, a 9-hole golf course and a marina with paddle and fishing boats. The park will open in phases beginning in the summer of 1981.

Area (Within 65 miles)

The Bowling Green area provides several recreational opportunities. Points of interest in the area include: Mammoth Cave National Park, Barren River State Resort Park, Lake Malone State Park, Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine, and the Old Mulkey Meeting House State Shrine.

Mammoth Cave National Park is located 30 miles northeast of Bowling Green near Cave City. Beneath 51,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is one of the largest cave networks ever discovered, with at least 150 miles charted on five levels and vast areas not yet mapped. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining Room (267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park accommodations include a hotel with distinctive gift shops featuring native Kentucky and Southern Highland handicrafts, a motor lodge, hotel cottages, woodland cottages, and a hotel annex with budget accommodations and craft shop featuring live exhibits of broom making and weaving. Other park facilities include the hotel dining room and coffee shop, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts.

Barren River Lake State Resort Park, approximately 40 miles east of Bowling Green near Glasgow, is a full-facility resort park offering a resort lodge, a coffee shop, cottages, a lodge pool, a beach, riding stables, nature trails, open and covered boat slips, a 9-hole, par-3 golf course, lighted handball and tennis courts, shuffleboard, park camping with a service building, a restaurant, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, picnic areas, and a playground. Barren River Lake, which covers 10,000 acres, is a popular area for skiing, sailing, fishing, and swimming.

Lake Malone State Park, located in southern Muhlenberg County, approximately 50 miles northwest of Bowling Green, offers camping facilities, swimming, fishing and boating on a 788-acre lake. Playground facilities and picnic shelters are located in a beautiful scenic cliff area. Located across from the entrance to the park is an inn, featuring luxury rooms, a restaurant, a swimming lake, a beach, boating, fishing, tennis, and nature trails.

Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine is located 53 miles west of Bowling Green at Fairview. The shrine is at the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U.S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The 16-acre park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.

Old Mulkey Meeting House State Shrine, 63 miles southeast of Bowling Green near Tompkinsville, offers picnic areas and playgrounds. The house was built in 1804, and is the oldest log meeting house in the state. Daniel Boone's sister is buried in the graveyard and authentic records written in pokeberry ink are on display.
