

The Allen County War Memorial Hospital is in the process of constructing of a new medical/hospital building as an addition to the existing facility. Improvements will include the housing of x-ray and lab facilities and the addition of a CT-Scanner. The project is scheduled for completion in 1993.

Planned

A four-lane highway extending from Scottsville northwest to Interstate 65 is proposed for the near future.

The Allen County School System purchased 103 acres, which joins the present high school, vocational, and middle school campuses. This will provide space for future construction of new elementary schools.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

The Southlink 2000 Leadership Development Program was introduced to Allen County as a pilot program sponsored by Tennessee Valley Authority and Western Kentucky University. The program's first alumni graduated in 1991 with 23 participants. A new group of 20 is presently participating. The program was developed to promote innovative strategies for economic development through the development and support of leadership and leadership networks. Through a combination of workshops and community projects, the program seeks to nurture the ideas and focus the energy that is already present in the region. The program offers training and support to both emerging and established community leaders.

Dollar General Corporation recently made all 1,500+ stores a place where anyone can go to learn how to read, get their GED, or become a tutor. Interested persons complete and mail to Dollar General brochures which are prominently displayed at all Dollar General checkout counters. Dollar General then puts these persons in touch with local adult education centers. Dollar General received the 1988 Presidential Award for Private Sector Initiative, and has served more than 21,000 persons nation-wide with this program.

"Allen-County Partners Promoting Local Education" (APPLE) is a program in which Dollar General Corporation organized by pairing local businesses in the community with local schools in an adoption partnership. In the program, schools and businesses work together in a joint effort to promote education and foster a more positive community image.

The Dollar General Store Warehouse recently expanded its facilities and constructed an access road.

The City of Scottsville Water Department completed construction of a one million-gallon standpipe storage tank at a cost of \$382,000.

Allen County recently implemented the "911" emergency communications system to better serve the safety needs of Allen County citizens.

Barren River Lake State Resort Park, located 13 miles northeast of Scottsville, recently completed improvements at the park which included: development of an additional nine holes at the golf course, construction of ten additional cabins, and development of a new marina on the lake.

Under Way

The City of Scottsville Water Department is in the process of constructing a 1.5 million-gallon-per-day water treatment plant which will replace the existing sources of treated water. The \$4 million project is scheduled for completion by November 1992.

RECREATION

Local

Public recreation facilities available to the residents of Scottsville include two neighborhood parks and playground areas, a baseball field, a football field, eight tennis courts, picnic grounds, and a Youth Center. Private recreation facilities include a country club, a golf course, and a swimming pool. The Fred Hale Park, a large community park, located approximately 2.5 miles from the central business district, provides four lighted ball fields for Little League baseball, adult softball, and girl's softball. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers camping sites at Barren River Lake offers primitive camping sites, swimming and fishing.

Barren River Lake State Resort Park, located 13 miles northeast of Scottsville, is a full-facility resort park offering a 51-room resort lodge, a coffee shop, 22 cottages (including ten new cottages), a lodge pool, a beach, riding stables, nature trails, an 18-hole golf course, lighted handball and tennis courts, shuffleboard, park camping with a service building, a restaurant, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, picnic areas, and a playground. Barren River Lake, which covers 10,000 acres, is a popular area for skiing, sailing, fishing, and swimming. Three full-service marinas are located on the lake.

The Allen County Community Recreation Center, located in Scottsville, employs a full-time recreation coordinator who plans and implements a variety of programs throughout the year including: basketball, volleyball, softball leagues, nature and outdoor activities, arts and crafts, music, dancing, drama, and social activities.

McLars Enterprises Inc., a not-for-profit corporation in Allen County, offers environmental education and outdoor recreation for all ages through their Camp C.E.D.A.R. and Camp Caravan programs. Camp C.E.D.A.R. is a 220-acre facility in northeast Allen County on the Barren River Lake. Camp Caravan offers programs which are brought to area schools, group homes, nursing homes, and retirement communities.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Student writing and the writing process are important curricular areas in the Allen County Schools. The high school was the recipient of a state writing grant which enabled the establishment of a computer writing lab and a writing resource teacher. Advanced placement classes which provide high school students the opportunity to pursue college level classes while in secondary school are offered to Allen County students. Adult education classes for skill remediation and G.E.D. testing are offered on school campus and on worksite at the request from industry.

