

#### LAWRENCEBURG, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Lawrenceburg, the county seat of Anderson County, is located in the rolling to hilly terrain of central Kentucky's famous Blue Grass Region. The 1986 estimated population of Anderson County was 13,800, with a 1984 estimate of 5,900 people residing within the Lawrenceburg city limits. Lawrenceburg is located 23 miles west of Lexington, Kentucky; 55 miles east of Louisville, Kentucky; and 101 miles south of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Anderson County residents employed in 1986 averaged 6,270. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 950 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 650 jobs; 210 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 430 employees; and contract construction firms provided 80 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 6,170 men and 8,880 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1987 through 1991, 6,700 young men and 6,550 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - The Southern Railway System provides rail service, including daily stops for northbound and southbound freights. Major "AAA"-rated highways serving Lawrenceburg are U.S. Highways 127 and 62, and Kentucky Highway 151. In addition, Kentucky Highway 44, a "AA"-rated highway, serves the city. The Blue Grass Parkway is 4 miles south of Lawrenceburg, and Interstate 64 is accessible 10 miles north of the city. Thirty-one common carrier trucking companies are authorized to serve Lawrenceburg. The nearest airport is located in Frankfort, 14 miles north, and the nearest scheduled airline service is available at Bluegrass Airport, 19 miles east of Lawrenceburg, near Lexington.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Lawrenceburg by Kentucky Utilities Company and to Anderson County by Fox Creek RECC, which is supplied by East Kentucky Power Cooperative. Natural gas service is provided by the Western Kentucky Gas Company, which is supplied by Texas Gas Transmission Corporation. There are two distributors of propane and five distributors of distillate fuel oil located within 15 miles.

Education - Primary and secondary public education is provided by the Anderson County School System in Lawrenceburg and Anderson County. There are 15 institutions of higher learning located with 65 miles. In addition, vocational training facilities are available at Frankfort, Harrodsburg and Lexington, all within 25 miles of Lawrenceburg.

#### LABOR MARKET STATISTICS

The Lawrenceburg Labor Market Area includes Anderson County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Franklin, Mercer, Nelson, Shelby, Spencer, Washington and Woodford.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

#### Highways

Major highways serving Lawrenceburg are U.S. Highways 127 and 62, Kentucky Highways 44 and 151, and the Blue Grass Parkway. U.S. Highways 127, 62, and Kentucky Highway 151 are "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Kentucky 44 is a "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway.

The Blue Grass Parkway, a multi-lane toll road which traverses central Kentucky, is 4 miles south of Lawrenceburg via U.S. 127.

Interstate 64, a major east-west route, is accessible 10 miles north of the city via U.S. 127. Interstate 64 interconnects with Interstate 75, a major north-south corridor, 33 miles distant of Lawrenceburg.

#### **Vocational Training**

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

#### RECREATION

#### Local

Recreation in Lawrenceburg includes facilities for baseball, softball, basketball, track and tennis. Public recreational facilities include two parks, three playgrounds, two swimming pools, one 18-hole golf course, tennis courts, baseball diamonds and football fields.

The city of Lawrenceburg and Anderson County recently completed a new recreational park. Facilities included are softball, baseball, and soccer fields; tennis courts; picnic area with shelter; a swimming pool and a playground.

In addition, local officials are converting the old sewer plant to a recreation park. The facility will feature soccer and football fields, concession stands and restrooms. Completion of the project is scheduled for October, 1987.

The 170-acre Beaver Lake is approximately 10 miles southwest of Lawrenceburg off U.S. 62. Beaver Lake Boat Dock is open March 1 to November 1, weather permitting. There are boat slips, a snack bar, and fishing boats available for rental. An adjacent campground, also open March 1 to November 1, has campsites with electrical hookups, pit toilets, drinking water and ice.

Annual featured activities include the Lawrenceburg Fair and Horse Show, a crafts festival, and the 4-H Fair.

#### Area (Within 40 miles)

Frankfort, the capital of Kentucky, is 14 miles north of Lawrenceburg. Points of interest in Frankfort include the Capitol Building, a 34-foot floral clock, the Daniel Boone Monument, several museums, and old homes with their original furnishings. Frankfort is also the home of Kentucky State University which offers many cultural activities and sporting events.

Old Fort Harrod State Park, 19 miles south of Lawrenceburg, is a 28-acre park in Harrodsburg that features a full-scale reproduction of the original Fort Harrod. The park also contains the log cabin where Abraham Lincoln's parents were wed, the Mansion Museum which houses mementos associated with the great periods of Kentucky history, a pioneer cemetery, and a federal monument dedicated to pioneers. The "Legend of Daniel Boone" and "Lincoln" are two excellent outdoor dramas which are performed at the Old Fort Amphitheater during the summer months.

Taylorsville Lake State Park, 20 miles west of Lawrenceburg near Taylorsville, was developed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The 3,050-acre lake and 10,700-acre recreation area features full-service marina facilities, fishing, boating, swimming, and wildlife recreation.

