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



WEST LIBERTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

West Liberty, the county seat of Morgan County, is located in the Licking Valley area of Kentucky. The city had a 1990 population of 1,887. West Liberty is located 71 miles southwest of Huntington, West Virginia; 93 miles east of Lexington, Kentucky; 165 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 256 miles north of Knoxville, Tennessee.

Morgan County covers a land area of 382 square miles in the Eastern Kentucky Coal Field Region. Cave Run Lake and Daniel Boone National Forest occupies the northwestern portion of the county. Morgan County had a 1990 population of 11,648.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Morgan County residents employed in 1990 averaged 3,350. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 267 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 418 jobs; 274 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 818 employees; and contract construction firms provided 115 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 24,342 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1992 through 1996, 8,273 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - West Liberty is served directly by U.S. Highway 460 and Kentucky Highways 7 and 519. Each is a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Kentucky Highway 172 also serves West Liberty. In addition, the Mountain Parkway is accessible via U.S. 460 and Kentucky 205, 14 miles south of West Liberty. Interstate 64 is accessible via Kentucky 519, 23 miles northwest of the city. Eight trucking companies provide service to West Liberty. CSX Transportation provides the nearest rail service at Paintsville, Kentucky, 41 miles southeast. Tri-State Field in Huntington, West Virginia, 68 miles northeast, provides the nearest commercial airline service. The West Liberty-Morgan County Airport maintains a 2,400-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel - Kentucky Power Company and Licking Valley Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation provide electric power to West Liberty and Morgan County. Elam Utility Company, which is supplied by Columbia Gas Transmission Corporation, provides natural gas to West Liberty.

Education - The Morgan County School System provides primary and secondary education to West Liberty and Morgan County. MSU-Licking Valley Center, an extension campus of Morehead State University, offers an array of community service programs and basic requirement courses which are transferable to state-supported institutions. Eight other institutions of higher learning are located within 75 miles of West Liberty. Vocational training is provided by Morgan County Area Vocational Education Center in West Liberty and by Rowan State Vocational-Technical School, located 20 miles northwest in Morehead, Kentucky.

The West Liberty Labor Market Area includes Morgan County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Elliott, Johnson, Lawrence, Magoffin, Menifee, Rowan, and Wolfe.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1990





AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



TRANSPORTATION

Highways

U.S. Highway 460 and Kentucky Highways 7 and 519 directly serve West Liberty. Each is a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Kentucky Highway 172, a "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway, also serves West Liberty.

The Mountain Parkway, a major limited-access highway which links eastern Kentucky with central Kentucky and Lexington, is accessible via U.S. 460 and Kentucky 205, 14 miles south of West Liberty. Interstate Highway 64, a major east-west corridor, is accessible via Kentucky Highway 519, 26 miles northwest of West Liberty.

A project to widen and upgrade Kentucky Highway 519 north to Morehead and I-64 is under way at West Liberty.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The City of West Liberty is governed by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms. Morgan County is governed by a county judge/executive and five magistrates. Each county official serves a four-year term.

Planning and Zoning

Morgan County and West Liberty are presently not served by a planning and zoning agency.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of West Liberty levies an annual business license fee of \$35, an unloading license fee of \$50 per year, and an annual auto sticker license fee of \$10.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.

MSU-Licking Valley Center

MSU-Licking Valley Center, an extension campus of Morehead State University, recently opened its doors. Program offerings include a service for literacy, family literacy, and G.E.D. College courses are offered which satisfy basic requirements and are transferable to a four-year state-supported institution.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

West Liberty and Morgan County affords several public recreation opportunities for the entire family. Kiwanis Playground and Park features a swimming pool, four tennis courts, a basketball court, a picnic shelter and grill, and a playground.

The Old Mill Park, located along the banks of the scenic Licking River, provides picnic areas and grills, walking areas, fishing, and canoeing. Index Hill Park also contains a picnic area.

Three public ball fields and a soccer field are also available locally.

Pleasant Valley Country Club in West Liberty, offers a nine-hole private golf course, a swimming pool, tennis courts, and a clubhouse.

Morgan County's annual Sorghum Festival is held the last full weekend of September. The gala event includes over 100 arts and crafts exhibits, food booths, live music, a parade, and of course plenty of little brown jugs of sorghum molasses.

The northwestern portion of Morgan County is located within the Daniel Boone National Forest, which covers 640,000 acres of timberland in eastern Kentucky. It encompasses much of Kentucky's great beauty and provides a vacation paradise. There are scenic hiking trails, rivers and streams stocked with a variety of fish, hunting preserves, camping sites, and numerous other natural and historical attractions.

Cave Run Lake, constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is located 19 miles northwest of West Liberty within the Daniel Boone National Forest. The lake area offers everything for the camper, the boatsman, the hunter, the fisherman, and "the lover of leisure".

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

The City of West Liberty recently constructed a 575,000-gallon per day wastewater treatment facility and several new lines. Total cost of the project was approximately \$3.5 million.

Morgan County School System recently completed two building projects including the construction of a new middle school at a cost of \$4 million and construction of a new gymnasium at the high school, totaling \$1 million. In addition, the School System sponsors the annual Education Expo-Academic Olympics which provides opportunities for all students to participate in academic competition in a variety of subject areas.

MSU-Licking Valley Center, an extension campus of Morehead State University, recently opened its doors. Program offerings include a service for literacy, family literacy, and G.E.D. College courses are offered which satisfy basic requirements and are transferable to a four-year state-supported institution.

West Liberty has an active program which promotes and encourages efforts to improve the appearance of the Main Street area. Recent projects include the construction of new sidewalks, storefront refurbishments, installation of new benches, and general aesthetic improvements.

Under Way

A project to widen and upgrade Kentucky Highway 519 north to Morehead is under way at West Liberty. This will provide excellent highway access to I-64.

Planned

The West Liberty Water Works plans to redesign its raw water intake system which would allow the system to take in and treat raw water from Cave Run Lake rather than its current raw water supply, the Licking River. This would increase the raw water capacity and its overall quality. The \$3 million project is scheduled for completion by Spring 1993.