Allen County Schools Community Resource Center

The Community Resource Center is the hub of community education in Allen County. Located in the old Scottsville High School building, it provides community recreation, art classes, adult literacy as well as a comprehensive program for Allen County students and their families. These family programs include parent training, support groups, vocational guidance, after-school and summer enrichment programs, crisis intervention, tutoring and referral services. A teen activities center is available for youth entertainment and provides a study area.

Allen County School District

The Allen County School District provides a multitude of learning opportunities for its local citizens.

The Primary Program involves a multi-age, multi-ability setting for Allen County children from the time they enter kindergarten until they are ready for fourth grade. Teams of teachers working collaboratively provide developmentally appropriate curricula and activities for the students. Continuous progress, authentic assessment, and qualitative reporting methods are important components of the program. Parents are an intricate part of the team in the Primary School. The School System has an exemplary technology program including IBM Writing to Read labs, several networked computers and a printer in all first through fifth grade classrooms, computer labs in the middle school, high school, administrative use in all schools.

Allen County School System operates active Family Resource and Youth Service Centers, with an array of services to assist both family and students. Among these are counseling services, community education, intervention programs for at-risk students, and a community recreation center staffed by a certified recreation director. Extended school services for students include after-school tutoring and a summer school program. Classes are available for students needing extra help or extra time to successfully complete their work. Enrichment classes are also offered.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.



TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Principal highways directly serving Scottsville include U.S. Highways 231, 31E and Kentucky Highways 100 and 101. Each is a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Interstate 65, a major north-south corridor, is accessible from Scottsville by U.S. 231, 21 miles northwest of the city and by Kentucky 100, 21 miles west of Scottsville. The Cumberland Parkway, a multi-lane toll road which traverses south central Kentucky, is accessible 23 miles northeast of Scottsville via U.S. 31E.





PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME 1989






LABOR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS OF RESIDENTS, 1990



SCOTTSVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Scottsville, the county seat of Allen County, is located in south central Kentucky and had a 1990 population of 4,278. Scottsville is located 48 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; 123 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 223 miles southwest of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Allen County covers a land area of 338 square miles in Kentucky's Pennyrile Region. This area is noted for its gently rolling plains and agricultural production. The southern boundary of the county is formed by the Kentucky-Tennessee state line. Allen County had a 1990 population of 14,628.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Allen County residents employed in 1990 averaged 6,162. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,083 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,139 jobs; 248 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 551 employees; and contract construction firms provided 69 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 14,842 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1992 through 1996, 10,619 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Principal highways which directly serve Scottsville include U.S. Highways 231, 31E and Kentucky Highways 100 and 101. Each is a "AAA"-rated trucking highway. Interstate 65 is accessible 21 miles northwest of Scottsville via U.S. 231. The Cumberland Parkway, a multi-lane toll road, is accessible 23 miles northeast of the city via U.S. 31E. Twenty-six common carrier trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Scottsville. CSX Transportation provides the nearest main line rail service at Bowling Green, 25 miles northwest of Scottsville; and branch line service at Glasgow, 25 miles northeast of Scottsville. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Nashville Metropolitan Airport in Nashville, Tennessee, 54 miles southwest of Scottsville. Charter flight service is available at the Bowling Green-Warren County Airport, 23 miles northwest of Scottsville.

Power and Fuel - The Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation, supplied by the Tennessee Valley Authority, provides electricity to both Scottsville and Allen County. The Scottsville Gas Department, supplied by Texas Gas Transmission Corporation and TXG Gas Marketing Company, serves the city with natural gas.


Education - The Allen County School System provides primary and secondary education to Scottsville and Allen County. One nonpublic school operates locally. Ten colleges and universities are located within 65 miles of Scottsville. The Allen County Area Vocational Education Center offers vocational training in Scottsville. Technical training is also available at the Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School and at the Advanced Technology Center in Bowling Green, 25 miles northwest of Scottsville.