Lexington, 23 miles east of Lawrenceburg, offers a variety of cultural, sporting, and recreational activities. Thoroughbred and harness racing is presented at Keeneland Race Course and the Red Mile Harness Track during several meets each year. The University of Kentucky and Transylvania University offer a number of sporting events. The University of Kentucky basketball games are held at Rupp Arena, the world's largest basketball arena. Other attractions include Lexington Philharmonic concerts, Lexington Children's Theatre, and plays performed by Broadway touring companies, all held in the recently renovated Opera House. In addition, located in the heart of downtown Lexington, the historical Victorian Square and Festival Market Place offer a taste of nostalgia with their many quaint shops and restaurants.

Constitution Square State Shrine, 28 miles south of Lawrenceburg in Danville, is a reproduction of Kentucky's first courthouse square, including the original 1792 post office which was the first in the west.

Herrington Lake, 28 miles south of Lawrenceburg near Danville and Harrodsburg, was developed by the Kentucky Utilities Company in 1925. Dix River Dam near Pleasant Hill is located on the 3,600-acre lake. Fishing, boating, and swimming can all be enjoyed on the lake. Camping and fishing facilities are available near Danville and Harrodsburg.

Pleasant Hill, a restored Shaker Village located 28 miles southeast of Lawrenceburg, is a National Historic Landmark. Over 20 buildings and grounds have been restored to display unique Shaker skills in furniture making, crafts, and architecture. Dining rooms, lodging, craft shops, and seasonal festivals and plays are offered.

Waveland State Shrine, 28 miles east of Lawrenceburg near Lexington, features an 1847 Greek Revival mansion depicting Kentucky lifestyles from the days of early settlers to the antebellum era of gentility and elegance as well as the Civil War and postwar periods. The shrine also includes the Kentucky Life Museum and a plantation village on ten acres with many shops and displays.

The Kentucky Horse Park, a park dedicated to horses and to man's love for horses, is located 31 miles east of Lawrenceburg at Lexington. The park, which contains more than 1,000 acres of Kentucky Bluegrass, features the International Museum of the Horse; the Man O'War Memorial; the wide screen film "Thou Shalt Fly Without Wings"; an antique carriage display; horseback and pony rides; walking farm tours; horse-drawn tours; a restaurant; a gift shop; and a campground area, which offers swimming, tennis, and planned activities. Numerous special events are held year-round and include various horse shows, steeplechasing, dressage, polo games, and rodeos.

Lincoln Homestead State Park, 32 miles southeast of Lawrenceburg near Springfield, is a 153-acre park on land settled by Abraham Lincoln's family. The actual building in which Nancy Hanks, mother of President Lincoln, lived during her courtship with Thomas Lincoln is preserved here as well as a replica of the 1782 cabin where Thomas Lincoln lived as a boy. The park also has a museum, a gift shop, a picnic area, and an 18-hole golf course.

Isaac Shelby State Shrine, 33 miles south of Lawrenceburg near Danville, is the burial site of Kentucky's first governor and one of the Commonwealth's foremost statesmen.

Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, 39 miles southwest of Lawrenceburg near Perryville, is the site of the largest Civil War battle in Kentucky. A museum, a gift shop, a picnic area, and a playground are located on the grounds.

My Old Kentucky Home State Park, 40 miles west of Lawrenceburg in Bardstown, portrays an image of the South's gentle and leisurely home life before the Civil War. The restored Georgian Colonial mansion is where composer Stephen Foster visited and where he was inspired to write "My Old Kentucky Home." One of the nation's most successful outdoor dramas, "The Stephen Foster Story", is presented in the park's amphitheatre during the summer months. The park also offers a 40-site campground, a gift shop, a 9-hole golf course and pro shop, a picnic area, and planned recreation.

#### COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

#### Recent

Through combined efforts, several local officials recently formed an industrial foundation to include all of Anderson County. Though officially named the Lawrenceburg-Anderson County Industrial Foundation, the organization serves as an economic stimulus to the whole community while providing an industrial marketing tool as well.

The Alton Water and Sewer District recently completed a sewerage collector system. The system is composed of a 6-inch force main which runs approximately 11 miles adjacent to U.S. 127 Bypass from the Alton area to the Lawrenceburg wastewater treatment plant. The system is capable of serving 270 residential customers and several industrial sites. The \$2-million project includes four vacuum stations and two pumping stations.

The city of Lawrenceburg and Anderson County recently completed a recreational park. Facilities included are softball, baseball, and soccer fields; tennis courts; picnic area with shelter; a swimming pool; and a playground.

# Under Way

Several local officials have undertaken a project to convert the former Belden Corporation facility to a training center for the new Aeroquip Company in Versailles, Kentucky. Completion of the project is scheduled for mid-summer of 1987.

The South Anderson Water District is presently building an additional 24 miles of waterlines in Anderson County.

The Anderson County School System is presently building an 8-room addition to the existing middle school. The \$800,000-project includes increasing the size of the kitchen and dining facilities. April, 1988, is the project completion date.

The city of Lawrenceburg is constructing a new recreational park. The facility will feature soccer and football fields, concession stands and restrooms. Completion of the project is scheduled for October, 1987.

#### Planned

Based on engineering studies to be conducted in the near future, Lawrenceburg will determine its public water supply needs. Subsequently, the city officials plan to act accordingly to the recommendations made by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Sufficient funds are already available and earmarked for water improvements.
